CONSENT CALENDAR DISCUSSION

10(i) REQUEST FOR APPROVAL OF PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$35,000 – ADMINISTRATIVE HEARING SERVICES FOR PARKING DIVISION; ANTHONY TUPLER, ATTORNEY AT LAW. (SARA SMITH)

Councilor Rivera said Chief Gallagher did an RFP with this attorney early on.

Chief Gallagher asked if he is speaking of one of our hearing officers, and Councilor Rivera said yes.

Councilor Rivera asked Chief Gallagher if he recalls the scope of the contract.

Chief Gallagher said it was as a hearing officer for the DWI Forfeiture hearings.

Councilor Rivera asked Chief Gallagher if his use of Mr. Tupler for the DWI program is the same as that of the Parking Division's use of Mr. Tupler.

Chief Gallagher said since he hasn't seen the scope of work for the Parking Division proposal, he can't say, but based on what he knows he said, "I can't see the two things crossing."

Councilor Rivera said this is one of his concerns.

Councilor Rivera said Mr. Correia is piggy-backing from the same RFP and asked if the scope is the same or comparable.

Mr. Correia said no, it would not be so. He said he understands the difference is that the DWI Forfeiture Program are criminal hearings, while the Parking Division citation appeals are non-criminal. He would defer to the City Attorney for clarification.

Councilor Rivera said since they are different scopes, "can you really use the same RFP to do both PSAs."

Ms. Brennan said, "This scope is to act as a hearing officer, and just as a judge who hears many kinds of cases, both criminal and civil, the hearing officer brings to bear the judgment of a judge essentially, so it fundamentally is the same scope from that viewpoint, even though they are addressing.... a judge might hear a murder case one day, and a contract case another day. It's the same kind of distinction."

Councilor Rivera asked Ms. Brennan if she is comfortable with this, and Ms. Brennan said yes.

Councilor Rivera asked if there would be situations where the same hearing officer may be hearing a case for the same person, so possibly for Parking, and possibly something to do with a DWI.

Ms. Brennan said, "Under those circumstances, the Hearing Officer would be subject to the ethical rules applicable to an attorney, and would, if there were any conflict, recuse him or herself."

MOTION: Councilor Rivera moved, seconded by Councilor Trujillo, to approve this request.

Councilor Harris said Ms. Ladd made the corrections he requested, but that isn't his question today. He said he has questions for Ms. Brennan regarding Professional Liability coverage. He said that coverage is required of the contractor for these agreements, noting it is on packet page 11. He said neither the Housing Trust nor Homewise indicates this coverage. He said this needs to be resolved at some point in the future. He said he is familiar with this kind of coverage. He said we can't resolve this tonight, noting there are certain categories where we may not need to require that coverage. He said it isn't being provided, so it's not as if we're paying for something we don't need.

Ms. Brennan said, "In fact, I think you're right. I'm going to have to get further information for you. But there is a waiver process, and I believe typically we run it by our Risk Manager who runs it by our insurer to get approval to do that. And in most cases, as you know, it's not something we would waive for an engineer doing a structural design, obviously. But there are circumstances where it's not really relevant, the risk is minimal and our insurance would cover it, or there is no liability under the circumstances. So I can learn the details of that process and review them with you."

Councilor Harris said that would be appropriate, commenting we have a gap from what we are saying we require consistent with the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, and it seems it's not being provided on a series of agreements.

MOTION: Councilor Trujillo moved, seconded by Councilor Harris, to approve this request.

Disclosure by Councilor Maestas: Councilor Maestas said, "I pulled this, even though it is a request to publish. If you look at the Memo, the first paragraph under Background, Legal Counsel Bryan Biedscheid, that represents the BAHL Revocable Trust involved in this transaction, is the attorney for my father's estate. My father's estate is still active, so I will be recusing myself. And I know this went before previous committees and I don't recall this level of detail when we were asked for conceptual approval, but I would like to ask staff if you see kinds of any actions involving this particular attorney if you would alert me. And I'll keep you apprised of my father's estate. So anyway, I pulled it to recuse."

MOTION: Councilor Trujillo moved, seconded by Councilor Rivera, to approve this request.

