Worked closely with tribal religious leaders, government officials, and the tribal community on issues surrounding cultural resources management, language preservation and a process for administering repatriation. With grant funding, conducted research and accumulated a collection of historic photographs (including a digitized format). Initiated research and developed a strategy for managing the Pueblo's permanent collection of material culture and historic records/documentation. Managed the Pueblo's objective to perform a comprehensive historic structures assessment of the San Esteban del Rey Mission and Convent, the largest known adobe structure in the United States. Launched a nine-year preservation initiative for the stabilization and restoration of the Mission and Convent upon acquiring designation of the structures as a Save Americas Treasures site and a Historic Property of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Developed and established the Pueblo of Acoma Historic and Cultural Preservation Fund (PAHCPF) to support and sustain the community-based preservation projects. Developed all tribal policies for historic structures preservation, Repatriation, and other facets related to Cultural Resources Management. Established the AHPO Advisory Board and provided training to both the Board members and other key AHPO personnel. Established partnerships with national and international organizations and agencies to promote the unique efforts of the Pueblo in order to secure the necessary financial and technical support for the Pueblo's cultural preservation initiatives.

- Established tribal policy for the care and preservation of the Pueblo's cultural resources.
- Provided a process for creating awareness, building support, and fostering dialogue within the tribal community on this very new and "Western-based" idea of cultural and historic preservation.

Monique Anair currently serves as an Assistant Professor in Film Production and Media Studies and a Coordinator for economic development in the Grants and Contract Training Department at Santa Fe Community College (SFCC), on the board of The Masters Program Early College Charter School and as an adjunct professor at the Institute for American Indian Art. During her tenure with Santa Fe Community College (SFCC) she helped create and implement the Film Technician Training Program (FTTP) that actively trained film technicians for the state of New Mexico between 2005 and 2009. She led the development in 2009 of an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree in Film at SFCC. Over 500 New Mexicans have participated in the FTTP with over 100 students completing their AAS degrees. Monique has initiated two articulation agreements for bachelor degree pathways for New Mexicans; A BFA with the Institute for American Indian Arts and an accelerated BA program with the Seattle Film Institute. Most recently Monique has worked with local, state and federal government grants leveraging funding for training and education in the fields of media, computer science and information technology. Monique completed her Master of Arts in Education Leadership and Community Organizations at the University of New Mexico in 2013. At Santa Fe Community College she teaches cinematography, media and the environment, women make media, and video production.

Monique's personal film work has spanned commercial videography and film to social media creation. Experimental and documentary work. Upon graduating from Emerson College in 1994, Monique began her career as a camera assistant in Boston before moving to Los Angeles where she worked as a camera technician and underwater cinematographer and was a member of Behind the Lens (BTL) an organization dedicated to helping women in technical jobs receive recognition and access to organizations like the American Society of Cinematographers (ASC). In Los Angeles she worked with Sandy Butler, Vilma Gregoropulous, and Michelle Ohayon among many others. She has received awards for cinematography from the Willamette Film Festival, Sedona Film Festival and the Houston Film Festival. In 1996 through 1998 Monique worked for Clairmont Camera International training camera technicians in Canada during the rise of film incentives in that country.

In 1999 Monique began work with the Moving Image Arts department at the College of Santa Fe and taught with Professor Deborah Fort in the GirlsFilmSchool summer program until 2004. At CSF Monique taught beginning production classes and helped produce numerous low budget films and music videos. In 2004 she freelanced in grip, electric and camera work, primarily with Serious Grippage and Light Company until the birth of her son in 2005. In 2007 Monique brought the GirlsFilmSchool curriculum to Santa Fe Community College as the Girl's Media Workshop, reducing costs and raising scholarships to make the program accessible to local women.

Monique's newest work includes; an international student collaboration called MoCo360 that brings together students from Santa Fe, New Zealand, Bogota, Paris and the UK to create media for mobile use. Through this program students share the different social outlooks they are experiencing in their countries in real time; a pilot program, New Mexico Film Academy, that will serve first time filmmakers statewide by providing intensive mentorship, high-end technology and focused financing; dual credit girls media curriculum with high schools in New Mexico to provide female-centric technology and storytelling education; and working with a consortium of educators in higher education to develop an

underrepresented voices curriculum for the state of New Mexico. This group has received a summer 2015 fellowship for their work with the Women's International Study Center.

Monique's pro-bono work includes; *Vice President* for Los Amigos de Los Luceros, a historical preservation foundation; *Secretary* for the personnel committee at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Santa Fe and; *Education Outreach Coordinator* for the New Mexico Film Resource. She serves on the multiple education focused advisory boards and served as an educator for the 2015 New Mexico Legislative session and the Governor's Media Board in 2012.
