1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting of the Santa Fe City and County Advisory Council on Food Policy was called to order by Sherry Hooper, Acting Chair, at 9:07 am on Thursday, June 28, 2018, at the Kitchen Angels Conference Room, 3221Siler Road, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

5. COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE FLOOR

6. PRESENTATIONS ASPEN SOLUTIONS EVALUATION PROCESS

Ms. Ray introduced Natalie Skogerboe and Arianna Trott with Aspen Solutions. They are contracted with the City to assist City Contractees with reporting and tools for reporting to the City. They have designed tools for the Food Policy Council within the Food Plan of accomplishments of the Food Council.

Ms. Skogerboe said we are working with the City to help grantees align with the results based accountability program started by the City. They are assisting grantees with performance measures, measuring and reporting.

Aspen Solutions gave a power point presentation which is incorporated into these minutes as Exhibit "1".

Ms. Baran-Rees asked to add regulatory to the measure about policies and resolutions. She also suggested adding advocacy efforts to the measures.

Ms. Baran-Rees asked that when the Council begins sending out surveys a separate survey be formulated for each type of group contacted.

Ms. Henry asked if it was possible to send an electronic thank you after people complete the survey.

Ms. Trott said she is not sure that can be done with Goggle Forms, but she will check on adding a last page to the survey that is a thank you.

Ms. Skogerboe handed out a report of Internal Collaborative Functioning which is the compilation of survey results from the Council. She reviewed the report. This is for the Council's use in moving forward.

Ms. Enright asked if the external communications can be around what we are actually doing rather than focusing on the Food Plan. That may be more easily understood by the general public. We need to have more about the issues represented.

Mr. Rinaldi said the City is requiring more outcomes. It is not business as usual anymore. There were significant cuts in the amounts they funded this year.

Ms. Baran-Rees asked do we have any clear thoughts around civic engagement from communities not getting access around having a voice and how can we advocate for that and work together on that. This is a focus of the Community Foundation.

Chair Hooper said that is a big focus for us as well. To reach out to people and help them use their voice.

Ms. Boies said it is a worthy topic to have as an agenda item in the future for a discussion.

Ms. Roy said we have questioned ourselves as a group on how we do outreach. It always needs to be looked at.

Ms. Baran-Rees said supporting new community leaders in theses areas could be a wonderful thing to report on.

Ms. Roy said what we have not quite captured is how the best benefit folks can be involved and what our role is in that as a Food Policy Council itself.

Ms. Roy said thank you both very much.

7. STAFF COMMUNICATIONS

Ms. Roy said she wanted to give a shout out to Sherry and Gary Fairbrother for their commentary in Sunday's paper about the Supplement Nutrition Program and the Farm Bill. It was a great example of how important it is to get the word out in our communities and how timing is everything. Also a shout out to Sherry and others about the summer feeding programs.

Ms. Boies said the Teen Court provides funding within the County tied into the health action plan, one of which is healthy food consumption for youth.

Chair Hooper said we receive that funding and are able to purchase fresh foods and vegetables for meals here. We are also working with Book Kids in the summer program.

Ms. Enright said she had a "walk with a Councilor" recently during the Santa Fe Walks program with Councilor Abeyta. He spoke very highly about the Boys and Girls Club program that they partner on with the Food Depot.

Ms. Roy said the kitchen at Kaune Elementary School will be able to help you with meals soon. We just completed the joint venture agreements. They are retrofitting the kitchen and will hire a chef and have job training as well and work with the culinary program at the Community College. We hope that the kids in the programs will have hot

meals by October.

8. INITIATIVES AND ACTIONS

A. FOOD PRODUCTION AND LAND USE COMMITTEE

Ms. Ray said the Food Production and Land Use Committee report is in the meeting packet. She reviewed the report.

Ms. Ray said one thing that came out of the Mayor's Working Group was learning about the Santa Fe Green Chamber project on import replacement. The idea that Matt Brown and Glen Schiffbauer discussed is how to get more local foods into things like restaurants and hotels and businesses. Here we are in parallel with that. Glenn came to our committee meeting and shared what they doing. They are just getting started. They have a bit of money for NMSU to do some research. They did find the greatest needs to be meat, eggs and tortilias. Those are the first things they want to work on. There is a conversation around what does that look like. It fits well in our conversations here and with our pilot idea of getting local beef into schools. Now there is a processing facility reopened in Roswell for beef and poultry. They were really interested in that plant being available. It is one of few in New Mexico that is USDA certified. The new owners are very interested. They are using only one-fifth of their production capability there now. Eggs will be tougher. There are some producers in Mora County who supply restaurants. Tortillas we can figure out. He is interested in partnering with us in any way he can.

Ms. Roy said Erin was not able to be here today and asked if we can show her film on at the next meeting.

B. FOOD PLAN COMMITTEE

Ms. Baran-Rees said we have been talking about the components of food economy research that we want to craft and package for the Mayor and Chief of Staff so they can see opportunities for their leadership and to report direct next steps. The big area is local procurement for senior centers and after school programs and to look at other places the City where they might be purchasing food. This would be for the purpose of modeling and being demonstrative and for the City to showcase what it looks like to institute buying local. We are working on a Resolution to set a base line.

Mr. Rinaldi asked when you do that type of policy does it help with the vendors to begin to say if there is this requirement maybe we need to look at ways to provide that request. We deal with the larger companies because they are on the State Vendor List. They don't buy local in those companies. It may be worth moving into a policy on that.

