1. CALL TO ORDER

The Santa Fe Regional Juvenile Justice Board was called to order at 5:19 p.m. by Sam Jackson, Chair. A quorum was is reflected in roll call.

3. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

MOTION: Deacon Trujillo moved to approve the agenda as presented with a second from Mr. Lindahl which passed by voice vote.

4. INTRODUCTIONS OF MEMBERS AND GUESTS

Introductions were made by those present.

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF DECEMBER 14, 2017

MOTION: Mr. Lindahl moved to approve the minutes as presented with a second from Deacon Trujillo which passed by voice vote.

6. FINANCIAL REPORT-

a. BUGET-Detailed Budget and Financial FY 17/18

Mr. DeMella explained the reports, (See Exhibit A) the providers are present tonight if there are questions. There are some invoices that still need to be paid. The programs should use up their monies by June 30, 2018.

Mr. DeMella stated there will be members from each providers present at each meeting from now on.

Mr. Lindahl asked about the time remaining in the fiscal year. He would like to make sure there isn't a balance left over.

Deacon Trujillo asked Youthworks if and how they will expend the funds. Ms. Vigil Clarke explained they have been serving a good number of youth and clients. They started billing in October.

Ms. Bergen explained they began billing in July. Deacon Trujillo expressed his concern the same matter every year they go through the process with CYFD and the contracts start late. He would like to see the sites get the money available sooner.

Mr. DeMella explained the delay could be because of the RFP process and the issues with the new billing system.

Mr. Dickson explained the matters with the Rio Arriba continuum board he sits on does not have these issues.

A discussion was held about the continuum and the idea to have it run all year with no interruptions. Mr. DeMella explained the amounts they get is not enough to cover a year-long program.

Ms. Vigil Clarke explained the in kind services Youthworks offers.

b. Approval of Financial Report

MOTION: Ms. Romero moved to approve the Financial Report as presented with a second from Mr. Dickson which passed by voice vote.

7. PRESENTATIONS:

a. New CYFD Agreement for 18/19

Mr. DeMella discussed the amount of money that was given was the same as last year. (See Exhibit B) Tutoring was asked for but not granted. The school districts were to have tutors and truancy officers, however the state (PED) seems to shuffle that money around.

Mr. DeMella will have the RFP out by the next meeting to have them ready. The agreements should be in place so there won't be a delay.

Mr. DeMella will have the program committee meet and agree on the selections by June.

Chair Jackson explained that there was some money for day reporting years ago, it would be nice to bring it back to that amount.

Mr. DeMella explained the programs selected have to be evidence based.

Mr. Dickson asked if the providers think the programs can grow? Ms. Vigil Clarke states she knows there could be a use for additional educational pieces.

Chair Jackson would like the providers to submit in writing a proposal on growth.

Ms. Bergen was invited to a conversation to add Santa Fe High. She has met with some other vendors she would like to add more than one site coordinator there. The system they have in place at Capital is working. She would like to have some ideas from the Board as to how to expand to Santa Fe High. Mr. DeMella believes with the next administration there could be changes.

Mr. Dickson mentioned the need for a truancy officer at Santa Fe High.

Deacon Trujillo stated when looking at budgets for next year, perhaps the providers can be invited to the program committee meetings.

Ms. Bergen discussed how she tries to leverage and strategize to raise more money with some foundations or entities.

A discussion was held about the possibility to look into other entities to match and write it into the grant with the understanding that there is already an amount awarded.

Ms. Bergen would like to be able to explain the significance and leveraging other entities to support the work. Ms. Bergen does not know the history of the Board and would like to know if they have a mission and if CYFD's grant is the only source of funding. Deacon Trujillo explained there were grant writers given to help with raising more money.

Ms. Bergen suggests they look into other matches to expand services. A discussion was held about going further out for funding. Ms. Bergen discussed her idea of making a case with other entities to do more. Deacon Trujillo states he would like to help with that idea.

Chair Jackson discussed working with providers to get an idea of their needs. Ms. Bergen excused herself, a brief discussion was held about rescheduling the site visit.

