MINUTES OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMITTEE Wednesday, February 1, 2017

1. CALL TO ORDER

A meeting of the Public Utilities Committee was called to order by Councilor Christopher M. Rivera, Chair, at approximately 5:00 p.m., on Wednesday, February 1, 2017, Environmental Services Division, 114 Siler Road, Building A, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM THE DECEMBER 7, 2016 AND JANUARY 4, 2017 PUC MEETINGS.

MOTION: Councilor Maestas moved, seconded by Councilor Trujillo, to approve the minutes of the meetings of December 7, 2016 and January 4, 2017, as submitted.

VOTE: The motion was approved unanimously on a voice vote.

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

6. MONTHLY UPDATE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS (NICK SCHIAVO)

A copy of a *Public Utilities Project Status Report FY 16-17 Water Division*, is incorporated herewith to these minutes as Exhibit "1."

Mr. Schiavo highlighted information in Exhibit "1." Please see Exhibit "1," for specifics of this presentation.

Councilor Maestas noted Item #17 was removed from the Agenda, and believes there is \$5 Million in CIP reallocation funds to be used to defease the bonds. He asked if there will be any impact to our Capital Improvement Program for Water and Wastewater.

Mr. Schiavo said yes. If they borrow those funds and fail to pay them back there absolutely will be an impact to the Water Division. He said he hasn't seen a breakdown of the amount they intend to pull from Environmental Services, Water and Wastewater. He said, as discussed in previous budgets, we should be able to handle all our operating with the revenue coming in, roughly \$35 million in revenue we'll see this year, and about \$35 million in operating. He said the projected CIP for Water is just less than \$16 million for next year and they can handle all of that with the existing funds. He said they should be able to do that for the next fiscal year and the fiscal year following. He said at that point, they will have to look at a rate increase, because we start to approach our required reserves. The required reserves for Water this past fiscal year, were about \$18 million, and this year about \$16 million, noting the reserve decreased somewhat because we restructured some debt. He said we should have 1½ times the debt service in reserves.

Councilor Maestas said we aren't going to act on Item #17, but that Item is meant to retire G.O. Bonds related to Parks. He said when we adopted the Financial Management principles, one of the principles was alignment. If there are to be any kinds of financial management transactions they have to be related. And this particular transaction is using a lot of Utility Funds, which is what concerns him the most. He said he would ask the Chair to ask the Finance Committee and the sponsor of the proposed legislation to get everybody together – all the appropriate representatives of all the utilities that are being called upon – to help defease these bonds, and look at the proper context of what is being proposed. He asked, if they are going to borrow from balances from certain utility funds, how does that impact the whole actuarial analysis for that enterprise fund. And, if we think we're going to have unspent CIP funds, what are the impacts to our current CIP Plan.

Councilor Maestas continued, saying the broader question is, if we have so much money on the table, in terms of Capital Improvement Plan Funds, where is the bottleneck in the City. Do we not have a mature enough, capable enough project management capacity. Or is it the industry. He is hearing both. He said, "I know this is not the right time to really discuss that, but I think, since we're on the topic of CIP, I really think we need to have a broader discussion about this big Defeasance Plan and the use of utility funds and the impact to the CIP, and the impact to the whole actuarial analysis of the enterprises."

Chair Rivera said he will sit with Mr. Schiavo and talk to the Finance Committee, and have those discussions.

Chair Rivera said the anaerobic digester is 90% complete with the design process which leaves about \$463,000, and asked Mr. Jones if that will be sufficient funds to complete the project once the design is finished.

Shannon Jones, Director, Wastewater Treatment Division, said the remaining balance in the fund is going to be used for Construction Management, so the actual cost of the project for construction of the digesters has not gone out to bid yet, noting it has to be done through a separate contract. He said the funding Chair Rivera mentioned will be sufficient to finish the project management. He said it is his recollection that last month we went through with an amendment to the contract to add the cogeneration to that project of design. It will take about 3 months to finalize the design the cogeneration. He said, "At which point, it is my intent to include that as a bid alternate for the digester project, and give us the ability to look at the cost of that project and if it is something we can do within the digester construction, or not. Then we will back with those contracts as we get closer."

7. ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES UPDATE. (SHIRLENE SITTON)

A copy of City of Santa Fe Environmental Services 2017 Residential Collection Calendar, is incorporated herewith to these minutes as Exhibit "2," to these minutes.

A packet of information containing proposed Web and Digital Ads, New Mexico Website information, and various other information regarding this effort, is incorporated collectively herewith to these minutes as Exhibit "3." to these minutes.

Shirlene Sitton, Director, Environmental Services Division, reported what is happening in terms of curbside recycling as we count down to the roll-out, beginning March 13, 2017. She said Adam Schlachter and Gilda Montano are the outreach team. She said they have a lot of pieces of outreach to share with the Committee.

