2015 Legislative Update

General

The New Mexico 60-day Legislative Session is now at its half way point with the deadline for introduction of bills being February 18, 2015. Thus far there have been 535 bills introduced in the House and 685 in the Senate. In the House of Representatives, the Republican majority has been swift in advancing their priority legislation of Right to Work, Immigrant Driver's Licenses and Social Promotion through committees and or floor. The Senate will likely not hear bills for some time but in its most significant action, the Senate approved the nomination of Hanna Skandera as Secretary of Public Education. Representative Lucky Varela has now missed more days than he has attended the session due to illness.

City Capital Outlay Priorities

In terms of the City's capital outlay priorities, the entire Santa Fe Legislative Delegation has submitted the City's number one priority and each of the City's District priorities corresponding to individual legislator districts. City Lobbying Team has been working with the Public Works Department to complete the required capital outlay forms for the city's number one priority as well as district projects. Those forms will be distributed to Santa Fe Delegation members this week for signing and submission to Legislative Council Service and introduction.

Statutory Legislation

In regard to statutory legislation, following is action or the lack thereof regarding various city resolutions related to New Mexico Statutes.

*2014-45 Municipal Comprehensive Tax Reform

*2014-55 Remove taxing limitation on Home Rule Municipalities

*2014-56 Enact Municipal Telecomm Tax

The above resolutions were adopted in support of NMML Resolutions and are identical. The City and other cities rely on the NMML to introduce such legislation. Unfortunately, it seems the NMML is purely focused on the Food Tax legislation and has not introduced any legislation regarding these three items and is not likely to.

Bill Priority Process

While the process of identifying a "Universe" of Bills that eventually gets whittled to a list of "Filtered" bills and then through communication with the CM or via resolution determines all "Targeted" bills which requires For or Against Lobbying has worked well and continues to work, with each report, several bills will be highlighted as to their potential impact to the City. Universe, Filtered, Targeted, Water and Santa Fe Prevention Bills follow from the Lobbying Team's Internal Tracker.

Highlighted Bills

To highlight a few of the bills in the "Targeted" Tracking System that the Lobbying Team are particularly working on; here is a greater description and analysis of those bills:

SB 101

SB 101 was reported on in the commentary section of our last report and has been a part of our tracking system since its introduction. The Lobbying Team has been lobbying against the bill. Here is a synopsis and current standing of the bill.

Essentially, the legislation says that the state is reversing course from HB 641 where in 2013 the state said they were going to start phasing out Hold Harmless payments to municipalities and counties (beginning July, 2015) and if the municipality or county wished to off-set the loss associated with phased-out gross receipts tax payments (food and medical)-they could do so with up to a 3/8 allowance (increase in GRT) provided for in HB 641. SB 101 (which is now a substitute bill) says that all Hold Harmless phased payments would be eliminated beginning January 1, 2016 (in essence eliminating the phased payments). In turn, the legislation says that the state GRT rate would drop by 1/4 percent and a city or county could raise up to 1/2 percent in GRT through ordinance, etc. via the same language included in hb 641. There are other provisions in the bill that mostly have to do with those municipalities and counties that have either utilized all or any portion of the HB 641 3/8 tax increase allowance or any that would do so before the enactment of SB101.

Related to this is the fact that we were not able to fix the double taxation issue between a city and county (ability to separately impose up to 3/8) last session. A separate piece of legislation just introduced by Rep. Harper (HB421) provides that fix but it has not even seen its first committee yet.

SB 101 is strongly supported by Sen. John Arthur Smith and is has additional motivation by the state given the revenue picture. This bill gained momentum after its first committee hearing. The additional potential pressure (in addition to sort of forcing the City to raise its GRT), seemingly, is if the County were to knee jerk react to SB 101 and move forward on any portion of their 3/8 capacity prior to Harper's (hb 421) fix.

SB 101 is Targeted and High Priority for the City. Various additional Strategies have been discussed with the City Manager.

SB 550

The REGIONAL WATER UTILITY AUTHORITY ACT would create a new Water Authority as the following title indicates. In a meeting with the City Water Department, it was determined that there were no outright negatives of this legislation but even so some nuances associated with it determined we would not be disappointed if the legislation failed.

Title of SB 550: New material creates the Regional Water Utility Authority Act that authorizes an authority a variety of purposes including: acquiring waterworks to supply water for domestic, commercial or industrial uses; acquiring wastewater systems; planning regional water or wastewater facilities; implementing storm water management; and advancing technologies aimed at eliminating illegal solid waste disposal; defines entity as a political subdivision, corporate entity or tribal government that provides

water or wastewater services; two or more entities, by resolution, may organize an authority by incorporation; gives the authority several broad powers; authority is to have a board; gives the Department of Environment oversight abilities. An authority organized under this Act is not subject to the jurisdiction of the Public Regulation Commission unless the authority chooses to become subject to jurisdiction.

