1. CALL TO ORDER

Councilor Joseph Maestas, Chair of the Santa Fe MPO Transportation Policy Board called the meeting to order at 5:05 p.m. at the City of Santa Fe Market Station Offices. A quorum was established at 5:13 p.m.

2. ROLL CALL

3. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

** A quorum was not established until 5:13 p.m. it was agreed to allow the Rail Plan Presentation to begin in order to keep time.

MOTION: Commissioner Hansen moved to approve the agenda as presented with a second from Councilor Lindell.

VOTE: The motion was approved a passed by unanimous voice vote.

4.APPROVAL OF MINUTES August 24, 2017

MOTION: Commissioner Hansen moved to approve the minutes of August 24, 2017 as presented with a second from Councilor Lindell.

VOTE: The motion was approved a passed by unanimous voice vote.

A. MATTERS FROM THE PUBLIC

There were not any members of the public present at this time.

B. PUBLIC HEARING

1. Approval of an Amendment to the FFYs 2018-2023 Transportation Improvement Program

Mr. Wilson reviewed the table (See Exhibit B) and read each Project amendments aloud.

Councilor Maestas opened up the public hearing:

Mr. Justin Greene (611 Campana Place) asked about sidewalks along the Santa Fe Indian School and if it would be included in the S100570 project.

Mr. Wilson stated the project is limited to the intersection. No sidewalks were mentioned. This is an isolated project to complete ADA regulations to upgrade the curb ramps.

Mr. Greene states that area needs attention.

Councilor Maestas asked about the city-wide ADA study. Mr. Wilson it looked at the insufficiencies. Councilor Maestas would like an update at the next meeting.

Councilor Maestas closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Hansen asked why the 59/Hwy. 70 project was not on the list.

Mr. Wilson reports that the project is at 60% design now and they need to hold a public meeting. It is scheduled for mid-December. There is money available for it. There is an interim improvement planned. They are looking at the interim and they are also going to have the study complete.

Councilor Hansen stated there was to be a Spring meeting for the public but it never occurred. Can she be informed when the December meeting will happen so she can inform her constituents. Mr. Wilson will follow up.

MOTION: Councilor Lindell moved to approve the Amendments to the FFYs 2018-2023 Transportation Improvement Program with a second from Commissioner Hansen.

VOTE: The motion was approved a passed by unanimous voice vote.

C. ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION:

1. FFY 2018 Safety Targets for New Mexico

Mr. Aune stated he presented the Safety Targets in to the Board in July. It was recommended that they formalize them.

MOTION: Councilor Lindell moved to approve the FFY 2018 Safety Targets for New Mexico with a second from Commissioner Hansen.

VOTE: The motion was approved a passed by unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Aune handed the certificates to Councilor Maestas to sign.

2. FFY 2018 Transit Asset Management Targets

Mr. Aune stated they were asked to adopt the transit asset management targets as well. (See Exhibit C) The targets were recommended by the MPO-TCC, once approved here they will submit to the NMDOT.

MOTION: Commissioner Hansen moved to approve the FFY 2018 Transit Asset Management Targets with a second from Councilor Lindell.

VOTE: The motion was approved a passed by unanimous voice vote.

3. Review and Approval of 2018 SFMPO Meetings Schedule

Councilor Maestas stated the schedule was discussed in previous meetings, and the bylaws were changed to allow one telephone appearance each meeting.

Mr. Tibbets explained there will be a total of 8 meetings next year. There will be approvals in the spring.

The MPO TCC meets on Mondays at 5:00 p.m. and the MPO TPB will continue to meet on Thursdays/

MOTION: Commissioner Hansen moved to approve the 2018 MPO TCB meeting schedule with a second from Councilor Lindell.

VOTE: The motion was approved a passed by unanimous voice vote.

4. State Rail Plan Presentation

*This item was presented before a quorum was established.

Mr. Craven presented the State Rail Plan (See Exhibit A). Mr. Craven explained why the Rail Plan is needed, the purposes and the contents of the plan. They will present to the public and the Federal Railroads soon. They will update the plan every 4 years. Their previous plan is available online.