Ms. Sitton and Mr. Schlachter reviewed the hand-out items. Please see Exhibits "2," and "3," for specifics of this presentation. She said if people want a pink cart they need to order one right away, because the have only 345 left. She said they bought 1,000, but are releasing only 500 carts. They want to hold some back for a promotion closer to the Breast Cancer Walk, as well as to be sure they have some on hand for replacement.

The Committee commented and asked questions as follows:

- ♦ Councilor Maestas said he ordered the pink cart, noting after he ordered it he was directed to a survey, but it never confirmed his order was received.
 - Mr. Schlachter said they do not confirm those at this time.
- Councilor Lindell asked if these carts are smaller than the regular carts.
 - Ms. Sitton said yes. They will be 65 gallons, noting they are looking to standardize carts at 65-65, which is 130 gallons of capacity, so people will have plenty of room. She said they will be investing in 65 gallon carts for the pay as your throw program, and there will be a variable rate, depending on the size of the trash carts.
- Councilor Lindell asked if we have 2 sizes of carts now.
 - Ms. Sitton said there are a few, but she doesn't know exactly how many 65 gallon trash carts there in the field, but there isn't a different price.
- Councilor Lindell said she gets it, noting she has a small cart, because she has no need to haul the big one. She said, "So the small ones are 65 gallons. Will the recycle bins be the same size.
 - Ms. Sitton said yes, noting they have a few 35 gallon and a few 95 gallon bins coming in, for some of the tighter neighborhoods or for condos that are serve as single family homes, so they can give them a smaller cart "right off the bat."
- ◆ Councilor Lindell said, with regard to the bins, there is no tag line on here that tells her anything to do with them. She knows it's a clever thing, and they want their bin back. She said, "I have no idea what this means. Does the City want me to turn those bins in somewhere. Am I supposed to keep them and do what with them."
 - Ms. Sitton said, "Yes. We will provide a day. We're going to work with our carts at the cart distribution center, and we'll probably provide, at the Siler road drop off site, which will be right near the City drop-off site, we'll have a take-back. But for the most part, I think people will want to continue to keep their bins, especially to transport their glass to the drop-off site."
- Councilor Lindell said that makes perfect sense to her, but she still thinks on this, it's not clear.

Mr. Schlachter said he thinks he is going to modify that glass piece to say, "Use your bin to bring glass to the drop-off site."

♦ Councilor Lindell said as is, you are going to create a lot of phone calls for yourselves that are unnecessary. She said she is just trying to help them out, as someone who has worked in some advertising, to tell them that this is creating a lot of work for you.

Mr. Schiavo asked Ms. Sitton if she will have information as to what the customer can do what to do with their bins in the packet that will come with the new carts.

Ms. Sitton said yes. She said we have an app coming and we will be engaged through the social media as well.

• Councilor Villarreal asked if "old tanglers" is a typical item thrown in the trash.

Ms. Sitton said by tanglers, we mean Christmas lights, wire, rope and things like that.

Mr. Schlachter said when Albuquerque kicked-off its program, it got a significant amount of carbon hoses thrown into the carts, and it wrapped around the MRF equipment, and they had to shut down 14 times in the first month.

♦ Councilor Villarreal said she never heard the term "tanglers," previously, and the only reason she thought about hoses is because there was a picture of it, and she thinks they need to simplify that language.

Ms. Sitton said it's a word they are starting to use to encompass all of the different kinds of things. They will use the word in their outreach and get people to understand what it is.

- Councilor Villarreal said, "I need to get with the waste lingo."
- Councilor Maestas said there are no drop off centers for recycling in the Southeast part of the City and asked if they are still working on that – perhaps at the restaurant along Old Pecos Trail.

Ms. Sitton said they will continue to evaluate and work on establishing more or less centers, as needed. She said they are establishing those on City owned properties, and they have done a fairly comprehensive search and evaluation of City-owned properties where we possibly could put a site.

Councilor Maestas asked if we are ruling out private property.

Ms. Sitton said originally, they were going to go with some private property partners, but they all pulled out. She said we will service those regularly and pick up trash. She said usually the private asks the public to go away after a while. So it's best to stick with City property, but they may end up looking at buying a small amount of property. She said staff will continue to evaluate that possibility.

♦ Councilor Maestas said this is a good start but he still would like to see something in Southeast Santa Fe.

Councilor Lindell asked if we could hear Item #16 next, because she has to leave for another meeting.

MOTION: Councilor Lindell moved, seconded by Councilor Villarreal, to reconsider the previous approval of the Agenda, to hear Item #16 next on the Agenda, and to approve the Agenda as amended.

VOTE: The motion was approved unanimously on a voice vote.

