MOTION: Mr. R. Pacheco moved to approve the agenda as presented with a second from Ms. Robinson which passed by voice vote.

MOTION: Mr. Cooley moved to approve the minutes from January 18, 2017 as presented with a second from Ms. Wellington which passed by voice vote.

5. CITIZEN COMMUNICATION FROM THE FLOOR

6. COMMUNICATIONS FROM OTHER AGENCIES

a.) MPO Report

Mr. Aune reported a planning meeting for Bike to Work week will be held next week. Permission to use the Railyard plaza has been granted. All are welcome to attend the planning meeting.

Mr. Aune stated he met with the City GIS department and reviewed the interactive map. The goal is to have past, existing and proposed future projects visible. Mr. Aune would like to have input from BTAC on the map.

Mr. Aune reported he was unable to gather the abstract for the traffic garden and playground. He spoke the designer of the project in Seattle and got some cost estimates. Mr. Aune would like to have Parks meet and discuss the funding opportunities.

Mr. Aune reported the small committee that formed surrounding the issue brought to BTAC by citizen Dick Lemon has had standing meetings every Wednesday. They will start a pilot project soon and have figured 12 areas they can utilize. They will discuss further with Parks and the Parking Department.

A brief discussion was held about the previous project with the sleeve and the idea for the ring design.

b.) City Trails Coordinator Report-SF Conservation Trust

Mr. Rogers presented his report. (See Exhibit A) The Trail to Dale Ball connecting to Cerro Gordo will be working with some other entities. They would like the trail to go around where the building stood.

Mr. Rogers reported they City and NMDOT will have to work together to get the RTP award for the Motocross park.

Mr. Rogers reported there was a tree emergency and volunteers worked quickly to get them cleared. (See Exhibit B)

Mr. Rogers reported me met with Bike and Brew organizers and the organizers of Caja del Rio gravel grinder.

Mr. Rogers stated there is a small subdivision (Las Estrellas) they want to work the developers on the trail on the open space.

Mr. Rogers reported the arts and creativity center will meet with him to discuss the trail west of Siler.

A discussion was held about the illegal ATV use on La Tierra trail. The citizens have called it to the attention to the City. Parks staff and Police officers visited the site. There are some ideas on how to remedy the situation.

Mr. Rogers stated he is going to renegotiate the Santa Fe Conservation Trust services agreement with Parks Department.

Mr. Rogers discussed the work that they can do on the Dog Park Connector Trail. (See Exhibit C)

A discussion was held about signage in the downtown area and the Route 66. Mr. Cooley asked if it would be useful to add it to the GIS interactive map.

Mr. Herdman asked about the ATV use on La Tierra trail and how the ATV's are accessing the trail. Mr. Rogers explained there is an area near Frijoles arroyo where the fence was cut.

7. INFORMATION/DISCUSSION/ACTION:

a.) Canada Rincon Trail Project Status

Ms. Horn presented some slides that were presented at the public meeting for the project. (See Exhibit D). There was a lot of positive feedback.

Ms. Horn stated the population has grown in the neighborhood. In the topography graph there is a majority of flood zone area.

Ms. Horn discussed the alternative for the connection to Avenida Rincon, an elevated ramp is one option. There is a 12-foot increase.

A discussion was held about the public input. Ms. Horn stated the Reserve is aware of the plans and they have not voiced any concerns.

Mr. L. Pacheco stated they have completed the right of way, there is 30% conceptual design and the full survey has all been done.

A gentleman in the audience asked about the area up to Tano, it is not paved. Seniors on bikes support the project so it will be done as soon as possible.

Ms. Robinson asked if there was a sense the Reserve would close of the path. Mr. L. Pacheco hoped someone from the Reserve would be presented to discuss tonight, however they had a meeting and he did not get that sense.

Mr. L. Pacheco would like to have the Reserve attend a BTAC meeting within the next few months to discuss their concerns if any.

A woman from the audience asked if the trail would be on City property can they refuse access to it.

A brief discussion was held about the ramp and how it can be brought to code.

<u>MOTION:</u> Mr. R. Pacheco moved to allow City staff ask the agent representing the Reserve to make a report to BTAC so that the project can move forward with a second from Ms. Wellington which passed by voice vote.

A gentleman in the audience asked about the section under the 599 bridge that is unpaved. Mr. Herdman stated there is nothing on the master plan but it can be added and any input is welcome. There is limit funding.

b.) Preliminary Estimate for Connector Trail from Frank Ortiz Dog Park to La Tierra Trails

Mr. L. Pacheco discussed the cost estimate requested from last month's meeting. (See Exhibit E) The

project was estimated at \$300,000.

Mr. R. Pacheco asked why the trail couldn't go along the road. Mr. L. Pacheco explained the map (See Exhibit F) shows the alignments. When he walked the trail he didn't follow the road.