Mr. Lindahl stated that they should meet further on expanding services. Mr. Lindahl mentioned in the agreement there is a mention of providing recommendations for the next fiscal year. There is mention of explaining the correlation between the needs and this may all change, Mr. Lindahl would like the Board to keep that in mind.

Chair Jackson stated at the last meeting there was data to be collected and the Board should follow up with them.

Ms. Vigil Clarke stated there are some finalized numbers and she saw a portion of it. A discussion was held about the numbers presented on the issues in the community.

b. House Bill 181

Mr. DeMella explained the bill died and was not passed. The chair of the House Consumer and Public Affairs Committee received a lot of calls in opposition of this bill. The issue was that the funding was going to be taken from prevention continuums. (See Exhibit C) Mr. DeMella stated the sponsor of the bill may visit a site to get a better understanding of what the boards to for youth.

c. Job Fair/Center

Mr. DeMella mentioned the job fair will be tomorrow. (See Exhibit D)

8. MATTERS FROM THE BOARD

There were not any matters from the Board.

There were no matters from the public.

RE: Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee FY19 Funding Recommendations

Dear Secretary Jacobson,

One of the duties of the Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee (JJAC) is to review applications for state and federal grant funding and to prepare recommendations to the CYFD Cabinet Secretary. This letter outlines the process that the JJAC used to meet this requirement and the recommendations contained herein are respectfully being submitted for your review and approval.

The schedule for the application process for funding in state fiscal year (FY) 2019 was as follows:

September 8, 2017: Application Workshop was held with all potential applicant's fiscal agents. The grant application, instructions and supporting documentation were distributed and reviewed in depth.

October 12, 2017: Opening of mandatory phone/in person conferences with applicants and JJAC Program Unit Staff, to review the application, ask questions and make recommendations.

November 2, 2017: Original and electronic program grant applications due by 12:00 p.m. to include any applicable attachments (e.g. strategic plans, work plans and Memorandum of Understanding).

November 7, 2017: Program applications were sent to the JJAC Grant Committee Members for review and formation of questions to be submitted to the Continuums.

November 22, 2017: Members of the JJAC Grant Committee submitted completed evaluations, and any questions for the continuums, to the JJAC unit.

November 29, 2017: JJAC Grant Committee questions distributed to the Continuums for answers.

December 8, 2017: Continuums returned questions and answers to the JJAC Unit.

December 18, 2017: JJAC Grant Committee and JJAC staff met to provide recommendations to the full JJAC Board for approval. The JJAC Grant Committee utilized the responses from the Q&A, the current status



of each site's financial and data reporting, and information provided in the grant application, historical juvenile justice data, as well as input by the JJAC staff, to make funding recommendations.

January 9, 2018: JJAC Grant Committee Chair, Sasha Pellerin, provided the committee's recommendations to the full JJAC Board for approval and recommendation to CYFD Cabinet Secretary.

In the 2019 application, the fee for service format was continued from the FY17 funding. The fee for service format ensures that funding will be utilized for direct services to our youth, while guaranteeing programs are fully accountable.

The following budget was prepared for the JJAC Board to consider when making their funding recommendations for our twenty-two (22) continuum sites for FY18:

The JJAC Grant Committee met on December 18, 2017 to review twenty (20) applications that represented sixty (60) separate programs, providing services in twenty-two counties. Total funding requested was \$3,020,982; \$255,982 more than what was available to award. After individual and thoughtful review of each continuum program, the committee recommended an allocation of \$2,649,093.

Currently there is a balance in the Juvenile Justice Continuum fund. By statute, a maximum of \$400,000 is allowed to be transferred, in addition to the state fiscal year 2019 allocation. We cannot be sure that we will have access to the fund balance until July of 2018. Once it is determined the fund balance is available, Continuum sites may be reevaluated and awarded additional funds based on performance and need.