CONSENT DISCUSSION

16. REQUEST FOR APPROVAL TO DETERMINE UNCOLLECTABLE UTILITY ACCOUNTS AND REMOVE FROM ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE FOR THE AMOUNT OF \$2,695,881.82. (CARYN FIORINA) Committee Review: Public Utilities Committee 02/01/17; Finance Committee 02/13/17; and City Council 02/22/17

The Committee commented and asked questions as follows:

Councilor Lindell said on page 3 of the Memo it says, "In 2004, the City changed the ordinance to allow property owners to waive liability for tenant water services." She asked if that means we have no way of collecting old bills from a tenant who vacates the property.

Mr. Schiavo said it is very challenging, noting he has been working with a collection agency, and he and Ms. Fiorina have been talking with them about pricing and what they can do for the City. He said they have not been collecting social security numbers, noting the City

collects a limited amount of information. He said they are telling us the information we have it is very challenging, and once a tenant moves out they're gone and it will be very very difficult to get paid. He said in 2014, we increased the amount required for a deposit, which should help somewhat. He said the old deposit was only \$100 for residential, and by the time we saw what was happening, they were well past their deposit and had left.

Caryn Fiorina, Director, Utility Billing Division, said this is the reason she is asking to incorporate some of those changes which are strict on collecting accounts.

- Councilor Lindell said these suggestions are great ideas. However, if we pass this and put these changes in place, she would like to revisit this in 6 months and see if we need to redo the Ordinance change done in 2004. She thinks it is absolutely irresponsible on our part to allow that amount of write-off for tenants. She said she has owned rental properties in the past and she always paid the water bill, because she didn't want a lien on the property over a water bill. She would then collect from the tenants. She said, "That's the old days. I guess we don't do that any more." She said she is very concerned about this, commenting this is money we are just seeing flying out of the window. She said, "And when I see things like what I saw over at that garage today, we can use that money. If we pass this and implement those changes, I would like to have a report on it in 6 months."
- Councilor Lindell thanked the Committee for allowing her the agenda change.

Councilor Lindell departed the meeting

Councilor Villarreal said she did not realize the number of outstanding accounts, commenting this is mind-boggling. She was trying to figure out the reason we changed it in 2004.

Marcos Martinez, Assistant City Attorney, said he doesn't know history of why it was done then, but he does know there is a statute that basically mandates that if the owner notifies the City in writing that the tenant is going to be responsible for the utility bills, then the City can't basically place the liability for those bills on the owner. He said there elements to this which go on the owner at the time they notify us, going forward – if the tenant leaves, that owner is back on the book. He said some of that wasn't very clear in our Ordinances, and thinks that is the purpose of some of the changes. It is to try to make sure that if a tenant leaves, the owner isn't permanently free from any responsibility for the utilities. It's only with respect to each individual tenant. So every time that happens, the owner has the responsibility to contact the City once again and do that.

Mr. Martinez continued, saying he thinks what happened is that in 2004 the City realized the statute existed on the books and we didn't want our Ordinances to be in conflict with State law, and were trying to comply with the owner notification statute.

 Councilor Villarreal asked Ms. Fiorina to walk her through the current process, asking if the renter has to submit a letter.

Ms. Fiorina said yes they do have to submit a letter.

Councilor Villarreal said she remembers having to do that.

Mr. Martinez said, "The owner should be submitting the letter."

Ms. Fiorina said the owner should submit a Release of Liability form, which puts the account into a tenancy, and the owner no longer has responsibility for that account. She said tracking those accounts has been very difficult, so that is another change they are incorporating into their automated process. This way, they revert the account back to the owner, so they can stay on top of those accounts.

- Councilor Villarreal said this is very important, commenting she was really shocked by the amount to be collected by the City.
- Councilor Maestas said we're privatizing, and we're going to contract the collections. He asked if this changes the protocol and process, or do they just get the referral when the account becomes delinquent.

Ms. Fiorina reiterated it is challenging because we are not collecting social security numbers which we need to do to have success.

 Councilor Maestas said then we may not see any improvement by privatizing our collections.

Ms. Fiorina said they will start sending accounts to collections beginning this month, and then she can report back to the Committee

Mr. Schiavo we now are going to start recording social security numbers.

Councilor Maestas asked what kind of process will be used by the collection agencies.

Ms. Fiorina said they will first write a letter to the account holder, and they then will start making telephone calls trying to collect. She said this is the current process, until we can get something that allows us to report to a credit agency.

Councilor Maestas said, "But the referral comes when it is considered delinquent."

Ms. Fiorina said yes.

Councilor Maestas asked what constitutes a delinquent account.

Ms. Fiorina said they will start with the collection agency with all those accounts not within the statute of limitations that are not closed.

Mr. Schiavo said the City can place a lien if it is owner occupied property. He said once the City places a lien we get their attention and they come in and pay.

