1. CALL TO ORDER

The Santa Fe Regional Juvenile Justice Board was called to order at 5:17 p.m. by Sam Jackson, Chair. A quorum was is reflected in roll call.

3. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

MOTION: Deacon Trujillo moved to approve the agenda as presented with a second from Ms. Romero which passed by voice vote.

4. INTRODUCTIONS OF MEMBERS AND GUESTS

Introductions were made by those present.

5. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF OCTOBER 19, 2017

MOTION: Deacon Trujillo moved to approve the minutes as presented with a second from Mr. Lindahl which passed by voice vote.

6. FINANCIAL REPORT

A.) Budget-Detailed Budget and Financial FY 17/18

Mr. DeMella explained he has received billings from ICM and CIS. (See Exhibit A). He will meet with Mr. Lovato on the re-engagement specialist.

Since the meetings are now bi-monthly he will send the reports ahead of time.

Monthly matches are on target. Youthworks had to move money through a BAR but it was taken care of.

Mr. Lindahl do they have clients for the re-engagement specialist? Mr. DeMella will need to meet with Mr. Lovato he isn't sure until they bill.

Mr. DeMella will send it via email once he gets it.

B.) Approval of Financial Report

MOTION: Mr. Lindahl moved to approve the Financial Report as presented with a second from Deacon Trujillo which passed by voice vote.

7. PRESENTATIONS:

A.) Reconnecting Youth Survey – SF Community Foundation

Ms. Courtney explained the focus group that works with disconnected youth. (See Exhibit B) They partnered with CYFD, DOH and others to design the survey. Youth was involved in the whole process.

Mr. Ruble explained the grant and the project. There were ten youths that were asked to help with the information gathering. They were complete by six weeks. There were 557 completed surveys. There was positive feedback for future surveys. The youth came up with the name Reconnecting.

Ms. Courtney explained how the funding is going to be split by DOH and CYFD.

Deacon Trujillo asked what other work will be done. Mr. Ruble explained other work will be done in accordance with the IRB parameters.

Deacon Trujillo reviewed the survey and asked would they be able to conduct the survey in the detention center in the age range of 18-24? Mr. Ruble explained they would have to review the survey again. The IRB has a different way they evaluate the human subjects.

Mr. Jackson asked about long term incarceration in SF County, the youth are in there for a short time.

Mr. Ruble explained the grant allows them to work with youth up to 27 years old.

Mr. Jackson states there is 18-26 year olds in the facility here. If there are some protections the concerns is to protect their personal information.

Ms. Courtney states they can track it by age and present the data once it is more comprehensive.

Ms. Romero asked about the characteristics of the 39% that were not in school or working?

Ms. Courtney states they allowed any youth to take the survey. Ms. Romero asked if they have just that information on the 39% of youth not enrolled in school. Ms. Courtney states they will have that information there isn't too much of a difference.

Mr. Ruble states there was a focus on behavioral health issues that may result in disconnection.

Mr. Jackson explained that the Board has addressed truancy.

Mr. Lindahl asked about the data being broken down by age groups. It would be interesting to see the categories.

Mr. Ruble it was an anonymous survey and they were offered a gift card to Subway.

Deacon Trujillo asked about how they can find the information on the adult population what was missed.

Mr. Ruble stated a company from Albuquerque and Mr. Green from DOH were gathering the instruments for the data collection.

Mr. Jackson explained the focus groups and how they work.

Ms. Courtney stated they will have both data to help with the numbers.

Mr. Ruble stated it will take time for the funds to process it may not be complete until Spring. This grant serves Santa Fe County.

Mr. Jackson states this survey may help with services. Ms. Courtney states if there are specific data points that the Board wants they are happy to help with that.

Mr. Lucero asked how the children's court systems factored in. Mr. Ruble there were some but not too deeply. Mr. Lucero states he would like to see if their services in the legal field will help.