Also, in order to receive the Title II Formula Grant funding, New Mexico must commit to achieve and maintain compliance with the four core requirements of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Act:

- Deinstitutionalization of status offenders
- Separation of juveniles from adults in secure facilities,
- Removal of juveniles from adult jails and lockups, and
- Reduction of disproportionate minority contact within the juvenile justice system.

The JJAC Grant Committee presented their recommendations to the JJAC Board at their regular quarterly meeting on January 9, 2018.

The JJAC Grant Committee considered the following when making their recommendations:

 The county's past three years of delinquent referrals, probation violations, and top offenses were studied, as were their percentage of the state's population of 10-17 year olds, persons in poverty and data supplied in the application. An important fact taken into consideration was if the county's proposed programs "moved the needle" in making a positive impact on addressing the problems listed in their needs statement.

- Many applications were weak in making a correlation between the proposed programs and how they
 would make an impact on the types of offenses being committed in their communities and/or how they
 would prevent at-risk youth from entering or system involved youth from penetrating the system further.
- The State of New Mexico's Public Education Department (PED) funds a truancy prevention program with over 3.2 million dollars in state funds. With JJAC's limited resources, the Committee recommended continuing the practice of reducing existing truancy programs and not funding newly requested programs. The Committee recognizes the effects of truancy on young adults, but also understands it cannot fund every issue affecting our youth.
- In most cases, it was recommended that funding remain at state fiscal year 2018 levels for continuums.
 Very few continuums received what they requested or an increase. In the case of an increase, the application was overwhelmingly persuasive and contained data to support the increase.

Attached you will find the funding recommendations for each individual continuum that the JJAC Board respectfully submits for your consideration.

In closing, the JJAC Board would also like to acknowledge the hard work, coordination, innovation and organization of the JJAC Unit, specifically Cindy Varela and Consuelo Garcia, who ensured the process was conducted with accountability, fairness, and transparency.

[6.] H. The child, through counsel, and the children's court attorney may agree, without judicial approval, to a waiver of time limitations imposed after a petition is filed. If the child completes the agreed upon conditions and no new charges are filed against the child, the pending petition shall be dismissed. If the children's court attorney files a new petition against the child, the children's court attorney may proceed on both the original petition and the new charges. The department shall become a party if juvenile probation services are requested as a condition of the time waiver.

SECTION 6. Section 32A-2-11 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 77, Section 40, as amended) is amended to read:

"32A-2-11. CRITERIA FOR DETENTION OF CHILDREN.--

A. Unless ordered by the court pursuant to the provisions of the Delinquency Act, a child taken into custody for an alleged delinquent act shall not be placed in detention unless a detention risk assessment instrument is completed and a determination is made that the child:

SECTION 7. Section 32A-2-17 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 77, Section 46, as amended) is amended to read:

"32A-2-17. RISK ASSESSMENTS--MENTAL HEALTH SCREENING--PREDISPOSITION STUDIES -- REPORTS AND EXAMINATIONS .--

A. After a petition has been filed and [either a finding with respect to the allegations of the petition has been made or a notice of intent to admit the allegations of the petition has been filed, the court may direct that a predisposition study and report to the court be made in writing by the department or an appropriate agency designated by the court concerning the child, the family of the child, the environment of the child and any other matters relevant to the need for treatment or to appropriate disposition of the case. The following predisposition reports shall be provided to the parties and the court five days before actual disposition or

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(1) the adult probation and parole division of
the corrections department shall prepare a predisposition
report for a serious vouthful offender:

- (2) the department shall prepare a predisposition report for a serious youthful offender who is convicted of an offense other than first degree murder;
- (3) the department shall prepare a predisposition report for a youthful offender concerning the youthful offender's amenability to treatment and if:
- (a) the court determines that a juvenile disposition is appropriate, the department shall prepare a subsequent predisposition report; or
- (b) the court makes the findings necessary to impose an adult sentence pursuant to Section 32A-2-20 NMSA 1978, the adult probation and parole division of the corrections department shall prepare a subsequent predisposition report; and
- (4) the department shall prepare a predisposition report for a delinquent offender, upon the court's request.
- B. Where there are indications that the child may have a mental disorder or developmental disability, the court, on motion by the children's court attorney or that of counsel for the child, may order the child to be examined at a suitable .209186.2