Councilor Maestas asked if we can collect the social security numbers retroactively for all existing account holders, or are they grandfathered in.

Ms. Fiorina said the plan is that anytime anyone contacts us we will update their information.

- Councilor Maestas said we are going to hit the reset button by contracting collections. We now need to determine what we can do to ensure this level of write-offs doesn't happen again. He asked what will be the real piece in collections and how can we work effectively with the private sector company that is helping with collections. He wants to get a legal opinion on whether we can start collecting social security numbers from all utility account holders. If we can do that, that's really promising in terms of collections. He noted the collection agency will take 12% of everything they collect.
- Chair Rivera asked Mr. Martinez to report back to the Committee in this regard.

Mr. Martinez said he will do so. He said tenants make up the lion's share of this write-off. If we can collect the information now to allow us to enforce payment we can get their attention.

Ms. Fiorina said they are still working with legal. Her understanding is that we cannot turn them down for service if they refuse to give the information.

Councilor Maestas suggested maybe we can work with the landlords. He said it is now commonplace for them to do a credit and background check, and the tenant agrees to that prior to signing a lease. He said perhaps we could make the landlords accountable since they already collect that information

[Mr. Martinez's response here is inaudible because of noise overlay]

Chair Rivera said Ms. Fiorina said all of these accounts are older than 4 years, and asked what is the oldest account.

Ms. Fiorina said probably from 2000.

- Chair Rivera said then that's 16 years, so it is many years of collections. He said he agrees with Councilor Lindell that, if approved, we need a 6 months update.
- Councilor Maestas said this isn't the first time he's been involved in these kinds of efforts.
- Councilor Villarreal asked if they get a sense that people may stop paying because of financial hardship, and we don't have a tenant system in place to help people to make payments, or a payment plan.

Ms. Fiorina said when someone comes in with a hardship, we can work out a payment arrangement. She said they also have a list of organizations that will help people in need.

Mr. Schiavo said some of the reason we have this much is that we often are a little too kind. He said if the repayment is flexible, and we stretch out payment arrangements, many people get into a position that they are never able to pay it off. He doesn't want to swing too far the other way where we are calling and harassing people. We are going to lower the dollar amount before we start to send out notices. He said this is a lot of money, and the intent is to get it to a more reasonable dollar amount.

Councilor Maestas asked is there any way we could modify the Eye on Water app to give tenants an indication or an alert that their account is not in good standing – some kind of an alternate system to raise the awareness and at least eliminate late payments.

Mr. Schiavo said he can talk with a representative from Badger about that.

MOTION: Councilor Maestas moved, seconded by Councilor Villarreal, to approve this request, with an amendment to have a report back to this Committee in 6 months.

VOTE: The motion was approved on a voice vote, with Chair Rivera, Councilor Maestas, and Councilor Villarreal voting in favor of the motion, none voting against, and Councilor Lindell and Councilor Trujillo absent for the vote.

10. ROBERT GARCIA, NEW MEXICO WASTE/WASTEWATER ASSOCIATION'S OPERATOR OF THE YEAR. (SHANNON JONES)

Mr. Jones said it is his pleasure to introduce Robert Garcia who was honored by the New Mexico Water/Wastewater Association as the 2016 Outstanding Collections Operator of the year. He said Mr. Garcia has been with the City Wastewater Division for 8 years, noting his additional achievements and certifications are listed in his Memo of January 17, 2017. He said Mr. Garcia is a versatile employee and he appreciates the work that he does for the City, and has been recognized state-wise for his work.

Robert Garcia thanked Mr. Jones and J.R. for making it possible for him to accomplish all that he's done.

Chair Rivera thanked him for his great work and for representing the City and his Department so well.

Mr. Jones said Mr. Garcia was able to go to Las Cruces to receive the award and the plaque.

Chair Rivera maybe this could go along with what the Mayor does for the Employee of the Month, noting there is a benefit that comes with that.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION ITEMS

17. DISCUSSION AND RECOMMENDATION TO DEFEASE 2008 GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND, 2004 RAILYARD PHASE I, AND 2006 RAILYARD PHASE II. (CHRISTINA KEYES) Committee Review: Public Utilities Committee 02/01/17; Public Works Committee 02/06/17; Finance Committee 02/13/17; and City Council 02/22/17.

Councilor Maestas said we previously discussed the need for a much better facility. He asked the timeline for a more comprehensive plan for capital improvements, equipment replacement and funding, as well as the likelihood we could beef up our fleet of mechanics. He said this created more questions than answers. He asked staff to be specific as to when we will get a comprehensive plan to address these issues.