Mr. Craven discussed the ways they will improve Railroad safety and security and repair to railroads. One goal is to promote efficient passenger rail services.

The Railrunner extensions were discussed. An update from the 2014 update done last.

5. Update on Transportation Improvement Program

Mr. Wilson discussed the table and tracking if the TIP (See Exhibit E). The interchange on NM 599 and Jaguar Drive has opened.

Commissioner Hansen stated some County Commissioners attended the SE Connector meeting that is next in line, is there an update on the MOU?

Mr. Wilson states he has not heard as of yet. NMDOT wanted to approve the amendment. The MOA has to go before the County Commission for approval.

Mr. Wilson reported the minor developments to Guadalupe Street are underway. There was a public input meeting.

Mr. Wilson stated the SF Rail Trail and Arroyo Hondo projects are getting funding. They should move forward in the Summer.

Mr. Wilson explained there is an electronic way to review the STIP now. He will get some training and present it to the Board.

D. MATTERS FROM THE MPO STAFF

Mr. Tibbetts thanked the Board for attending meetings, he knows they all have busy schedules.

Mr. Tibbetts reported he is working on a designation application for the Walk Friendly Designation. They will need a co-sponsor.

Mr. Tibbetts reported that in mid-December there will be a joint City/County meeting to discuss the trails and the connections.

E. MATTERS FROM THE SFMPO TRANSPORTATION POLICY BOARD

Commissioner Moreno states he was happy to learn about the progress of the overpass. He has made contact with SFCC and will meet with the interim President to discuss that matter.

Councilor Lindell would like to have staff report on the corridor management plan on NM 475. There was a plan in 2003 but it was never adopted.

Councilor Maestas asked Mr. Craven about the freight plan. Texas is updating theirs.

Ms. Hass is working on that for New Mexico. The Board would like a presentation on the plan update at the next meeting.

Ms. Haas states they received approval from FHWA just today. In the freight plan there is a financial component. The plan should be on the website soon.

Ms. Haas will coordinate a presentation.

Councilor Maestas asked what if they don't comply? Is there a funding plan?

Mr. Craven explained Rio Metro has their plan almost complete. New Mexico doesn't receive any revenues. New Mexico is considered a passenger railroad.

Councilor Maestas asked for an update on the St. Michaels Drive negotiations. As he understands it, the NMDOT has to bring it the road up to par. Then the road exchange can happen.

Mr. Wilson explained they have about 20 million programmed. The RFP went out for the study, he hasn't seen it the scope is as the TIP explains. It depends on the scope

Councilor Maestas would like to see the scope of the RFP. He wants to make sure it identifies what needs to be done.

Mr. Wilson requested it after it was on the website. He will follow up and track it down. Things should be moving along smoothly. He will share once he gets it.

Commissioner Moreno wants a more detailed presented on the project. For the next meeting he wants an analysis.

Ms. Haas explained the proposals were due on October 10, 2017 and the selection was held on October 23, 2017. By January they should have a better contract.

Councilor Maestas would like a brief presentation after they are selected for the pavement preservation project.

F. MATTERS FROM NMDOT AND FHWA

Ms. Haas states the update on the freight plan was submitted. The safety targets will be submitted and they will need to post it on the MPO website. There will be more target discussions.

Ms. Haas explained the MPO has six months to adopt them and will be engaging all MPO's to come to a consensus on the state-wide targets. There is a list of projects that are up for review. They are trying to finalize it for the next call for congestion mitigation air quality projects.

Mr. Wilson states the transit project is waiting on them but it should be on the same cycle.

G. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the MPO Transportation Policy Board the meeting was adjourned at 6:04 p.m.

Why Develop a Rail Plan?