place by a physician or psychiatrist, a licensed psychologist, a licensed professional clinical counselor or a licensed independent social worker prior to a hearing on the merits of the petition) prior to the adjudication of a case involving a child alleged delinquent, the department shall conduct a risk assessment of the child. Before the adjudicatory hearing, probation services shall provide to the parties of a case and to the court the results of the risk assessment, an identification of the child's risk of reoffending and an according recommended level, length and type of supervision and services for the child.

B. Any admission, confession or incriminating information obtained from a child in the course of conducting a risk assessment shall not be admitted into evidence in a case against the child, except as rebuttal or impeachment evidence, and shall not be used as a basis for introducing related evidence in any future adjudication hearing or criminal proceeding in which the child is accused. An admission, confession or incriminating information may be considered by the court at disposition of the case.

C. Prior to the disposition of a case in which a child is adjudicated delinquent, the department shall conduct a mental health screening of the child and a subsequent full mental health and substance use assessment, if warranted based on the mental health screening results. Juvenile probation

services shall provide to the parties of the case and to the court the results of the screening and the assessment, if applicable, prior to disposition.

D. An [examination made] assessment or screening of a child conducted prior to the adjudicatory hearing or as a part of the predisposition study and report shall be conducted on an outpatient basis, unless the court finds that placement in a hospital or other appropriate facility is necessary. If a mental health screening reveals that a child is in need of mental health services, the department shall, to the extent financially feasible, provide for a full mental health and substance use assessment of the child.

[6.] E. The court, after a hearing, may order the examination, by a physician or psychiatrist, a licensed psychologist or a licensed professional clinical counselor or a licensed independent social worker, of a parent, guardian or custodian whose ability to care for or supervise a child is an issue before the court.

(Dr) F. The court may order that a child adjudicated [as a] delinquent [child] be administered a predispositional evaluation by a professional designated by the department for purposes of diagnosis, with direction that the court be given a report indicating what disposition appears most suitable when the interests of the child and the public are considered. The evaluation shall be completed within .209186.2

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fifteen days of the court's order and the preference shall be for performing the evaluation in the child's community.

[E.3. If a child is detained for purposes of performing a predispositional evaluation, [it] the evaluation shall be completed within fifteen days and in no event shall a child be detained for more than fifteen days within a three-hundred-sixty-five-day period for a predispositional evaluation, unless for good cause shown.

H. The court shall use the predisposition report, including the results of the assessments and screening performed in accordance with this section, to assist the court in determining the disposition of a child's case.

I. A predisposition report shall also be used by
the department to inform a decision to place a child in a
facility for the care and rehabilitation of adjudicated
delinquent children and the education, counseling and treatment
provided to the child while committed to the facility.

J. Every six months or when a significant change to a child's case is made:

(1) a facility for the care and rehabilitation of adjudicated delinquent children shall conduct a risk assessment of each child who is adjudicated delinquent and is:

(a) committed to a short- or long-term placement in that facility; or

(b) committed to the facility until the

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<u>child reaches</u>	the	age	of	twenty-one;	and
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- (2) juvenile probation services shall conduct a risk assessment and mental health screening of each child who is adjudicated delinquent and is placed on probation."
- SECTION 8. Section 32A-2-19 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 77, Section 48, as amended) is amended to read:
- "32A-2-19. DISPOSITION OF AN ADJUDICATED DELINQUENT OFFENDER . --
- At the conclusion of the dispositional hearing, the court [may] shall make and include in the dispositional judgment its findings [on the], including findings on the results of assessments and screenings of the child conducted in accordance with Section 32A-2-17 NMSA 1978.
- B. The court may make and include in the dispositional judgment its findings on the following:
- (1) the interaction and interrelationship of the child with the child's parents and siblings and any other person who may significantly affect the child's best interests;
- the child's adjustment to the child's home, school and community;
- the mental and physical health of all (3) individuals involved, including consideration of such factors as the child's brain development, maturity, trauma history and disability;
- (4) the wishes of the child as to the child's .209186.2