Mr. Cooley asked if the reason was that it may conflict with future development in that area. Mr. R. Pacheco suggested it be a temporary trail. Mr. L. Pacheco stated the Ridge was left for the view.

Ms. Robinson asked if in the meantime the volunteers can make a temporary soft surface trail or will they have to follow the same process to get public input.

Mr. L. Pacheco gave an example of a single track trail if it is managed by Parks. He would defer that question to Parks and Mr. Rogers.

Mr. Herdman explained there is not any options at this time. Mr. Herdman explained and showed on the map an area where the dog park joins Camino de los Montoyas. There is a large area where it drops off.

A discussion was held about the users of the trail and ADA compliance.

Ms. Horn discussed the master plan and the importance of the City to use infill. She recommends the interim soft surface trail. Also, speak to the SFPS about making that change to their property.

Ms. Grogan works with volunteers on other trials in the Galisteo basin. The only issue with temporary trails is people will think they are permanent.

Mr. Herdman would like to see this item again and make sure it stays in focus.

Mr. Cooley would like to hear from Mr. Rogers at the next meeting.

Mr. L. Pacheco will ask Mr. Rogers to discuss his ideas at the next meeting. Also Mr. L. Pacheco explained the form he needs filled out for items for the next agenda.





Removing Fallen Trees near Cerro Gordo Trailhead, Jan. 25








Removing Fallen Trees near Cerro Gordo Trailhead, Jan. 25

One e-mail to a handful of certified sawyer volunteers produced immediate results: By the end of the day, thanks to Peter Prince and his handy chainsaw, the fallen trees were taken down and removed!




La Tierra Trails / Dog Park Connector





Preliminary engineer's estimate to design and construct the La Tierra Trails Connector Trail from Frank Ortiz Dog Park to Camino de los Montoyas Trailhead and the La Tierra Trails System. (Leroy Pacheco)

2. INTRODUCTION TO THE TOPIC: A brief statement regarding origin of the agenda item and its relevance to the current activity of BTAC.

The item was prompted by a motion made by Ron Pacheco at the Jan 2017 BTAC meeting when the use of remaining NWQ trails funds was being discussed. This connection is included among a list of potential projects in the original La Tierra Trails Master Plan, and a city council resolution and application for federal funds for this project was submitted to NMDOT in spring 2015.

3. BTAC ACTION BEING SOUGHT: Most BTAC deliberation is intended to achieve one of three outcomes. If appropriate be prepared to suggest a formal motion to the meeting floor for debate, discussion and vote.

*To inform: The purpose is to inform board members of the actions/thoughts of the presenting group and to provide an opportunity for discussion and questions. (E.g., an update from a standing or ad-hoc subcommittee) No action from BTAC is sought.

*To discuss: BTAC agrees that a preliminary proposal is worthy of further discussion. A possible motion to direct an individual to review the issue and return at a specified time with a formal proposal for action is sought.

*To act: BTAC supports a plan that requires outlining actions and obligations for Board members and/or Staff. A motion clarifying objectives, expectations and obligations of Board and/or Staff is sought.

The purpose of this item is to for BTAC to discuss costs of design and construction for this potential project.

4. ESTIMATION OF COST AND/ TIME: Who would be responsible for costs and/or BTAC or staff time? Has affected BTAC member or staff been apprised of the proposal and do they understand the obligations?

Public Works Department – Engineering Division would be the responsible agency. Funding appropriations and budgets are subject to city council review and approval.

La Tierra Trails System – Connector Trail from Frank Ortiz Dog Park to Camino de los Montoya's Trail

- The project is listed in the August 2012 updated Trails Master Plan Project List with a cost range estimated at \$300,000.00
- In 2009 the city council amended the General Land Use Plan to include amendments to parcels in the 542 acres in the Northwest Quadrant south of NM 599.
- The Santa Fe Public Schools owns approximately 7% of the property in the Northwest Quadrant, and is a stakeholder in development of city infrastructure in the area.
- In 2015 the city made application to the New Mexico DOT for consideration of a federal grant for this connector trail with a proposed cost to design and construct of \$250,000.00. Application included a city council approved resolution to indicate political support for the trail. The application was not selected for grant of funds.
- The proposed connector trail would be approximately 0.65 miles in length, and typically 10-ft wide with a firm and unyielding surface.
- Project stakeholder's include:
 - 1. Surrounding Neighborhoods (Casa Solana, Santa Fe Estates, etc.)
 - 2. Diverse Trail users (hikers, bicyclists, equestrians, dog-walkers,)
 - 3. Americans with Disabilities
 - 4. Archeological interests (Native American Tribes)
 - 5. The Santa Fe Public Schools
- City agents: Public Works (Engineering, Traffic, Streets and Drainage), Historic Preservation, Mayor's Committee on Disability, Land Use, Parks & Recreation
- There are drainage and terrain considerations and challenges to be considered and overcome in the proposed trail corridor.
- There are traffic design considerations in crossing users at Camino de las Crucitas and Camino de los Montoyas.