11. REQUEST FOR APPROVAL OF APPLICATION FOR EDWARD BYRNE MEMORIAL JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAM FOR FISCAL YEAR 2016; ELIGIBLE FOR \$19,631 FOR PURCHASE OF 30 BODY WORN CAMERAS FOR FIELD OFFICERS. (CHIEF GALLAGHER)

Chief Gallagher said he is requesting permission to accept a grant for \$19,631. It is a federal grant, the Edward Byrne Grant, through the Department of Justice. He said it is the intent to use these funds to purchase an additional 30 body worn cameras for the officers in the SFPD, to help with evidence collection and prosecution purposes. He said additionally, studies have shown that body worn cameras do reduce complaints in officers and the use of force by officers as well. He said they are very close to equipping the officers with body worn cameras. He said currently we have in our possession122 body worn cameras, a sufficient number to equip all patrol officers and supervisors with the cameras.

Chief Gallagher continued, saying there were issues with the IT server, and IT was helpful in resolving those, and the server is now ready to go. He said the last thing holding this up is the policy they are writing to address body worn cameras. He said the Department of Justice just came out with a suggested body worn camera policy and they are modeling the SFPD policy after that one. He said it took a while going back and forth with Legal, we are looking at it this week with a couple more questions for legal. He said hopefully they can roll out that policy in the next two weeks, start the training for the officers and equip them with the cameras. He said the grant funds will allow everyone in the Department to be equipped with a camera.

Councilor Maestas said there was discussion several months ago about the status of the raw video feed, stuff that really isn't useful in terms of what is recorded by the officers. He said he assumes the proposed policy will addresses that, and what is and is not fit for public consumption.

Chief Gallagher said the rules for what the officers can and should record versus what they should not record are very clear, and there is room for redaction of certain things, and if specific to a case, it will be necessary to get the approval of the City Attorney's Office. He said it also covers things that are captured accidentally which can be redacted as well.

Councilor Maestas said in discussing a security contract, one of our current providers has servers in his office – Chavez Security. So Chavez houses video and apparently we use it only if there is any kind of criminal activity in prosecuting the crime. He asked if there should be a policy regarding that video if it is potentially going to be used for law enforcement if a crime is committed at one of the various locations where we do have cameras and are recording.

Chief Gallagher asked if he is referring to the footage captured by Chavez Security in the parks.

Councilor Maestas said yes, and the fact that it is housed on a City server located at Chavez Security. He wants to make sure that is covered in the policy if appropriate.

Chief Gallagher said the policy is specifically just for the body worn cameras. He said if we have on-line access to the server at Chavez Security and there is a crime reported at a certain location, we can tap-in and look at it, and we would take it, make a copy of it. Once that is done, it is bound by evidence procedures, and it wouldn't be destroyed or get rid of it. He said footage related to a criminal case it is bound by a separate procedure because it is now evidence.

MOTION: Councilor Trujillo moved, seconded by Councilor Rivera, to approve this request.

DISCUSSION: Councilor Dominguez said he stands in support of this request, but he has questions. He wants to be sure the public knows what is happening with regard to the body cameras. He asked what are the numbers for the 80% coverage, noting the narrative indicates that about 80% of the field officers can utilize the equipment, and if that means a certain number are required to wear the cameras.

Chief Gallagher said currently, they have 122 cameras, so once the policy is signed-off on, all patrol officers and Sergeants will have them. He said the 80% reflects the entire department, and some of the upper ranking personnel wouldn't have them. He said the Detectives are a separate matter and are using a different camera system, but he wants to, eventually, equip them with the same camera system as the patrol is using. He said the vendor has told him there may be different types of cameras in which Detectives may be more interested and easier to use. He said Detectives have a different job from patrolling. So it might be a different camera but with the same vendor, same server in terms of compatibility.

Councilor Dominguez asked, in terms of who will wear the cameras, and what kinds of cameras, if that will be part of the policy that is coming forward.

Chief Gallagher said yes, and it is close to being completed.

Councilor Dominguez asked if there are any officers currently wearing the body cameras.

Chief Gallagher said 10-15 were given as a pilot project from Digital Ally. He said we also still have the audio belt recorders and the in-car dash camera recorders.

Councilor Dominguez asked if these are all used on patrol and Chief Gallagher said yes.

Councilor Dominguez said, in terms of the policy, what are the plans for the public to know what the policy says. He thinks the public needs to know what the City's policy is in terms of how the cameras are being used, who wears them, and the operation. He asked if the policy will come to the Governing Body for approval.

Chief Gallagher said it wasn't his intent to bring the policy for approval.

Councilor Dominguez said he isn't suggesting that be done, and since he isn't a police officer or in that realm, it would be difficult for him to determine the best policy. He still thinks, however, that the public needs to know the framework for the use of the body cameras, so the public is aware.

Chief Gallagher said they could do a press release to explain this to the public and put it on their Face Book page.

