I. Call to Order

Mary Ellen Gonzales, Acting Chair for the Regional Juvenile Justice Board called the meeting to order at 5:15 pm at the CYFD offices, Santa Fe, New Mexico. A quorum was present at the time of roll call.

No formal action required on financial report.

Balance in account is \$172,476.40, awaiting continued billing. CYFD has given the city \$25,000 for restorative justice. The agreement will go to the finance committee by October 23rd and will follow to the governing body for approval.

Ms. Gonzales informed the board that if an award is given to the group she represents, she will resign from the Juvenile Justice Board. There will be a need to appoint a Program Committee Chair in this event.

Gender Specifics is for VOICES and the money is available now. The schools are already running the strengthening families program.

VII. Presentations

A. YRRC – Ted Lovato, Richard DeMella and Shelly Mann-Lev (Exhibit B) Full report is at youthrisk.org

New Mexico Youth Risk and Resiliency Survey were distributed by Mr. DeMella and discussion on page 8 shows the comparison between Santa Fe County and the State in many related areas. Indicators: Unintentional Injury, Violence, Mental Health, Tobacco Use, Alcohol Use, Current Drug Use, Physical Activity, Body Weight and Nutrition and Sexual Behavior.

It was recommended that areas where the trend can be identified should be discussed and brought forward. The response rate for Santa Fe County was 77%. It is about 75% Santa Fe schools, 15% Pojoaque schools, Santa Fe Indian School and some of the Charter schools. Espanola Valley has their own data and the board could request it.

Mr. Jackson asked if we are doing better than last year.
Ms. Mann-Lev will send the trend charts to Mr. DeMella for the Boards review.

Next Monday there will be an open forum at the Geneva Chavez Center sponsored by the Mayor's Office against Bullying. End Bullying! Discussion will be held on services that are available in the city of Santa Fe to help on the problem of bullying, physical and cyber.

B. Truancy – Ted Lovato

Mr. Lovato said that on-going positive communications with SFPS are taking place. SFPS is reporting the truancy cases and the Probation Office is able to intervene on these cases. There is a lot of discussion and collaboration, work which is on-going.

One of the causes of truancy is the life these young people have at home, parents condone the absence.

Ms. Gonzales asked if there is a program or solution for this problem.

Mr. Lovato said they are doing more work to do interventions with our young population. The Probation office is committed to working with these kids and with these families.

Ms. Mann-Lev said that there is a program at SFPS called Attention to Attendance. Ms. Mann-Lev said that this is a report the Juvenile Justice Board may want to request. There are higher expectations and follow up from SFPS.

The ages of kids for truancy are mostly middle school and some high school kids.

C. Communities of Care (COC) Todd Lovato, Shelly Mann-Lev Mr. De Mella talked about Carl Dennis who came to Santa Fe and talked about wrap around service. Santa Fe has wrap around services through day reporting,

Mr. Dennis met with approximately 50 different communities of care providers at the CYFD offices and shared invaluable information. Many examples of safe structures were detailed with a tremendous amount of natural support. There is a good possibility that Santa Fe will be selected as a wrap around cohort. Mr. Dennis talked about kids and families who have been through this program could serve as mentors. In Santa Fe we have a Cadre of young adults who would fit into this young adult mentorship program.

Ms. Gonzales asked; where do we find the money to pay them?

Ms. Mann-Lev said that is a question that will need to be discussed through different collaborative efforts.

Mr. DeMella said COC meets monthly at the Mountain Center on Rufina Street. Mr. DeMella met with the Fire Department and there are firefighters who are more than willing to participate as mentors for this program and make it a safe zone. Judge Marlow has sent 6 kids to Inspire and 1 of them will be mentored by Mayor Gonzales.

VIII. Matters from the Board

A. Engage SFPS

It was noted that Engage started this week; there are approximately 84 students. They are given computers to do their work and are doing E20/20's. The board members requested more information for next meeting.

B. TEP - SFPS

There are 6 students in the program and the teacher in this program comes with high accolades. They are getting their services while attending. Students are doing long term suspensions at TEP. It used to be a program for probation and it is now inclusionary. It is located at the old SER building.

SRO Program: Chief Garcia reported that when he first started with the Police Department he evaluated many programs that were either action or non active. There was a School Resource Office Program - having 2 officers work together in a mentorship. Next week it will go before the Public Safety Committee for approval. It may not be that every middle school has an SRO but it could be by the districts in the city where the schools are located. It is important to build relationships with the principals, students, parents and school representatives. Close scrutiny will take place when making the selection of the two officers who will be selected. Chief Garcia will seek a report once a week; it will help truancy, it will help prevent teachers not performing in line, etc. Chief Garcia has experience in obtaining funding during his term in Rio Arriba County he created the RACE program and brings promising fund opportunities for this program. Latefah Phillips, Chief of Staff from SFPS will assist with training for the officers and the partnership with SFPS and the City Police is excellent news.

Mr. De Mella: The MOU for Day Reporting is going to Finance on Monday and to the City Council on October 29th. Mr. DeMella would like for the Regional Juvenile Justice Board to attend the City Council Meeting together with the Children and Youth Commission which will show the collaboration of both groups to meet goals and objectives. Children and Youth Commission is a good demonstration of shared services.

New Mexico Youth Risk and Resiliency Survey Participation in Santa Fe County High School (Grades 9-12)

The response rate for Santa Fe County was 77%.

A high response rate produces survey results that are more representative of the student population. A response rate of at least 60% allows generalization of results to the entire student body. A response rate of 70% is excellent and allows a high degree of confidence in results. Response rates below 60% are considered low, and caution should be exercised in interpreting results. Low response rates indicate that the data may represent only students who participated in the survey and not necessarily the entire student body.