Mr. Lindahl asked who the evaluators are. Mr. Ruble explained the evaluators. Mr. Lindahl states it will be great for the future.

Mr. Jackson discussed the time spent on preventing youth from moving into the adult system.

Mr. Ruble explained the information about health insurance. He is a chair of a committee that will examine the number of youth who don't know if they have coverage more closely.

Mr. Jackson discussed the older youth have experienced the healthcare system.

Mr. Lindahl explained the youth that did not know they had health insurance he wonders the number of youth that are connected.

Deacon Trujillo would like to see the information from the survey be shared with the rest of the Board.

Mr. Lindahl states this is a good time to gather this data before the administrations change.

Mr. Lucero states he is happy to be here at the meeting and is looking forward to working with the Board and his goals.

8. MATTERS FROM THE BOARD

ACTION ITEM: Sub Committees: Data, Funding and Services.

Vote on placement of members on committees.

Mr. DeMella discussed the chart that a free data collection person did for the Board. (See Exhibit C) SF Community Foundation has the data and a free grant writer. He would like to have a data committee. He reviewed the categories that cover issues like substance abuse. Mr. DeMella explains it is a piece of data.

Mr. DeMella discussed the services that would be covered and what type of funding. He would like the Board to be the driver in the Community.

Mr. Jackson asked if the Board could address the issues. Deacon Trujillo explained the programs committee wasn't able to delve into a lot of the issues. This is a way to voice the Board and push it.

Ms. Romero is interested in the data. The subcommittees can meet as needed. She doesn't want the committees to make decisions but to gather data and drive the services.

Mr. DeMella discussed the different funding sources and the services that are already here.

Mr. DeMella suggests two members per subcommittee. Ms. Romero will work on the data committee if that is what is decided. Mr. Lindahl is also interested.

Deacon Trujillo would like to assist in the services subcommittee. Mr. DeMella suggests Mr. Lindahl also help with the services subcommittee. Mr. Lovato may want to be on the funding committee, Mr. Jackson is interested.

Since other members are absent the subcommittees can be discussed and voted on at the next meeting.

Mr. Jackson discussed that the focus of this Board's effort was to be placed on youth in the system. He would like to see that happen again and support the youth to prevent them from continuing on into the system.

Ms. Romero stated the data can help figure out programs that work.

Deacon Trujillo suggests at the next meeting they discuss recruitment of new members.

There were no matters from the public.