Councilor Dominguez said that's a good start, but thinks there will need to be more public outreach. He reiterated he thinks the public has the right to know exactly how the body cameras will be used so there are no surprises. He supports the initiative, which he thinks is good for transparency.

Chief Gallagher said the officers are anxious to get these going, and "are looking forward to it."

Councilor Rivera said he read an article recently about officers turning off the cameras once they were off the clock, while in take-home vehicles. He said they ran into issues in a take home vehicle where they were involved in police activities. He hopes that is addressed in the policy as well – if they are going to be engaging in police activities that the camera is then turned on.

Chief Gallagher said one of the good things in that situation is because they went with the same vendor, Digital-Ally, they do sync with the in-car camera system. So in that circumstance if the officer had activated the in-car emergency equipment, it would have turned on the body camera automatically as well. This is one of the reasons they went with that vendor.

Ms. Brennan said, "In Executive Session at the Special meeting on the twenty-third, I provided background to the members present in order to address follow-up to the Cease and Desist letter we had addressed to the Nature Conservancy on May 12, 2016. That background included a summary of the Living River Ordinance, the Santa Fe River Target Flow Ordinance, the Administrative Procedures, and a building permit, a certain plan included in a Building Permit that was approved on February 29, 2012. All of those were approved on February 29, 2012, after a significant amount of input and discussion."

Ms. Brennan continued, "We reviewed the provisions of the Administrative Procedures that were applicable to flows on the upper River during the low-flow season and also the seasonal flows that were directed further downstream, to downstream user. We reviewed an Agreement and Release ceding operational control of the Diversion Facility to the City. We reviewed the target hydrograph for the year and the pulses, and we reviewed some photographs that showed the flow at the diversion structure into the preserve on two specific dates, one of which showed the water flowing in over sandbags and another one a week showing the sandbags removed."

Ms. Brennan continued, "We discussed, generally, the needs of the downstream acequias and our duty to provide water to those acequias under court orders. We discussed the structure of the Diversion Facility and how the permit indicated it was intended to operate. And based on information the Council discussed a number of my options outlined, and gave direction."

Mayor Gonzales said, "And obviously today, we were notified publicly that the first initial direction was to engage in conversations with the Nature Conservancy."

Ms. Brennan said, "Correct, and that initial discussion took place."

Mayor Gonzales said, "I think if you can, to the degree possible, expand a little bit on the statement that was issued earlier in terms of next steps with the Nature Conservancy, I think it would be appropriate to offer some of that input for the record."

Ms. Brennan said, "We agreed to continue discussions. Our discussions were very cordial. We had agreement on... actually, I would say on all the points, and agreed to work on any agreements that we needed to make any lack of clarity clear. But I think that our readings of the Ordinance, the Administrative Procedures and the Division structure itself and how it should be constructed, we agreed on those things. And we agreed to meet again and begin to formalize the discussion in about a week or a week and a half."

Councilor Maestas said part of this issue was a matter of communication and he thinks we did discuss this. He asked the City Manager to come up with some guidelines, or at least reinforce the need for staff to be responsive to any kind of inquiry or telephone call from the public, if they are not able to answer an initial call. He said, "And if there is a level of urgency, that they do basically move it up above their pay grade, and even if it comes to voice-mail etiquette that any key staff in a key decision-making capacity indicate an alternate phone number to call if that person gets their voice mail. I think you follow if we can somehow reinforce the important of communication to avoid these issues from escalating."

Mr. Snyder said will do that to reinforce with staff, but not to place blame on anybody with the intent of the comment. He said, "I often find that most people from the public don't stop at the first person when they don't receive a call back within an hour, and I'm getting a call one of you is getting a call. Definitely, I stress with all employees that they are out of the office, I'll be out of the office next week, I'll put an out-of-the office message as well as on my voice mail. I understand from talking with Kelley, on getting a debrief of this meeting this afternoon, that this was discussed during the conversation, and moving forward, protocol is for communication with anything revolving around this diversion and the by-pass structure, that are laid out on the discussion in the agreements."

Ms. Brennan said, "That was an important element of our discussion today."

17. COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE GOVERNING BODY

A copy of "Bills and Resolutions scheduled for introduction by members of the Governing Body," for the Council meeting of June 29, 2016, is incorporated herewith to these minutes as Exhibit "1."

Councilor Maestas

Councilor Maestas introduced the following: A Resolution requesting that the Santa Fe Police Department implement a policy of destruction of all firearms in possession of the Police Department that are no longer necessary for use in obtaining a conviction, or are not needed for any other public purpose. A copy of the Resolution is incorporated herewith to these minutes as Exhibit "2."