- Required by the Passenger Rail Investment and Improvement Act of 2008 (PRIIA)
- Required to receive future funding from Federal Railroad Administration (FRA)
- Coordinates with New Mexico's Long Range Transportation and Freight Plans

Purposes of Rail Plan

- Describes State Rail resources
- Sets forth State policy regarding passenger and freight rail transportation
- Presents priorities and strategies to enhance rail service that benefits the public
- Serves as the basis for Federal and State rail investments

Rail Plan Contents

- Vision, goals and objectives
 - ✓ Guide actions, programs, prioritizations
 - ✓ Provide linkages to State Transportation Plans
- Rail systems inventory and assessment
 - ✓ System inventory (freight and passenger)
 - ✓ Performance assessment
 - ✓ Issues and opportunities
 - ✓ Current and future needs
- Planning for the future
 - ✓ Prioritization of investments
 - ✓ Economic, environmental, community factors
 - ✓ Implementation of plan



2014 Rail Plan Vision Statement

The State of New Mexico's vision for its rail network is a fully-integrated and safe multimodal passenger rail system that provides efficient passenger services to, from, and within the state; provides a competitive option for New Mexico shippers; is a vital component of the national transportation network; and supports sustainable, inclusive economic development statewide.

2014 Rail Plan Statewide Goals

Four main goals for rail in New Mexico:

- 1. Support economic growth and development;
- 2. Improve railroad safety and security;
- 3. Maintain railroad assets in a state of good repair; and
- 4. Promote efficient passenger rail service

Goal: Support Economic Growth and Development

- Increase capacity of long-distance freight corridors
- Develop and promote local freight connections
- Promote rail-related tourism
- Link rail investments to strategies that support economic development

Goal: Improve Railroad Safety and Security

- Positive Train Control (PTC)
- Develop and implement other mandatory safetyrelated measures
- Improve highway-rail grade crossing safety
- Improve rail security

Goal: Maintain Railroad Assets in a State of Good Repair

- Improve the conditions of the state's Class III rail lines
- Maintain/improve the conditions of the NMRX rail lines

Goal: Promote Efficient Passenger Rail Service

- Improve passenger rail options in New Mexico as part of a multimodal transportation system
- Improve Rail Runner operations
- Identify stable and predictable funding for Rail Runner and NMRX rail lines

Factors Affecting Prioritization of Project Funding

- Need to maintain the State's existing railroad infrastructure in a state of good repair
- Need to comply with Federal safety mandates
- Limited overall public funding from Federal,
 State and local sources
- Restrictions on use of available Federal funding
- Anti-Donation Clause

Major Developments Since 2014

- Santa Teresa intermodal facility opened in 2014
- BNSF double-tracking projects completed through New Mexico in 2016
- New transload facilities in Albuquerque's South Valley being developed
- TIGER Grant funds are being used to replace railroad ties on NMDOT track used by Amtrak Southwest Chief in 2017
- Intermodal facilities underway being developed along BNSF Transcon (Gallup, Los Lunas)
- New rail-served facilities being developed in southeast New Mexico

This document outlines the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2018 Safety Targets for New Mexico, as required by the 23 CFR 490, Final Rule on the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) published March 15, 2016 (effective April 14, 2017). The state is required to set annual targets for five performance measures:

- Number of Fatalities
- 2. Rate of Fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles travelled (VMT)
- 3. Number of Serious Injuries
- 4. Rate of Serious Injuries per 100 million VMT
- 5. Number of Non-motorized Fatalities and Serious Injuries


The first three are common measures and must be identical to the targets established for the Highway Safety Program (HSP).

The NMDOT undertook a coordinated effort with the Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) and other stakeholders to set the targets.

