

**Councilors, Mayor and City Manager,**

I am scheduled to give the Council a report at your February 10<sup>th</sup> Council meeting but before that, I want to take a moment and brief you on the developing situation associated with capital outlay funds for the current session as well as to give you an interim report. Following the section on "Capital Outlay," the "City's Priorities" are listed along with corresponding legislative action that has taken place such as bill introduction, bill number, etc. Then, under "Targeted Legislation," you will see listing of bills along with a brief description, location, sponsor, etc. that we are specifically working on and in communication with the City Manager on. These bills range from Hold Harmless to having GRT switched from point of contractor place of business to where services performed. Two bills in particular that we are tracking are the Police Return to Work bill and the Curfew bill which I have provided a more extensive briefing of in the last section titled "Highlighted Bills." Finally, the full tracking system that you Lobbying Team is utilizing to track legislation is provided. Please let me know of any questions you might have and barring any important committee hearings, I will see you on the 10<sup>th</sup>!

### **CAPITAL OUTLAY**

There are two revenue sources that are used for capital outlay funding. The first source is from general obligation bonds (GOB) that are approved by voters during the general election every other year. Every two years, the legislature passes a GOB bill that includes the projects put forth to the voters the following November for approval. This year, the City has a number of priorities associated with our senior centers in the GOB bill. The sources of funds for GOB are not as much at risk as STB funds, but we still need to lobby those projects important to the city.

The second source comes from the severance tax permanent fund, which is derived from taxes generated from oil and gas and other natural resources that are severed from the ground in New Mexico. Generally, the legislature allocates a portion of these severance taxes each year to fund Severance Tax Bond (STB) capital outlay projects throughout the state.

This year, the estimated severance tax revenues that fund STB capital outlay are extremely low, primarily due to the decrease in oil and gas prices and other tax revenues collected by the state. The most recent projected revenues for the next fiscal cycle have been revised downward from December from \$140 million to \$123 million. Please keep in mind that that it is likely that less than half of that funding will be allocated for local projects.

STB capital outlay is the source of funds that are tapped to fund the city's traditional capital outlay priorities, including our top priority (airport) and our District priorities. Over the next several weeks encompassing the legislative session, we will be working closely with our delegation to ascertain the potential for STB capital outlay funding given the situation with oil and gas revenues in the state, as they explore various scenarios and as your government relations team offers our own.

## **Highlighted Bills**

To highlight a few of the bills in the "Targeted" Tracking System that the Lobbying Team are particularly working on; here is a greater description and analysis of those bills:

### **HB29 - LOCAL OPTION CURFEW BILL**

Sponsored by Representative Nate Gentry (R-Bernalillo) would give the governing body of a county or municipality the authority to adopt a curfew ordinance to regulate actions of children between midnight and 5:00 a.m. and to regulate the actions of children during daytime hours on school days. Exemptions are provided for work and other bona fide activities. Children may be taken into protective custody if a parent or guardian cannot be contacted and the safety and well-being of the child is of concern.

- The House Judiciary committee gave a do pass recommendation. A large number opponents appeared in opposition, including, SWOP, public defenders, criminal defense attorneys and New Mexico Voices for Children. Bill Jordan, of New Mexico Voices for Children, said that the bill “Punishes children and it’s racial profiling.” According to other opponents, the police will use this as an excuse to arrest children. Others said it would interfere with parental rights. Representatives Cathrynn Brown (R-Eddy) raised some concerns about the bill and about the phrase “regulating the actions of children.”
- Jacqueline Christensen testified in favor the bill saying that local communities can best determine for themselves if they need a curfew ordinance. This is a local bill and no one is forcing communities to do this. Also, this is a safety issue for our children as well as the community as a whole. There are a number of exemptions that address the concerns of children who have the legal right to be out during curfew hours. We urge support and passage of this legislation.

### **HB 171 - AUTHORIZES “RETURN TO WORK”**

House Appropriations and Finance Committee Chair, Larry Larranaga (R-Bernalillo) is sponsoring HB 171 to help solve the problem of shortages of officers in police departments. Mayor Richard Berry and City Attorney Jessica Hernandez have joined Rep. Larranaga in presenting the bill in committees.

- Mayor Berry emphasized that there will be no effect on PERA resulting from changes he made to the bill after last year’s non-starter. The bill is in good shape now, and should get the nod from the legislature, but it has a tough climb as it makes it way out of the House to the Senate. The bill goes to the House Appropriations and Finance Committee next.
- Terri Cole testified in favor, saying, “This is one path to bringing our police forces up to full capacity. It’s not good for our communities or our business climate to have inadequate law enforcement personnel on duty. This bill leaves the decision to each local government and there’s no harm to the pension fund. This is a tool we need and we urge your support of this bill.”

HB 171 would add an exemption to the Public Employee Retirement Act (PERA Act) to allow certain retired police officers to return to work and continue to collect their pensions. According to the Fiscal Impact Report, the bill:

- Applies only to law enforcement officers that retired on or before December 31, 2015;
- Requires a 90-day break in service as an employee or contractor prior to reemployment;
- Allows the rehired officer to collect a pension with COLA and salary while reemployed;
- Does not allow the rehired officer to accrue additional pension benefits while reemployed;
- Requires nonrefundable employee and employer contributions while reemployed;
- Restricts the reemployment period to no more than five years from date of rehire;
- Gives the senior-most-ranking officer sole discretion to select retirees for rehire; and
- Requires a class A county or municipality in a class A county to rehire officers only for ranks below sergeant and the rehires must not exceed 10 percent of the police force (existing employees rehired before the date of the act do not count against that total).

Because the bill is limited to existing retirees as of December 31, 2015 and because the retired officer and employer make contributions to the fund without any additional accrual of pension benefits to the officer, there is no net actuarial impact to the fund. HB 171 contains an emergency clause, which means, if passed by two-thirds of the members of each house present and voting, the bill takes effect immediately upon signature by the Governor.