Councilor Trujillo

Councilor Trujillo expressed condolences to the family of Rebecca Alvarez, daughters Monica, Denise and Elaine, on the passing of their mother Rebecca.

Councilor Trujillo said they are doing new plantings St. Francis Drive and Cerrillos, which look very nice. However, there are weeds all along the entire stretch of Cerrillos Road, as well as in the parks. He said we have an Ordinance allowing for the use of certain herbicides which are legal, and if the Governing Body wants to change that, that is fine. However, until that time, we can use these herbicides. He said there are constituents complaining that "I have weeds bigger than my 6-year old on the side of the road." He understands we don't have the workers we did, and our existing workers are stretched, but he wants to see progress made on the weed problem. He said his District, District #3, has no Sidewalk Angels and neither do Districts #1 and #2.

Councilor Trujillo requested that the City Manager get the contractor working on Cerrillos Road to sweep the debris on Cerrillos where the construction is being done.

Councilor Harris

Councilor Harris said on a personal note, during the past month we had National Gun Violence Awareness Day, and a candlelight vigil for the Orlando incident. He said yesterday, the building where his 25-year old daughter works, was on lockdown in downtown Denver for most of the afternoon. There was a man outside with a gun who eventually was shot and killed by the police. He said this event was close to home, and he is very serious about having a discussion and action regarding gun violence. He supports Councilor Maestas' Resolution. He said he is new to the Council and new to the process, and doesn't know what a local public body such as the City of Santa Fe can accomplish, but he intends to work on this over the course of however long he serves on the Governing Body, and after.

Councilor Lindeli

Councilor Lindell said she would be happy to join Councilor Harris on any of those efforts.

Councilor Lindell said she would bring to everyone's attention that last week we faced what could have been a catastrophic event in the City which was the fire in our watershed. She said, "I think how that was handled, and the end result with that, are all we could have wished for. It was absolutely handled so well, the communication was handled so well." She said we stub our toes on small things that happen sometimes and get focused on the minutiae compared to what a raging fire would have meant in the watershed. She said a lot of people need a pat on the back, she is proud of them, but more than that she is very very thankful.

Mr. Snyder said at the July 13th Council meeting, he has scheduled a joint presentation/briefing from the U.S. Forest Service and City staff to give a run-down on events. How the swift action of the Forest Service largely, and the support of our Atalaya Hand Crew kept the fire to 7½ acres. He said the rain helped tremendously, but a tremendous amount of effort and resources were put into that area. He had a debriefing with the U.S. Forest Service Representative Sandy Hurlocker earlier this week who will be speaking at the Council meeting. He said the message was because of our partnership with the Forest Service, and all the pro-active work we've done in the watershed and everything we do as a community, the Forest Service was able to access the fire, get it under control easily. He said we had the relationship and resources available from the Atalaya Hand Crew to help however necessary. It truly was a a joint effort, and Mr. Hurlocker will speak more of the details at the Council meeting.

Councilor Lindell said, "See you all on the Plaza on July 4th for the Pancake Breakfast."

Mayor Gonzales

Mayor Gonzales said he won't be attending the Council meeting on July 13th, to hear from Mr. Hurlocker. He said the relationship and knowledge of the lack of forest health brought swift and vast resources together, which were unprecedented in terms of helicopters and hotshot crews fighting a 5 acre fire. He said because of the mobilization and good luck with the rain, they were able to buy time to protect

our watershed. He said if the fire had started 1-2 weeks ago when the winds were high, and it was hot and with no rain, it could have been a very very different result. He said the monies that would have come to us are being used to fight other fires in the west and none of it is making its way into prevention. He said he would like to see a community discussion, led by Public Safety Chair Rivera, of what we need in terms of resources to make a larger impact on the protecting the watershed.

Mayor Gonzales said, with regard to the issue of gun violence, we have to figure out what action we can take, because we are so limited by what is happening at the federal level. He said other cities are embarking on unconventional programs. He said, for example, the City of Anaheim, California, is promoting its new branding of being a "City of Kindness" and working to promote values that diffuse hate. He said we need to look at a lot of things to see how we can protect our community from gun violence, including gun locks, education and prevention programs.

Mayor Gonzales introduced the following:

- 1. A Resolution designating an Environmental Officer to conduct environmental reviews and public notification of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG] projects funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development [HUD]. A copy of the Resolution is incorporated herewith to these minutes as Exhibit "3."
- 2. A Resolution urging the United States Senate to fulfill its constitutional duty to provide advice and consent on the nomination of Judge Merrick Garland to the Supreme Court of the United States. A copy of the Resolution is incorporated herewith to these minutes as Exhibit "4."