Ms. Baran-Rees said we have to be mindful of supply availability.

Chair Hooper asked do those large companies offer opportunities to locally grown.

Ms. Roy said no, not yet. We have worked with them. Benny Keith and Sysco have tried that. They do work with a few local companies. The good news is at the Federal level there is nothing that says we can't buy local with Federal funding. We figured out how to cut a little portion out for local. Theresa Casados with the County is working on pilot program to use a small portion of her budget to buy local.

Mr. Rinaldi said he would be interested to see how Theresa does that with staff.

Ms. Roy said we could see where we may be able to think that through a bit with Gino and his Food Service Director.

Mr. Rinaldi said it is not difficult, it is the additional time it will take.

Ms. Roy said there is a potential opportunity with Senator Stephanics and her bill on senior centers.

Ms. Enright said she introduced a bill for local produce for senior centers last year.

Ms. Roy said yes, it was for \$500,000. It was introduced late and did not make it through the system. We are anticipating she will be interested in introducing it again. We are going to meet with her and work on the structure of the bill and support for her on it.

Ms. Roy said it would be helpful to learn from Gino and Theresa about processes that would be helpful.

Mr. McCarty asked is ArgiGate working on building the capacity of farmers.

Ms. Boies said she thinks that is a component. She will talk to Erin.

Mr. McCarty said supplies of produced being plowed under is a concern.

Ms. Boies said that is one of the main points of the Sustainability Report.

Ms. Roy said she will send the report from the Mayor's Working Group, Sustainability, out to Policy Council members. She, Gino and Rebecca were there. Rebecca was on the Working Group.

Ms. Baran-Rees said one of the recommendations was a buy local campaign. They are requesting support for a Resolution to do local procurement. It mirrors what we are working on. The Sustainability Working Group also had water and wastewater

and transportation so there were many issues in addition to food. Free bus transportation was in this recommendation as well.

- Ms. Roy said she asked for a presentation from the Sustainability group for August and also for Glenn to come to our meeting to discuss his project.
- Mr. Rinaldi said a memo from the Mayor went out to Division Director staff asking them to have their departments look at the recommendations and give feedback.

C. EDUCATION AND OUTREACH

- Mr. McCarty said our Social Media Policy is in your packet today. He has seen some wonderful posts and shared some.
- Ms. Enright said if you have anything you want included please send it to her or give her a heads up.
 - Mr. McCarty said the Richard Eeds Show is working well.

D. STATE AND NATIONAL ISSUES

- Ms. Roy said the State organization is starting to ramp up to present at the Economic and Rural Committee in October or November and we will be pairing up on water issues in November or December. We can pull the Stephanics bill into that.
 - Ms. Baran-Rees asked is there a policy on who becomes a registered lobbyist.
- Ms. Roy said it depends on how much time you spend on advocating for issues and how much time you spend on specific legislation. We have no official policy on that.
- Ms. Roy said she registers because she works there day in and day out. Is it advocacy or is it a job that is paid to do lobbying.
- Ms. Baran-Rees said for her organization she has to register if she wants to testify at a committee hearing.
 - Ms. Roy asked should we do something for a policy here.
- Ms. Baran-Rees said not necessarily. If we foresee intensive work happening we just need to make sure all of us have taken care of what we have to do at our jobs.
- Ms. Enright said you can still do things as an individual. Registering does insulate you from a lot of things.

Ms. Roy said the Farm Bill report is in your packet. She reviewed the report. The House passed a bad bill last week. The Senate is now working on it.

Ms. Enright asked if Pam could formulate a simple statement for people to use to engage with their delegations.

Ms. Roy said she will get something out to her and to all the Policy Council members with 4 or 5 key points.

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Internal Collaborative Functioning

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The Internal Collaborative Functioning Scale is designed to provide a global measure of how workgroups function. The eleven components include, chared vision, goas and objectives, coles, and responsibilities, decision making procedures, comflict management, leadership, planning trust in relationships, communication, and evaluation. Research links these areas to highly effective boards and are components that help propel and sustain community change efforts.

One of the driving forces of the SFFPC is partnerships. The goal of the Internal Collaborative Functioning Score is or consoler a quick sasessment of the state of the partnerships on the SFFPC and use the results to further phance the SFFPC areas of strength and set goals for a partnerships are sets of or improvement. This tool in provides only a point-mitime suspicious, as one member horizated on their surviver this tool is not ideal for assessing the complexity of a group. The purpose is to assess the current functioning of the council, ideally beannually, or annually, in order to stategically focus discussion and set goals for the council. The continued use of this scale will help to improve the effectiveness and collaborative efforts of the SFFPC.

In an effort to establish a baseline for how the SFPC functions, nine (3) members completed the Internal Collaborative functioning Scale between May 24, 2018 and June 6, 2018, If you (1) surveys were collected upon a person at the council meeting and seven (7) were collected using an online version of the survey, Individual council members rated each of the eleven components from 1 (lowest) to 7 (highest) based on how they thought the SFEC normally functions. The average scores are criplayed below from lowest to highest.

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The SEFPC has a fairly high point-in-time level of collaborative functioning. No items fell below a four when the ratings of serve compiled. Across all items it in SEFPC had an average rating of 5.5. However, there were ratings of four, three, and one on individual feedback forms. This is an indication that that one recyprove on the SEFPC is in agreement until the strength of cancher. This is an expected outcome when using a swale tool and provides an opportunity to addires group and individual concerns about the functioning of the SEFPC.