Lawrence Garcia, Environmental Services Division, said this request focuses on the maintenance and repair of the vehicles, based on an actual cost and a snapshot of our system – an average of the actual monthly cost. He said they would like to start looking a building a new shop in the next fiscal year, and bring something forward so the numbers would be available at budget time. He said there is a 5-year forecast for CIP, and they want to introduce this into the 5 year forecast so they can try and get it scheduled.

Mr. Garcia continued, saying they are looking to hire 2 FTEs in this fiscal year to create a night shift. He said the software is in our 17/18 budget. He said once that is in place, they will start tracking equipment, noting they will be looking at how they can put together some reserves for vehicle replacement. He said all of this is for the next fiscal year. He said they did budget for the two mechanics bays, 3 different truck lifts, 2 in the new bays and 1 in the existing bay. They also are looking at some training and travel for our mechanics. He said they want to move forward with a second shift before the next fiscal year. They are looking at vehicle replacement as soon as the Budget is approved, noting there is a RFP in place for pricing on vehicles with a timeline allowing him to purchase equipment for an additional year at the end of July. So he has to move forward in June for the approval process to get the additional trucks purchased. It usually takes about 220 days to build the vehicles, so they should have those by February 2018. And beyond that FY, they will be looking at running trucks within the 7-year timeline.

Ms. Sitton said Mr. Garcia did a good job capturing all of that. She said we've come a long way and we have a long way to go.

Councilor Maestas said the next time we have a discussion about rates, he believes we need to look at everything to come up with these funds – perhaps rate stabilization using the Water Enterprise model to come up with an ideal rate structure. He said one of his pet peeves is financing capital assets with a shorter design life than the payment period. He said it is now policy, "Only capital assets or projects with an economic value lasting more than 5 years shall be financed using debt." He wants to make sure we get away from the previous practice.

Mr. Garcia said we currently are buying these out of operations, not going to bond. He agrees with Councilor Maestas and understands where he is coming from. He said they will be looking to reserves to make sure they are following that practice.

Councilor Maestas said the City does not pay tipping fees to SWMA for recycling, but we do for the non-recyclables.

Mr. Garcia said we are paying for glass, but not for commingled recycling.

Councilor Maestas said the cost for commingled recycling is going to increase, noting we just renegotiated the Buckman Lease. He said, as a contingency, we should always look at that and project what it could cost it, and consider that in the model if they change the policy and decide to charge us tipping fees for the next cycle. He said he is on the Board, and guarantees he won't make that suggestion, but it could happen, given the higher rate for the lease and the capital improvements at Buckman. He said they need to come with a compressive plan with those contingencies.

Mr. Garcia said they do a water forecast as well as for Environmental Services and they can bring that forward.

Mr. Schiavo said at the March meeting someone from MWH will be here and the intent is for them to give a presentation, and he can run through everything. He asked when the bond for Environmental Services expires.

Mr. Garcia said the current bond is for the property in the back, so the last bond was repaid. He said we have the new bond from NMFA.

Mr. Schiavo said, regarding tipping fees, just to be clear, somehow the Environmental Services Division was strapped with paying the debt for all of Siler. They also provide free tipping services to many of the other City facilities.

Ms. Sitton said she would reiterate they are still working on their budget, but what you are describing is what they are doing, noting they are moving forward to do a *pro forma* so you can see the kind of things we are asking for.

Councilor Maestas said the City enacted the local option GRTs for Environmental Services, commenting he thinks there is an open increment of 1/16.

Mr. Schiavo said there is no increment left for imposition.

Mr. Garcia believes the agreement was, because Environmental Services was providing solid waste services to all City facilities that is the reason they didn't take the funding away, so it was kind of a wash.

MOTION: Councilor Maestas moved, seconded by Councilor Villarreal, to approve this request.

VOTE: The motion was approved on a voice vote, with Chair Rivera, Councilor Maestas, and Councilor Villarreal voting in favor of the motion, none voting against, and Councilor Lindell and Councilor Trujillo absent for the vote.

MATTERS FROM THE PUBLIC

Lawrence Garcia thanked the Committee members for coming out to the facility today.

MATTERS FROM THE CITY ATTORNEY

There were no matters from the City Attorney.

ITEMS FROM STAFF

Mr. Schiavo provided copies of a Summary of the White Paper, which is marked draft confidential. He said it is a sensitive item not in the packet, because it hadn't yet been provided to the Committee.

Chair Rivera asked Mr. Erdmann to provide a copy of the White Paper to Councilors Lindell and Trujillo.

Andrew Erdmann reviewed the draft White Paper. Please see the White Paper and attachments for specifics of this presentation.

Mr. Erdmann asked members of the Committee to comment on anything in the draft and consider what we should do moving forward with the Resolution. He asked if the Chair would like to hear it at the next PUC meeting, while continuing to move it to Finance and to the City Council, or if there is another route you would like for him to go with the Resolution.