SB 63

Senate Bill 63 authorizes potential funding for all applications submitted to the Water Trust Board during the spring of 2014. Each session, the legislature must authorize the projects via legislation (SB 63). Because all applications are submitted in the Authorization Bill, it allows the City Lobbying Team to take the opportunity to Lobby for specifically the projects the City has applied for that are included in the Authorization Bill. This is exactly what the Lobbying Team has been doing and simultaneously working with the Water Department to Learn more about the projects and internally prioritize. The Water Trust Board will make final awards in early April. Here are the City Applications in SB 63:

☐☐☐\$1,500,000 request with \$500,000 of City matching funds for a 4 million gallon storage tank at the Buckman Regional Water Treatment Facility. The need and scope of work is under *Project Description* within the attached WTB Questionnaire. This funding request falls under the WTB classification of **Water Storage, Conveyance and Delivery category (probably item 98 within SB 0063)**.

☐☐☐\$2,000,000 request with \$4,000,000 of City matching funds for Automated Meter Reading Devices on approximately 34,000 meters and the replacement of the majority of residential & commercial meters. The need and scope of work is under *Project Description* within the attached WTB Questionnaire. This funding request falls under the WTB classification of **Water Storage, Conveyance and Delivery category (probably item 99 within SB 0063)**.

☐☐☐\$200,000 request 50,000 of City matching funds and \$220,000 of USFS federal matching funds for the Santa Fe Municipal Watershed Source Water Protection Project. This funding helps continue the successful Santa Fe Municipal Watershed Management Plan to protect the City of Santa Fe's source of drinking water supply by improving forest health and guarding against catastrophic wildfire. This plan works with support of a new, 4-year collection agreement with the USFS, Santa Fe National Forest staff. Further information is available under the *Project Description* within the attached WTB Questionnaire. This funding request falls under the WTB classification of **Watershed Restoration and Management category (item 124 within SB 0063)**.

Title: LOAN INTEREST RATE CAPS

Summary: Proposes to amend Sec. 56-8-9 (relating to prohibition of excessive charges under Article 8 related to Money, Interest and Usury), the New Mexico Bank Installment Loan Act and the New Mexico Small Loan Act to impose a 36 percent cap on annual interest that may be charged or received for the extension of credit. Does not apply to any federally insured depository institution of government-issued bonds. In the event that the U.S. Prime Lending Rate exceeds 10 percent, the maximum lawful interest

rate may exceed 36 percent annually but shall not exceed the Prime Lending Rate by more than 30 percentage points.

In the event that the U.S. Prime Lending Rate exceeds 10 percent, the maximum lawful interest rate may exceed 36 percent annually but shall not exceed the Prime Lending Rate by more than 30 percentage points.

Summary: Creates the Economic Growth and Energy Development Transportation Fund and appropriates proceeds in the fund to the Transportation Department. The fund will consist of proceeds from the sale of severance tax bonds for projects specified in the bill.

HB148

Sponsor: Rep. Steinborn (D35)

Title: NO SMOKING IN CARS WITH MINORS

Summary: Prohibits smoking in a motor vehicle when a minor is present in that vehicle. Defines smoking as the inhaling, exhaling, burning, carrying or holding of any lighted tobacco product including a cigarette, cigar, pipe or e-cigarette.

Title: LOCAL GOV'T GROSS RECEIPTS & HOLD HARMLESS

Summary: Similar to 2014 HB132) Allows small municipalities (under 10,000 in population) and small counties (those under 48,000) to continue receiving an undiminished hold harmless distribution (that is, an "applicable maximum distribution") from the state if the municipality or county has not imposed a hold harmless gross receipts tax. Other municipalities and counties (both the large municipalities and counties and the small municipalities and counties that have imposed a hold harmless gross receipts tax) will receive a hold harmless distribution equal to the lesser of (1) the applicable maximum distribution minus receipts from the hold harmless tax or (2) the applicable maximum distribution reduced by the phase-out percentage for the period.

Title: STATE GROSS RECEIPTS AND HOLD HARMLESS TAX CHANGES

Summary: (Related to 2014 SB 87) Decreases the state gross receipts tax; reduces the amount of municipal or county hold harmless gross receipts tax that may be imposed; repeals the hold harmless distributions to municipalities and counties.

Title: REGIONAL WATER UTILITY AUTHORITY ACT

Summary: Authorizes the creation of regional water authorities to enhance activities related to waterworks, wastewater facilities, storm water management strategies, flood control, erosion, pollution and solid waste disposal. Defines key terms with respect to the act, including an "entity," by which is meant a political subdivision, corporate entity or tribal government that provides water or wastewater services.

Tax credit of up to \$4,000 (energy) and up to \$1,000 (indoor water use) varies depending on degree of improvement in efficiency.

Requires itemization of certain deductions and exemptions. Provides a \$500,000 (GF) appropriation to Taxation and Revenue Department.

The bill contemplates existing communications technology as well as possible future advances.

Adds the definition of "growler" to the act, meaning a clean, refillable, resealable container having a liquid capacity not exceeding one gallon, and that is intended for the sale of beer, wine or cider for off-premise consumption.