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- (5) the wishes of the child's parents as to the child's custody;
- (6) whether there exists a relative of the child or other individual who, after study by the department, is found to be qualified to receive and care for the child;
- the availability of services recommended (7) in the predisposition report; and
- the ability of the parents to care for the child in the home.
- [B.] C. If a child is found to be delinquent, the court may impose a fine not to exceed the fine that could be imposed if the child were an adult and may [enter its judgment making] make any of the following dispositions for the supervision, care and rehabilitation of the child:
- (1) transfer legal custody to the department, (an agency responsible for the care and rehabilitation of delinquent children] which shall receive the child at a facility designated by the [secretary of the] department as a juvenile reception facility. If a child is committed to the custody of a facility for the care and rehabilitation of delinquent children, the court shall make a finding that an appropriate alternative service or program in the community does not exist or was previously used by the child without success and that the child poses a risk to the community based

on the child's risk assessment the seriousness of the act committed by the child, and the child's history of delinquency and any other relevant factors. The department shall thereafter determine the appropriate placement, supervision and rehabilitation program for the child. The judge may include recommendations for placement of the child. Commitments are subject to limitations and modifications set forth in Section 32A-2-23 NMSA 1978. The types of commitments include:

(a) a short-term commitment of one year

in a facility for the care and rehabilitation of adjudicated delinquent children. No more than nine months shall be served at the facility and no less than ninety days shall be served on supervised release, unless: 1) a petition to extend the commitment has been filed prior to the commencement of supervised release; 2) the commitment has been extended pursuant to Section 32A-2-23 NMSA 1978; or 3) supervised release is revoked pursuant to Section 32A-2-25 NMSA 1978;

(b) a long-term commitment [for] of no more than two years in a facility for the care and rehabilitation of adjudicated delinquent children. No more than twenty-one months shall be served at the facility and no less than ninety days shall be served on supervised release, unless: 1) supervised release is revoked pursuant to Section 32A-2-25 NMSA 1978; or 2) the commitment is extended pursuant to Section 32A-2-23 NMSA 1978;

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- (d) if the child is a youthful offender, a commitment to age twenty-one, unless sooner discharged;
- (2) place the child on probation under those conditions and limitations as the court may prescribe;
- place the child in a local detention facility that has been certified in accordance with the provisions of Section 32A-2-4 NMSA 1978 for a period not to exceed fifteen days within a three-hundred-sixty-five-day time period; or if a child is found to be delinquent solely on the basis of Paragraph (3) of Subsection A of Section 32A-2-3 NMSA 1978, the court shall only enter a judgment placing the child on probation or ordering restitution or imposing a fine not to exceed the fine that could be imposed if the child were an adult or any combination of these dispositions; or
- (4) if a child is found to be delinquent solely on the basis of Paragraph (2), (3) or (4) of Subsection A of Section 32A-2-3 NMSA 1978, the court may make any disposition provided by this section and may [enter its judgment placing | place the child on probation and, as a condition of probation, transfer custody of the child to the department for a period not to exceed six months without

further order of the court; provided that this transfer shall not be made unless the court first determines that the department is able to provide or contract for adequate and appropriate treatment for the child and that the treatment is likely to be beneficial.

- [6.] D. When the child is an Indian child, the Indian child's cultural needs shall be considered in the dispositional judgment and reasonable access to cultural practices and traditional treatment shall be provided.
- [D.] E. A child found to be delinquent shall not be committed or transferred to a penal institution or other facility used for the execution of sentences of persons convicted of crimes.
- $[E_{\tau}]$ \underline{F} . Whenever the court vests legal custody in an agency, institution or department, it shall transmit with the dispositional judgment copies of the clinical reports, predisposition study and report and other information it has pertinent to the care and treatment of the child.
- [F.] G. Prior to any child being placed in the custody of the department, the department shall be provided with reasonable oral or written notification and an opportunity to be heard.
- [6.] H. In addition to any other disposition pursuant to Subsection [8] C of this section, the court may make an abuse or neglect report for investigation and .209186.2

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proceedings as provided for in the Abuse and Neglect Act. The report may be made to a local law enforcement agency, the department or a tribal law enforcement or social service agency for an Indian child residing in Indian country.