The Committee commented and asked questions as follows:

Councilor Maestas said he concurs with the conclusions of the paper. He said we have made a lot of inroads in working with the County over a lot of long-standing water issues, commenting we're getting down to brass tacks here. He would like to be a part of maybe translating this White Paper into a policy position. He said we can talk about that off line. The only thing he doesn't see in here is perhaps a case study or two. For example, you mentioned the Albuquerque Water Authority, which came to mind when this Resolution came up. He said, to him, it was a hostile takeover of that water system by State legislation which was adverse to the City of Albuquerque, that similarly paid for the entire water system. He thinks proponents of regionalization here are moving in that direction, which concerns him. He thinks the Albuquerque case study should be mentioned in terms of what happened.

Councilor Maestas continued, saying there is also the Pojoaque Basin. He said this is a massive amount of federal funds. He said despite a massive injection of federal funds, there is incredible resistance from rural private well owners. He said even if we were to regionalize and expand and the City became a part of wheeling water to the rural areas, he doesn't see them capping wells, or even wanting to connect. He said asked staff to see if they can find any nuggets in terms of lessons learned from the Pojoaque Basin, even though it isn't built. He said he wants to see Albuquerque included, and perhaps some lessons learned from the Pojoaque Basin project that make us take pause in moving forward with regionalizing our own water system, commenting that would make him feel better. He reiterated that he definitely concurs with the conclusion of the White Paper. He thanked them for doing this in is such a short amount of time. He reiterated that this is something that really concerns him greatly. He said he doesn't know what to do at this point, commenting we have a colleague who is sponsoring this Resolution. He doesn't know what our action was, or the conditions in not addressing it.

Mr. Schiavo said at this point, we are being asked to do public meetings and have a discussion around it. He is bringing this report as promised, as well as to receive direction from the Committee. He understands they just got this 5 minutes ago, but they would appreciate any direction you can give to him, and Mr. Erdmann about how closely you want to follow the tier, or any other information you might need.

- Councilor Maestas said he thinks we should move forward with some kind of policy action when the White Paper is finalized. He said we probably should accept it as the City position in terms of regionalization. However, what we do relative to Councilor Ives' Resolution, he doesn't know. He said if we do it in a series and first establish our position before acting on Councilor Ives' Resolution, to him, that would be a better process. He said we obviously need to talk with Councilor Ives, but there is no way he can support his Resolution at this point, in light of some of the preliminary conclusions of the White Paper.
- Chair Rivera said Councilor Ives' Resolution did not make it through City Council.
 - Mr. Schiavo said that is correct.
- Councilor Rivera said then there only would be meetings if the Resolution were approved. He said he agrees with Councilor Maestas, and he will speak with Councilor Ives. He said he spoke with him briefly, and is unsure this was his intention. He said he had some other ideas about what he wanted in here. If he is willing to rework it, we can do so to try to accomplish what he wants. However, if not, he agrees with Councilor Maestas that he can't support the Resolution as it is.

- Councilor Villarreal asked what was the meeting when we had a discussion about the Resolution.
 - Mr. Schiavo said he believes it was at the Finance Committee meeting.
- Councilor Villarreal said the idea was to have the White Paper, and asked the timeline to get back to this item.
 - Mr. Schiavo said, "It was actually at this meeting to bring the Whiter Paper."

Councilor Villarreal asked other staff in attendance what was their recollection in this regard.

Mr. Erdmann said, "My recollection was that we were actually going to bring the White Paper in front of you and the Resolution at the same time. I realized the first time, I was a little too nervous to realize that wasn't going to work because you wouldn't have actually had a chance to read the White Paper."

Mr. Schiavo said staff certainly said we can take this back to Finance or wait until the March PUC meeting – whatever direction you would like.

- Chair Rivera said he will talk to Councilor Ives to see what direction he wants to take, noting Councilor Ives hasn't seen the White Paper, so he may take a different approach after he sees the it. He said, "If he wants it to go forward, my hope is that it come back first through PUC at its March meeting, and do it up."
 - Mr. Martinez asked for additional time to add the items to the White Paper which were requested to be included by Councilor Maestas in the analysis of the Authority and the Pojoaque Basin Regional Water System. He said he has had some experience with that one. He said we would then need to approve the revised White Paper in final at the next PUC meeting.
- Chair Rivera said he thinks that is a good idea.
 - Mr. Erdmann said he thinks the idea of going into more detail about the Albuquerque Authority is a great idea. He said they had some discussion about the fact that the State needs to have a desire for regionalization, which is one of the issues they address in the matrix, as the fact that they think people didn't want to hook onto the regional system. He said they can try to bring that forward and make it a more dominant part of the White Paper.

Mr. Martinez said the County is making a lot of decisions with respect to the management of the Pojoaque Basin Regional System, that the City hasn't participated in because it's been a County/Pueblo Joint Powers Agreement that is being established. And if we are being consistent with regionalization, the City would have wanted to consider whether the JPA as structured is correct or not, given the City's experience in the utility and the BDD.