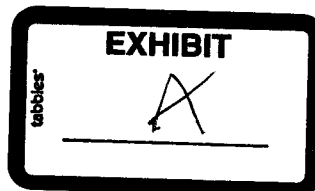

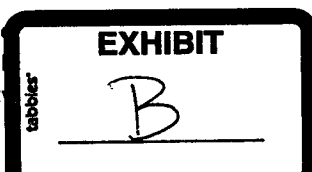

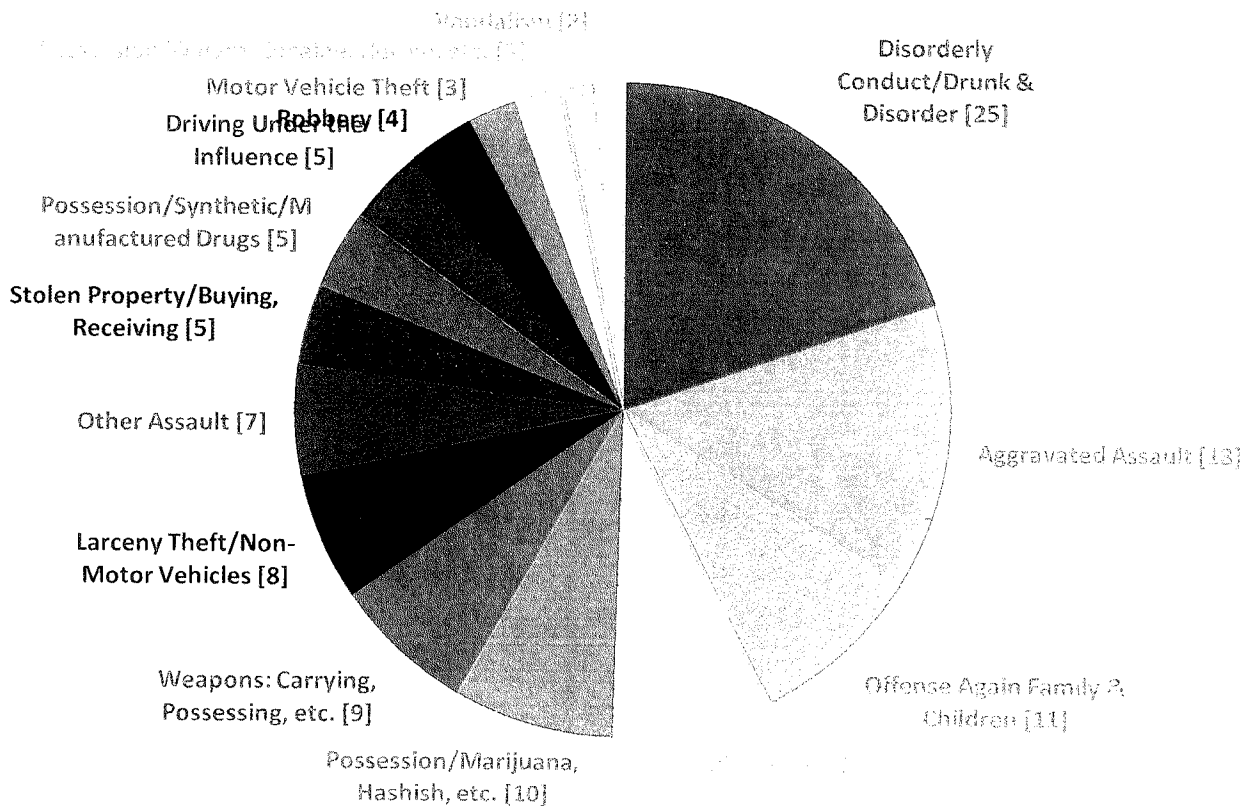

2016 Juvenile Justice Data – Santa Fe

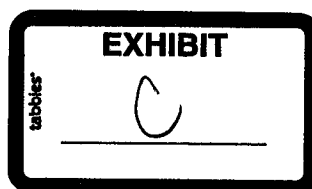
Juvenile Arrests and Referrals

In 2016, the Santa Fe Police Department reported 310 counts of juvenile offenses that led to arrests. The top five offenses were disorderly conduct/drunk and disorder, aggravated assault, offense against family and children, burglary/breaking and entering, and possession of marijuana, hashish, etc. These five offenses accounted for 24.5% of all recorded offenses. The top five offenses in 2016 were also among the top ten offenses committed in 2015.