[H.] In addition to any other disposition pursuant to this section or any other penalty provided by law, if a child who is fifteen years of age or older is adjudicated delinquent on the basis of Paragraph (2), (3) or (4) of Subsection A of Section 32A-2-3 NMSA 1978, the child's driving privileges may be denied or the child's driver's license may be revoked for a period of ninety days. For a second or a subsequent adjudication, the child's driving privileges may be denied or the child's driver's license revoked for a period of one year. Within twenty-four hours of the dispositional judgment, the court may send to the motor vehicle division of the taxation and revenue department the order adjudicating delinguency. Upon receipt of an order from the court adjudicating delinquency, the director of the motor vehicle division of the taxation and revenue department may revoke or deny the delinquent's driver's license or driving privileges. Nothing in this section may prohibit the delinquent from applying for a limited driving privilege pursuant to Section 66-5-35 NMSA 1978 or an ignition interlock license pursuant to the Ignition Interlock Licensing Act, and nothing in this section precludes the delinquent's participation in an

appropriate educational, counseling or rehabilitation program.

[H-] J. In addition to any other disposition pursuant to this section or any other penalty provided by law, when a child is adjudicated delinquent on the basis of Paragraph (6) of Subsection A of Section 32A-2-3 NMSA 1978, the child shall perform the mandatory community service set forth in Section 30-15-1.1 NMSA 1978. When a child fails to completely perform the mandatory community service, the name and address of the child's parent or legal guardian shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation, accompanied by a notice that the parent or legal guardian is the parent or legal guardian of a child adjudicated delinquent for committing graffiti."

SECTION 9. Section 32A-2-23 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 77, Section 52, as amended) is amended to read:

"32A-2-23. LIMITATIONS ON DISPOSITIONAL JUDGMENTS-MODIFICATION--TERMINATION OR EXTENSION OF COURT ORDERS.--

A. A judgment transferring legal custody of an adjudicated delinquent child to an agency responsible for the care and rehabilitation of delinquent children divests the court of jurisdiction at the time of transfer of custody, unless the transfer of legal custody is for a commitment not exceeding fifteen days pursuant to the provisions of Section 32A-2-19 NMSA 1978, in which case the court retains jurisdiction.

- B. A judgment of probation or protective supervision shall remain in force for an indeterminate period not to exceed the commitment from the date entered.
- C. A child shall be released by an agency and probation or supervision shall be terminated by juvenile probation [and parole] services or the agency providing supervision [when it appears that the purpose of the order has been achieved before the expiration of the period of the judgment. A] based on the child's risk of reoffending, as determined by the child's risk assessment, the seriousness of the act for which the child was adjudicated delinquent and the child's progress in meeting treatment goals. The releasing entity shall promptly report a child's release or termination and the reasons therefor [shall be reported promptly] to the court in writing [by the releasing authority].
- D. Prior to the expiration of a <u>child's</u> short-term commitment of one year, as provided for in Section 32A-2-19

 NMSA 1978, the court may extend the [<u>judgment</u>] <u>commitment</u> for up to one six-month period if, <u>based on a child's risk of</u>

 reoffending, as determined by a risk assessment, the

 seriousness of the act for which the child was adjudicated

 delinquent and the child's progress in meeting treatment goals,

 the court finds that the extension is necessary to safeguard

 the welfare of the child or [the] public safety. If a short
 term commitment is extended, the mandatory ninety-day

supervised release, as required by Section 32A-2-19 NMSA 1978, shall be included in the extension. Notice and hearing are required for any extension of a [juvenile's] child's commitment.