Councilor Maestas said he knows the City was part of the lawsuit, but we're not considered a part owner, and we're not going to have any representative on the Authority Board, so what is our skin in that game.

Mr. Martinez said the City is a settlement partner, so we signed a Settlement Agreement in 2010, which we found was affected by the federal legislation, is also called Cost Sharing and Simple [inaudible] Agreement that is part of that too. He said, "I think the primary reason the City is a party to the Settlement Agreement, is that the City has a significant amount of surface water rights in the MPT. We used those water rights as [inaudible] for all of our well pumping. Se we have around 170 afy of surface water rights in the MPT, and we are such a close neighbor to the Pojoaque Basin, we are [inaudible] with something that affects them, affects the surface water, so that is sort of recognized.

Councilor Villarreal asked Mr. Erdmann how he came up with his presumptions.

Mr. Erdmann said the majority of the presumptions are things we have heard brought up numerous times during this conversation. To be totally honest, 1-2 of them I [inaudible] a little bit to be able to shoehorn any information that I really wanted to make sure to get across. The reason he put it in that matrix was to make it easy to reference.

- by an outside group, which he thinks is independent of the City and the County, commenting he thought he forwarded a lot of the documents to "you, right." This isn't just an idea of a City Councilor. This is a very well organized, coordinated effort outside of governments that want to see the water system regionalized. He said, "Make no mistake about it, there is a movement out there, and they're drafting legislation. That's what started the level of organization and the use of State legislation as an option, so the whole PTSD came up from Albuquerque, although he wasn't involved with Albuquerque, I thought, man, that's just not cool. That's not good. So anyway, I think the timing is just right, but I think we really need to follow through on making some kind of a policy statement on the White Paper. I'd like to be a part of it right away, of the sponsors."
- Chair Rivera agreed. He said, "I think, regardless of what Councilor Ives decides to do, I think a policy paper would still be appropriate. I'm supportive as well. Thank you Andrew."

MATTERS FROM THE COMMITTEE

Councilor Maestas said there were recent developments outside the presumptive city limits. There was discussion about connection charges as a disincentive to developments outside the presumptive city limits, and we put everything on hold until we settled some of the outstanding water issues with the County. He asked, "Do we have the green light to maybe pursue some legislation to change those connection fees, and maybe look at other disincentives to developments just outside the City limits."

Mr. Schiavo said Jason Mum of MWH will be at the March meeting to present on the financial status of each of the different divisions. He also will be presenting Utility Expansion Charges, a little bit of a spoiler alert, noting currently the Utility Expansion Charge for water is about \$2,000, and according to Mr. Mumm's standard methods we can charge up to \$5,000 for the water connection. He said he thinks we charge as little as \$500 for the UEC connection to Wastewater, so it depends on the square footage of the home. He said that may provide some discretion to the Council to raise or not raise that rate. He said this would not affect Santa Fe County, because it has its own water system.

Councilor Villarreal asked how the UEC figures into an apartment complex.

Mr. Schiavo said he would have to look at how that is calculated, the number of fixtures per unit.

Councilor Villarreal said, "You're talking about subdivision development."

Mr. Schiavo said he is talking about any development. He said currently, for the developments that have come before Council asking to connect to the Wastewater, the agreement has been that the County will collect those UEC's and give those to the City Wastewater Division. He said those fees are linked to the size of home, and there could be discretion to increase those fees to as much as \$2,000.

Councilor Maestas asked staff if they can look at what other cities have done to leverage that connection. He said many municipalities across New Mexico charge twice the rate for water and wastewater services outside the city limits. He asked if we can levy any additional fees, even if they are remotely related to utilities. He wants to look at these expansion charges as well as the whole rate structure and any other identifiable impacts those developments may pose to the City.

Mr. Schiavo said before the *[inaudible]* Authority was formed, the City of Albuquerque was charging Bernalillo County higher rates for water and wastewater. He thinks that was one of the points of friction that worked in their favor, so he would caution the City on that one. His said his understanding is that they were able to do it in the 1990's up until 2007.

Mr. Martinez said, speaking off the cuff, he would say that we can charge a higher rate outside the City limits than within the City, but we have to have some rationale, so the City has to think about that rationale.

Councilor Maestas said there are cities that, as a matter of policy, charge twice the rate in the county, and that has been in place for a long time.

Mr. Martinez said they can, but if and when we're challenged, we would have to justify that charge.

Councilor Maestas said that wouldn't be a disincentive to developers, because the occupants of the developments would be paying it. He said, "Anyway, if you guys can come up with any other kinds of related levies that could collectively serve as a disincentive, I think that really would be good."