- 1. Numerous internal meetings took place in winter of 2016/2017 between the NMDOT Planning and Traffic Safety Bureaus to review and analyze crash data and trends. NMDOT contracts with the University of New Mexico (UNM) to maintain the state's crash database.
- 2. With assistance from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the NMDOT conducted a Safety Target Workshop with the MPOs on April 5, 2017. The attendees reviewed the crash data and trends as well as the federal requirements for target setting.
- 3. On April 6, 2017, the MPOs held a quarterly meeting at which the MPO planners agreed to following the state's safety targets, rather than setting their own targets. The MPOs agreed to follow up with their Policy Boards/Committees regarding resolutions adopting the state's targets, when final guidance is available from FHWA.
- 4. On May 16, 2017, the NMDOT Traffic Safety Bureau held a meeting to discuss and adopt the targets required in the HSP. NMDOT Planning Bureau staff and MPO representatives attended.
- 5. NMDOT Planning Bureau held a follow up meeting with the MPOs on June 30, 2017 to review the final targets.
- 6. NMDOT Planning Bureau also followed up with Rodolfo Monge-Oviedo of FHWA-NM regarding guidance on how the MPOs should adopt the NMDOT targets. The guidance from FHW-NM is that the MPOs should amend their Metropolitan Transportation Plans to state that they will follow NMDOT targets and provide a separate document outlining the targets (or linking to the state targets), which is updated annually.
- 7. A draft of this summary was circulated to the MPOs for comments June 30 to July 27, 2017. As NMDOT received no comments, the summary is considered final.


In setting the FFY2018 safety performance targets, NMDOT and stakeholders did not rely solely on the data projections, but used the data in combination with their discussions regarding other relevant factors and their assessment of the potential safety impacts of various strategies and projects. NMDOT worked with UNM to determine methodologies and assumptions required to set the targets. These are as follows:

- NMDOT uses Excel to plot a linear best fit line based on 5-years of actual data to project for future years.
- Vehicle Miles Travelled (VMT) the Annual VMT estimate for 2016 uses the 2015 Daily VMT (75,165,529.8 Daily VMT * 1.021 * 365) / 1,000,000 = **28,012 annual Million VMT for 2016** where 75,165,529.8 is the 2015 Daily VMT.



- 1.021 is the 2.1% increase estimate for 2016 (per FHWA https://www.fhwa.dot.gov/policyinformation/travel_monitoring/tvt.cfm)
- 365 is the number of days in a year
- o 1,000,000 converts the units to millions
- Crash Data 2015 is finalized, 2016 is preliminary.


C1: Total Traffic Fatalities



NMDOT Target Statement: Limit the increase in total fatalities to 6.4 percent from 342.2 in 2015 to 364.1 by December 31, 2018 (FARS; 5-year averages)

NMDOT Justification: Five-year average fatalities fell by 7 percent between 2011 and 2015, but are expected to rise in 2016 based on preliminary data. January through May 2017 data show a slight decline from the first 5 months of 2016, but the May 2017 data are very preliminary and are expected to rise. The 5-year trend line indicates an increase of 6.4 percent from 2015 to 2018, and the State has determined this to be an achievable target for 2018.


C2: Total Serious Injuries



NMDOT Target Statement: Decrease the number of serious injuries by 15.6 percent from 1,445.0 in 2015 to 1,219.4 by December 31, 2018.

NMDOT Justification: Five year average serious injuries fell by 22.8 percent between 2011 and 2015. The State anticipates a continued reduction in serious injuries and considers the projected reduction to 1,219.4 an achievable target for 2018.


C3: Fatalities per 100M VMT



NMDOT Target Statement: Limit the increase in the fatality rate to .31 percent from 1.326 in 2015 to 1.330 by December 31, 2018.

NMDOT Justification: Although fatalities are expected to increase in 2018 from 2015, the State determines that the projected 2018 5-year fatality rate is an achievable target. Five-year average 2018 projections for urban and rural fatality rates are determined to be achievable targets.


C4: Rate of Serious Injuries



NMDOT Target Statement: Decrease the rate of serious injuries from 5.597 in 2015 to 4.456 by December 31, 2018.

. **NMDOT Justification:** Five year serious injuries fell by 27.3% between 2011 and 2015. The State anticipates a continued reduction in serious injuries and considered the projected reduction to 3.59 an achievable target by 2018.





NMDOT Target Statement: Limit the increase in non-motorized fatalities and non-motorized serious injuries to 228 by December 31, 2018.

NMDOT Justification: Although fatalities are expected to increase in 2018 from 2015, the State determined that the projected number of 228 non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries in 2018 is an achievable target.