- E. Prior to the expiration of a child's long-term commitment, as provided for in Section 32A-2-19 NMSA 1978, the court may extend the judgment for additional periods of up to one year until the child reaches the age of twenty-one if, based on a child's risk of reoffending, as determined by a risk assessment, the seriousness of the act for which the child was adjudicated delinquent and the child's progress in meeting treatment goals, the court finds that the extension is necessary to safeguard the welfare of the child or [the] public safety. If a long-term commitment is extended, the mandatory ninety-day supervised release, as required by Section 32A-2-19 NMSA 1978, shall be included in the extension. Notice and hearing are required for any extension of a [juvenile's] <a href="child's commitment.
- F. Prior to the expiration of a judgment of probation, the court may extend the judgment for an additional period of one year until the child reaches the age of twenty-one if the court finds that the extension is necessary to protect the community or to safeguard the welfare of the child.
- G. The court may dismiss a motion if it finds after preliminary investigation that the motion is without substance. .209186.2

If the court is of the opinion that the matter should be reviewed, it may, upon notice to all necessary parties, proceed to a hearing in the manner provided for hearings on petitions alleging delinquency. The court may terminate a judgment if it finds that the child is no longer in need of care, supervision or rehabilitation or it may enter a judgment extending or modifying the original judgment if it finds that action necessary to safeguard the child or the public interest.

- H. A child may make a motion to modify a children's court or adult disposition within thirty days of the judge's decision. If the court is of the opinion that the matter should be reviewed, it may, upon notice to all necessary parties, proceed to a hearing in the manner provided for hearings on petitions alleging delinquency.
- I. The department may seek a bench warrant from the court when [the] <u>a</u> child absconds from supervised release."
- SECTION 10. Section 32A-2-23.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2009, Chapter 239, Section 23) is amended to read:

"32A-2-23.1. RELEASE ELIGIBILITY.--

A. The department shall have exclusive jurisdiction and authority to release an adjudicated delinquent child during the term of the child's commitment, consistent with the provisions of the Victims of Crime Act. In determining whether to release a child, the department shall give due consideration to a child's risk of reoffending, as determined by a risk

assessment, the seriousness of the act for which the child was adjudicated delinquent, the child's progress in meeting treatment goals, public safety, the extent to which the child has been rehabilitated, the adequacy and suitability of the proposed release plan and the needs and best interests of the child, including the child's need for behavioral health or medical services that are not available in facilities for adjudicated delinquent children.

- B. The decision to grant or deny release shall be made by the secretary of [children, youth and families] the department or the secretary's designee. The department may impose such conditions of release as it deems appropriate.
- C. A child is eligible for release any time after the entry of a judgment transferring legal custody to the department, and the department may consider a reasonable request for release from the child at any time sixty days after the child has been committed.
- D. In the event release for a child is denied by the department after release is recommended for the child by the juvenile public safety advisory board, or release is approved by the department after the board has recommended that the child not be released, within ten days, the board may request a review of the decision by the court of the judicial district from which legal custody of the child was transferred, and the department shall transmit the child's records to the

court. The court shall have jurisdiction to review the matter without conducting a formal hearing and to issue an order that either denies or grants release to the child. If the board requests review [under] in accordance with this section, the child shall not be released until such time as the court has issued a decision. If the board does not petition the district court for review of the department's decision to grant or deny release within ten days of the department's decision, the department's decision shall be final, and the department shall release the child or continue the commitment in accordance with the terms of its decision.

E. The secretary of [children, youth and families] the department or the secretary's designee may review the case of any child upon the child's or the juvenile public safety advisory board's reasonable request at any time after release is denied."

SECTION 11. Section 33-9A-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1988, Chapter 101, Section 41, as amended) is amended to read:

"33-9A-3. JUVENILE COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS GRANT FUND CREATED--PURPOSE--ADMINISTRATION--REPORT.--

A. [There is created in the state treasury] The "juvenile community corrections grant fund" is created in the state treasury to be administered by the department. All balances in the fund are appropriated to the department to carry out the purposes of the fund, and [no] money in the fund .209186.2

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shall not be transferred to another fund or be encumbered or disbursed in any manner except as provided in the Juvenile Community Corrections Act. Disbursements from the fund shall be made only upon warrant drawn by the secretary of finance and administration pursuant to vouchers signed by the secretary of [children, youth and families] the department.