Glass is NO LONGER Accepted in Your Blue Cart!

Why has glass collection been eliminated from curbside recycling? The move to carts and automated collection trucks increases safety and efficiency for our workers. However, the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) that sorts our recycling does not accept glass. Since we are no longer collecting the recycling by hand and emptying it into a two-compartment truck, we have no way to collect glass separately at the curb.


Why doesn't our processor accept glass?

This is a nationwide trend. Glass mixed in with the other materials causes equipment problems for many MRF's. Although glass is recyclable, it has low value as a commodity and it's heavy and costly to transport. There are no *large scale* glass recyclers within an economically feasible distance.

Is the City still recycling glass?

YES! The City has established drop-off centers for glass (and other recyclables) in addition to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station recycling drop-off site. The Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency (SFSWMA) processes our glass for local uses in manufacturing and production applications.

Although this is a big change, we are working to make recycling drop-off centers convenient for Santa Feans to recycle their glass.


Back to School, Santa Fe Our Students Lead the Community in Recycling!

Students and staff from Santa Fe Public Schools (SFPS) all participate in the recycling program. Due to their committment, recycling at all 34 facilities has increased from 6% to 32%.

Some program highlights include:

- Recycling containers are located at every school and have uniform marketing
- Graphic instructions show what can (and cannot) be recycled
- SFPS marketing matches the City's residential recycling program so that what gets recycled in school is the same as at home
- Glass is pack in, pack out; it must be recycled outside of SFPS facilities
- The cafeteria waste from 14 schools, representing 6,000 students, is composted at Reunity Resources. Composting diverts 2,600 lbs of food each day from the landfill!





Old Electronics Should not be Sent to the Landfill

As faster, smaller and more powerful electronic devices are introduced, people purchase newer models, leaving the old ones behind. Electronic devices typically contain lead, cadmium, and mercury; they must be properly managed when they are no longer wanted.

Keep electronics out of landfills by:

- Upgrade your device only when necessary
- Repair products instead of replacing them
- Check with the manufacturer to see if they have a take-back program
- Consider buying refurbished electonics


Recycling is one of the easiest ways that Santa Feans can conserve natural resources. However, it's not at the top of the list!


Reduce: The *best* action you can take is to reduce the waste you create. Ask yourself, "Do I really need this?" If the answer is NO, don't get it. Avoid disposable items.

Reuse: If you do need it, invest in durable goods, or consider whether you can buy used items instead of new. Santa Fe has a thriving reuse economy! Check out the many thrift shops and consignment stores for clothing, furniture, and home improvement- many benefit local charities, too!

"Upcycling" is a type of reuse- our local artist community is great at making something old into something new again!


Recycle: An item is considered *recycled* if it is broken down into its raw components and then manufactured into a new item.



Manage Your Unwanted Medications and Sharps Properly


Don't **EVER** flush unwanted medication down your toilet or drain! Keep medication out of our waterways and away from people that might abuse them by using one of the drug disposal kiosks in Santa Fe.

Prescription/Non-Prescription/Pet Medications

When using a disposal kiosk, cover all personal information in black marker and drop it off at one of the following locations: Santa Fe Police Department, 2515 Camino Entrada (Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.)
Santa Fe Fire Department, 200 Murales Road (Fort Marcy) (Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m., 1:00 p.m.-5:00 p.m.)

Sharps (used needles)







Where Does Santa Fe's Recycling Go?

At the Freidman MRF the mixed materials are separated mechanically and sold to manufacturers to make new products. Recyclables collected by the City are sent to Friedman Recycling's Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) in Albuquerque

Common Cart Concerns

Still not sure? Here are some more helpful hints:



Caps on? Or caps off?

Caps and the bottles are **both** recyclable. Keep the caps on and they will get processed. **NOTE**: Caps by themselves might fall out of the automated MRF sort process so its best to put them back on the container.

What to do with Plastic Bags?

While single use plastic bags have been banned in Santa Fe, there are still a LOT of bags that are in use. Plastic bags and plastic film can wrap around the automated equipment and shut down the MRF. Recycle your plastic bags and stretch wrap at local grocery stores rather than in the blue cart.



Do I need to rinse my items before recycling them?

It is recommended that you try and get as much food or liquid out of the container as possible. Tiny amounts are OK...don't go overboard with your cleaning.

Too big for your trash cart?

Environmental Services offers a 'bulky waste' pickup service for large items which can't be placed into your trash cart. Call (505) 955-2200 to schedule (fees apply).

Pizza boxes, pizza boxes. What to do?

Empty pizza boxes are recyclable. Remove all crusts, paper and anything else that comes with your 'pie'. If the bottom is very greasy, rip off the clean part and toss it into your bin. The greasy part should be thrown in the trash OR if you compost in your yard, add it to your compost pile/bin.