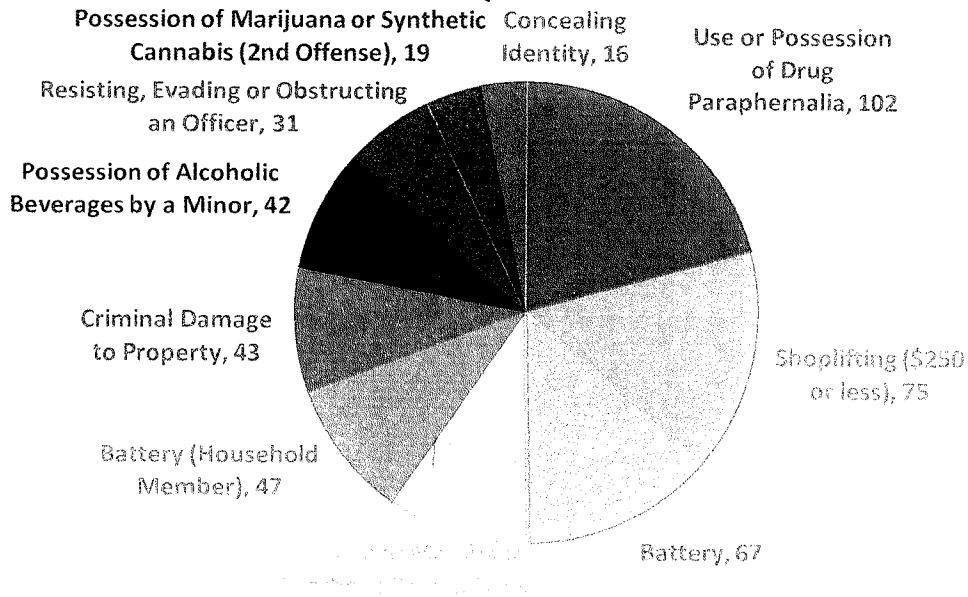
2016 TOP JUVENILE ARREST OFFENSE COUNTS



For fiscal year 2016, CYFD reported 403 clients with delinquent referrals with 846 total offenses in Santa Fe County. Over half of the clients (53.1%) were 16 and 17 years old. The top five offenses were use or possession of drug paraphernalia, shoplifting (\$250 or less), battery, possession of marijuana or synthetic cannabis, and battery of a household member. The main actions taken and dispositions for delinquent referrals were assessment and referrals (45.3%), non-adjudicated (24.6%), and consent decree (15.6%). Only two referrals resulted in juvenile detention.

In Santa Fe county in fiscal year 2016, CYFD also reported 57 clients with probation violation referrals, totaling 209 offenses. The top offenses for probation violation were alcohol/drugs, general behavior (law), special conditions, and school/education. These four offenses constituted 64.1% of the total probation violation offenses. Five probation violation referrals resulted in detention.

CYFD reported 156 clients with status (non-delinquent) referrals, with a total of 163 offenses. Truancy offenses accounted for 98 counts (60.1%), incorrigible for 63 counts (38.7%), and runaway for 2 counts (1.2%).

Truancy

Santa Fe Public Schools (SFPS) has tracked data on truancy and absenteeism through the A2A software program since the 2014-2015 school year. In 2016-2017, the district truancy rate, or number of students who accumulated the equivalent of three or more full days of unexcused absences, was 51.8%. Students who missed 10% or more of the school year due to unexcused absences accounted for 6.3% of the student population. One fifth of SFPS students (20.0%) accumulated the equivalent of seven or more full days of excused absences. The 2016-2017 truancy rates were above 60% in grades 8, 10, 11 and 12. The schools that experienced the highest rates of chronic absences were Capital High School, DeVargas Middle School, Capshaw Middle School, and Ortiz Middle School. All district truancy rates have declined since the district began tracking attendance data in 2014-2015.

Substance Use

The Youth Risk and Resiliency Survey is administered in Santa Fe Public High and Middle Schools every other year. The most current available data is from 2015.

When asked how high school students usually obtained alcohol, the most common response was that the alcohol was given to the student (34.6%). Other responses included giving someone money to purchase alcohol (17.8%), taking alcohol (9.5%), or obtaining it from a store (3.4%). Just over half of the students reported that they usually drank alcohol at another home (50.6%). Students also reported drinking alcohol at their own home (32.6%), at a public event (5.3%), in a public place (4.1%), on school property (3.2%), in a car (2.1%), and in a restaurant or bar (2.1%).

Teen Births

The rate of births to teenagers in New Mexico has been steadily declining since 1990, according to National Kids Count data. Opportunity Santa Fe: Birth to Career has compiled data on disconnected youth (youth ages 16-24 who are not in school and not working). Of the approximately 1500 female disconnected youth in Sant Fe, approximately 36% have children. The percentage of overall female youth who have children is 15%. Female youth with children are three times more likely to be disconnected. Females with more than one child have lower educational attainment than those with one child or no children.