B. Money in the fund shall be used by the department to:

(1) make grants to counties or municipalities or to contract for services with private organizations, individually or jointly, to provide community corrections programs and services for the diversion of children adjudicated [delinquents] delinquent and who are identified as being at moderate- or high-risk of reoffending based on a risk assessment pursuant to the Delinquency Act, to community-based [No grant shall be made to] The department shall not contract for services with a private organization that is not a nonprofit organization without the approval of the secretary [The department may also use money in the fund to]; and

- (2) operate or contract directly for [or operate] the operation of juvenile community corrections programs.
- C. No more than ten percent of the money in the fund shall be used by the department for administration and program monitoring by the department. No more than ten percent .209186.2

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of any grant from the fund shall be used for administrative costs incurred by the grantee.

D. After notice and public hearing as required by law, the secretary shall adopt regulations that provide standards for qualifications for grants, priorities for awarding of grants and other standards regarding juvenile community corrections programs deemed necessary. department shall review and approve or disapprove all applications submitted pursuant to the Juvenile Community Corrections Act for a grant of funds from the fund.

- The department shall submit an annual report to the governor and legislature not later than December 15 providing information on grant awards, program effectiveness and monitoring efforts and making recommendations as necessary to carry out the purpose of the fund.
- The department may accept donations, payments, contributions, gifts or grants from whatever source for the benefit of the fund."

SECTION 12. Section 33-9A-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1988, Chapter 101, Section 43, as amended) is amended to read:

"33-9A-5. SELECTION PANELS. --

The department shall establish a state panel [whose duties] which shall [be to immediately screen and] identify [delinquents] children adjudicated delinquent, sentenced to a juvenile correctional facility [of the .209186.2

department] and transferred to the legal custody of the
department, except [individuals] children who are sentenced or
transferred from a judicial district that has established a
local panel to exercise [these] the duties [pursuant to the
provisions of described in this section and who meet the
following criteria:
(1) the child is assessed as being at
moderate- or high-risk of reoffending, based on a risk
assessment using the tool adopted in accordance with Section

9-2A-16 NMSA 1978;

[(1)] (2) the offense involved is one for which community service or reasonable restitution may be made using a payment schedule compatible with the total amount of restitution to be paid and the time the [offender] child is to

participate in a program; and

[(2)] (3) the child is willing to enter into a contract that establishes objectives that [shall be achieved] the child is required to achieve before release from the program.

- B. The department may establish criteria in addition to those established in Subsection A of this section for the screening of [delinquents] children adjudicated delinquent who would benefit from participation in a program and who would not pose a threat to the community.
- C. If the state panel determines that a child is .209186.2

suitable for placement in a program, a recommendation [to-that effect] for placement in a program and for modification of disposition of the child's case shall be presented as soon as possible to the sentencing judge or to the department, [which may, notwithstanding any provision of law] and the judge or the department may accept, modify or reject the recommendation.

The determination shall be presented to the relevant county or municipality [or private nonprofit organization, as applicable] for approval or rejection.


D. A county or municipality or private nonprofit organization, individually or jointly, may establish a local panel to exercise the duties [and responsibilities] of the state panel [pursuant to the provisions of Subsection A of] described in this section and, using the same criteria as the state panel, [the local panel may] to screen and identify [delinquents] children adjudicated delinquent who would benefit from participation in a program. The composition of a local panel shall include, to the maximum extent possible, representatives of the judiciary, the administrative office of the district attorneys, the public defender department, the children, youth and families department, the county sheriff or the municipal police department, individuals representing local relevant programs and private citizens."

SECTION 13. EFFECTIVE DATE. -- The effective date of the provisions of this act is July 1, 2018.

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