Councilor Dominguez

Councilor Dominguez said there will be a Public Hearing on the Governing Body Procedural Rules at the Finance Committee meeting on July 18, 2016, and that item will return to the City Council for consideration at its meeting on July 27, 2016.

Councilor Dominguez asked Mr. Snyder to ask Matt Ross prepare a press release to this effect to notify the public, and post that on the website and asked that he friend him on Face Book so he can post it there as well, commenting perhaps the Mayor can share it on Twitter.

Councilor Dominguez said, with regard to the weeds on Paseo del Sol West, he wants to create a conversation with the City Manager via email on how to deal with that.

Councilor Dominguez said "Ditto on the Fire up at the watershed. Thank you for mentioning that." He recognized previous Governing Bodies for the work they did to make sure that, especially, the lower portion of the watershed is protected. He said the fire could have been a lot worse. He said there is still a lot of work that needs to be done.

Councilor Dominguez told Mr. Snyder, with regard to the Villa Consuelo Senior Center, it would behoove the City to make sure City staff and contractors are all on the same schedule and on same page as to how those projects need to get done.

Councilor Dominguez said he has seen no advertisement of the Triathalon. He said, generally speaking, we need to do a little more to advertise some of the recreational activities in the City.

Councilor Dominguez wished Councilor Renee Villarreal a Happy Birthday on July 4th. He said she is still the youngest Councilor.

Councilor Villarreal

Councilor Villarreal thanked Councilor Harris for sharing the personal story, because most of us see gun violence at a distance, but when it hits home it becomes real. She shares his concern and will be meeting the Mayor and some of the advocates about what we can do. However, she said we need to push our State Representatives to look at this in the coming session to set the parameters and be a role model for the local level.

Councilor Villarreal asked to cosponsor Councilor Maestas's Resolution.

Councilor Villarreal said the rooftop party tomorrow night has changed location because of the rain and will be moving to the Santa Fe Brewing Company.

Councilor Rivera

Councilor Rivera thanked everyone for covering for him for the past 3 weeks while he was in Boston. He said it was a great experience, and he would recommend it to everybody who can swing it and take 3 weeks off work. He said the tuition is expensive, and being away from home is hard, but it is a great experience. He recommended people do it if there is the opportunity, and offered to help other Councilors with the paperwork, noting the Mayor is attending in July.

Councilor Rivera wished his daughter Emily a Happy Birthday who will be 17 on July 5th.

15	WHEREAS, the Constitution of the United States provides that the Senate shall provide
16	advice and consent for appointments to the Supreme Court of the United States; and
17	WHEREAS, the Senate's constitutional duty to advise and consent on judicial nominees is
18	one of its most important and solemn responsibilities; and
19	WHEREAS, the Senate has confirmed more than a dozen Supreme Court justices in
20	presidential election years, including five in the last 100 years; and
21	WHEREAS, the Senate has confirmed justices in presidential election years in which the
22	executive and legislative branches of government were divided between two political parties,
23	including Justice Anthony Kennedy's confirmation in 1988; and
24	WHEREAS, the Senate Judiciary Committee has never denied a Supreme Court nominee a
25	hearing since it began holding pubic confirmation hearings; and

WHEREAS, if the Senate refuses to consider a Supreme Court nominee until after the next President is sworn into office, it will result in the longest Supreme Court vacancy caused by Senate inaction since the Civil War; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court serves an essential function resolving critical questions of law that affect our community, its economy, and its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the President has nominated Merrick Garland, Chief Judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, who "has earned a track record of building consensus as a thoughtful, fair-minded judge who follows the law;" and

WHEREAS, Judge Garland is well qualified and has more judicial experience than any Supreme Court nominee in history; and

WHEREAS, forcing the Supreme Court to function with only eight justices risks creating numerous instances in which the Court is evenly divided on the outcome of a case, preventing the Court from resolving conflicting interpretations of the Constitution among different regions of the Nation, thereby undermining the Supreme Court's role as the final arbiter of the law; and

WHEREAS, every Supreme Court nominee who was not withdrawn by the President has received an up-or-down vote within 125 days or President's nomination announcement; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court vacancy caused by the death of Justice Antonin Scalia occurred on February 13, 2016, 269 days before the 2016 presidential election, and since 1975, the average number of days from nomination to confirmation vote for a Supreme Court nominee has been 70 days.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE urges the United States Senate to fulfill its constitutional duty to provide advice and consent on the nomination of Judge Merrick Garland to the Supreme Court of the United States.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governing Body urges the Senate to:
