Chair Rivera read a statement of the background and great work of Mr. Candelaria. He presented Mr. Candelaria with a Muchos Gracias award from the Mayor.

Chair Rivera and the members of the Committee congratulated Mr. Candelaria.

Chair Rivera said the City is fortunate to have him.

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

7. SANTA E RIVER WATERSHED YIELD AND FORECASTED SANTA FE RIVER FLOWS. Alan Hook

Mr. Hook stated that this report was requested by the Chair.

The report is herewith attached to these minutes as Exhibit "1".

Mr. Hook reviewed the report and stated that the kids fishing derby will occur this year.

Chair Rivera thanked Mr. Hook for the information.

Chair Rivera asked the reservoirs are never at 100% are they.

Mr. Hook said if we do it just right they can be up to 90%. We stay short of the maximum in case of a big rain and great snow pack. That is the operational guideline.

8. WATER RIGHTS, WATER AVAILABILITY AND 2018 DEMAND
Bill Schneider

Mr. Schneider handed out a presentation.

The presentation is herewith attached to these minutes as Exhibit "2".

Mr. Schneider gave the presentation.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said thank you for all of that. When you say City well field optimization what does that mean.

Mr. Schneider said we did a rigorous City well field study. It looked at a series of analysis of how the City can best meet City water demands within the confines of the City well field. It determined that through well rehab and replacement, transmission upgrades and modifications of how we store water we can optimize.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said back to acquiring water rights for the Buckman well field, the amount of water we can pump is 1,500 acre feet. We have acquired water rights to be able to pump that amount. The water right acquisition program is trying to acquire more water rights to give us the ability to pump more up to what we are permitted to do within that right. Is that correct.

Mr. Martinez said what Bill stated is correct. The amount of offsets the City has limits the amount of pumping we can do. The Buckman well agreement says 10,000 acre feet, but in reality it is 1,200 acre feet.

Councilor Villarreal said thank you Bill for the comprehensive report. On the strategy you mentioned 100% consumption of San Juan Chama water. What is the reasoning behind that strategy and how will that be achieved.

Mr. Schneider explained in 2017 we completed a study for reclaimed water. It looked to effectively maximize to the fullest extent the City's imported water. The San Juan Chama water. The City is able to get credits for unused water and the contract states that the City also has the ability to fully consume that water. If we use San Juan Chama water we can relax our City wells and Buckman for times of emergency. We are exploring a multitude of options. There has to be more than one answer on how that goal is achieved, but it is critical for our water sustainability.

Councilor Villarreal asked then what happens to other communities if we tap into that 100%.

Mr. Schneider said as a part of our strategy under reuse the Water Division and the City in its entirety has agreed to continue to release non San Juan Chama water to the Living River. We would not dry up the Santa Fe River below the plant. It is a focused effort to not deplete our native water.

Councilor Villarreal said she is thinking more upstream rather than down stream. It seems there would be implications, but she doesn't know what that looks like. If we consume more based on our agreement how does that effect everyone else.

Mr. Schneider said in 2018 we had the 3rd worse drought in 75 years. The City honored our agreements for the Living River and we did to the point where we ran out of water at Nichols and McClure. Regarding the upper basin we continued with the Living River and maximized Canyon Road so we complied with our permit.

Mr. Martinez said he did not think we were getting to Councilor Villarreal's entire question. Are you thinking of the communities in New Mexico or elsewhere.

Councilor Villarreal said New Mexico.

Mr. Martinez said one of the big picture goals of having the San Juan project, conceived in the 60s, was to not adversely effect communities. From the Compact New Mexico takes a portion of the Colorado River and that augments the water available to New Mexico. One of the purposes was to not simply take native water, but also to look for other sources of water to augment these supplies. Making the pie larger rather than having to split up the pie that is being reduced. That is a benefit that the City of Santa Fe gets for being a San Juan Chama contractor.

Councilor Villiarreal said thank you for that explanation.

Councilor Villarreal said on the trends of consumption she is curious if you know why it drops drastically in 2001 and 2002.

Mr. Schneider said he is not the expert of this sort of thing, but he can get Christine to send you additional information. Right around that time the City imposed rate increases and an expansion of the reuse system and pretty strick conservation measures were put in place. We will get you more.

Councilor Villiarreal said thank you. That was helpful.

Chair Rivera asked have we exhausted all the retrofit water rights out there.

Mr. Martinez said there are still some. The City has made some very good steps in the right direction by having the buy back programs. The City can advertise again that we are ready to close the book on toilet retrofits for good.

Chair Rivera asked do you know how much is left.

Mr. Martinez said he would guess a couple of a hundred acre feet.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said the Water Conservation Division has kicked off a series of public meetings to kick off a Five Year Conservation Plan. She wanted to point out also that the San Juan Chama water is essentially Colorado River water. We share that with seven states. It has been in the news quite a bit because the Colorado River is not increasing with climate change. It is likely to reduce by 20% or more in the future. It is a volatile water source. It will not be there indefinitely. It adds to the complexity of our water supply and where we get it from. She wanted to add that information for context.

Char Rivera said thank you Bill. We appreciate it.

Mr. Jones said for clarification when we say fully consuming San Juan Chama water that does not mean we fully consume all the water rights we have. It means we fully consume what we have access to.

Councilor Villarreal said thank you for that clarification.

9. PROVIDE INFORMATION REGARDING THE RECYCLING DROP-OFF SITE NEIGHBORHOOD SURVEY AT FORT MARCY PARK. Shirlene Sitton

Ms. Sitton handed out the results of the survey.

The documents are herewith attached to these minutes as Exhibit "3".

Ms. Sitton said to recap where we are, in October/November the Environmental Services staff did an on site survey at the Ft. Marcy site. We received 160 responses. She worked with the Zozobra folks and got a usable email list of users in the area. We added a few more. We sent out 185 emails for the email survey. We sent the survey out in January and it closed in February. We received a total of 40 responses to the email survey. She worked with the District 1 Councilors to make sure the questions were the ones they wanted answered. Of the 40 it appears most do live in our target area. 24 were within a half a mile or less. Unfortunately for some reason some people chose other as to where they lived. Overall she tried to give you the real meat and potatoes of the results in the handout. The answers you were most interested in were from the people who indicated they lived the closest. Of the 24, 11 said they never or rarely ever hear noise. 7 said the noise regularly effects their quality of life. 10 wanted the site to stay open. 9 wanted to close it entirely. 3 had no preference. She has done the best she can with low cost and limited resources. If the Committee wants a more rigorous survey she will have to hire that out. You have 2 surveys with all 40 responses where we included all the comments. It is all there. The second one is with the half mile filter and is 24 respondents.

Chair Rivera said thank you.

Councilor Villarreal said thank you Shirlene for working with us on this. She will look at it in more detail. After this will the results be given to the respondents of the survey.

Ms. Sitton said no. That is not part of the program.

Councilor Villarreal said she wonders if we should do that.

Ms. Sitton said she can post it on her website.

Councilor Villarreal asked could you also sent the results via email.

Ms. Sitton said we could use the same email list to direct people to the website.

Councilor Villarreal said that would be helpful. Thank you.

Councilor Romero-Wirth asked what was the response rate.

Ms. Sitton said 40 out of 185.

Councilor Romero-Wirth asked the list was from Zozobra.

Ms. Sitton said the majority was and the Councilors added more.

Councilor Romero-Wirth asked do you have any sense of how many people live in the area so we would know of that how many people we contacted.

Ms. Sitton said she did not have the exact number. For a more statistically significant survey she will have to hire that out to a survey service.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said this does not seem statistically significant.

Ms. Sitton said no, it is not.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said she just wants to be clear about what we are looking at.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said she does not mean to belittle all the work that was done. Thank you for undertaking what you could do.

Councilor Villarreal said this is another iteration of what we first tried at the site. Those people did not necessarily live there. The email people do live there. This is just another level. She was contacted by a survey company who does surveys for

communities to see if we wanted to use their services, but that costs money.

Chair Rivera said thank you Shirlene for the information.

Bill Schneider

Councilor Romero-Wirth said tell us what this is for and not for and what this allows the Water Division to do.

Mr. Schneider said historically we have had on call services. We are bringing forth this request for two contracts trying to get a bit more competitive. We have a \$16 million CIP and a multitude of projects. These contracts are all inclusive. Under the scope these contracts have the ability to provide a multitude of services. We hope to get 10 to 12 CIP projects with the emphasis on maximization of City wells. We will rehab the Torreon well and potentially replace the 40 plus year old Ferguson well. If successful that will enable us to work faster and smarter to implement the CIP. It is not designed to go forth with 100% engineering design on the reuse pipeline. It will allow us to collect information so that if the City decided the pipeline is the best solution to the City water issues we will have the information. This is a well thought out RFP we put out. We received seven applicants. We required them to write plans specific to the City needs. These 3 firms rose to the top.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said to the reuse pipeline, we pulled last week the amendment to the Corrello contract which is being reworked to do more engineering work with Corrello on the four options identified in the feasibility study and that will be coming back here for approval.

Mr. Schneider said correct.

Chair Rivera said those questions are similar to some of the questions we received at Council. Some of the Councilors were curious why Corrello and Hazen were chosen over some of the others.

Mr. Schneider passed out a handout describing the scoring.

The scoring handout is herewith attached to these minutes as Exhibit "4".

Mr. Schneider said some of the key differentiators were tied to the work plan and schedule development. The intent of the Water Division was to learn what firms really understood our complicated water system as well as past proved experience. He personally called Albuquerque and others to make sure these firms met the expectations. These two firms rose to the top across the board.

Chair Rivera recommended that Mr. Schneider include this handout in the packet for Council.

Chair Rivera asked were Corrello and Hazen the lowest bid.

Mr. Schneider said the selection was based more on qualifications rather than cost. We did look at the hourly rate for engineers and geologists and others and did compare for best prices. Really the aspect of value added engineering will be identified on the task orders. Some firms work smarter and faster.

Chair Rivera said he gets that, but he is trying to address what other Councilors may ask as this moves forward in the process.

Chair Rivera said if both these firms had the highest amounts of fees how did the scores come to this number.

Mr. Schneider said all three of the evaluators looked at these items from different viewpoints so the scoring is a bit different. We were looking for the best overall firm.

Chair Rivera said you are going to get a question about the fees and the scoring on them. If you can include a justification of why someone with the lowest bid would not get highest score as to proposed fees that will be helpful going forward.

Mr. Schneider said we did not ask for a fee amount. We asked for qualifications and graded it. We compared and contrasted the firms, but some firms do not understand doing water projects in New Mexico. We are looking for the highest quality for the best value.

Chair Rivera said coming up with a good explanation for the last part of what you said would be good.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said back to the reuse question and getting the contract amendment for Corrello, before the City moves forward you mentioned that the Water Division would come forth with an RFP proposal of 100% design of the pipeline. Before that happens and as part of the Corrello contract and possibly in addition to it is the Water Division's plan to seek more public input and understanding of the feasibility study and the four alternatives before you come back with 100% design of the pipeline. Is that accurate.

Mr. Schneider said he concurs 100%.

Councilor Romero-Wirth said she just wanted to make that clear.

MOTION A motion was made by Councilor Romero-Wirth, seconded by Councilor Villarreal, to approve the request.

VOTE The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

Chair Rivera said he had a question on Cottonwood where this handout and the packet differ.

Ms. Sitton said Cottonwood scored pretty low. It was by far the lowest price, but it was not inclusive of all the tasks on the RFP. The experience was not applicable.

Chair Rivera said as this goes to Finance explaining why the lowest bid proposals were not selected and what was the thought behind that is important. You would think the lowest score would score the highest. Add an explanation in your packet for Finance.

Mr. Puglisi said Cottonwood scored 9.15 total. That number on the handout is incorrect. Cottonwood did not submit an appropriate response to the RFP. They just restated what was said in the RFP and gave a date to do it.

Chair Rivera said you assume all the bidders can do the work. Justifying the scores is important.

Ms. Sitton said of the 3 we thought could do the work we did award to the lowest cost.

Chair Rivera said update this and add it to the packet as it moves through the process.

MOTION A motion was made by Chair Rivera, seconded by Councilor Romero-Wirth, to approve the request.

VOTE The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

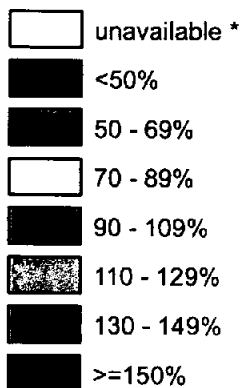

New Mexico SNOTEL Current Snow Water Equivalent (SWE) % of Normal

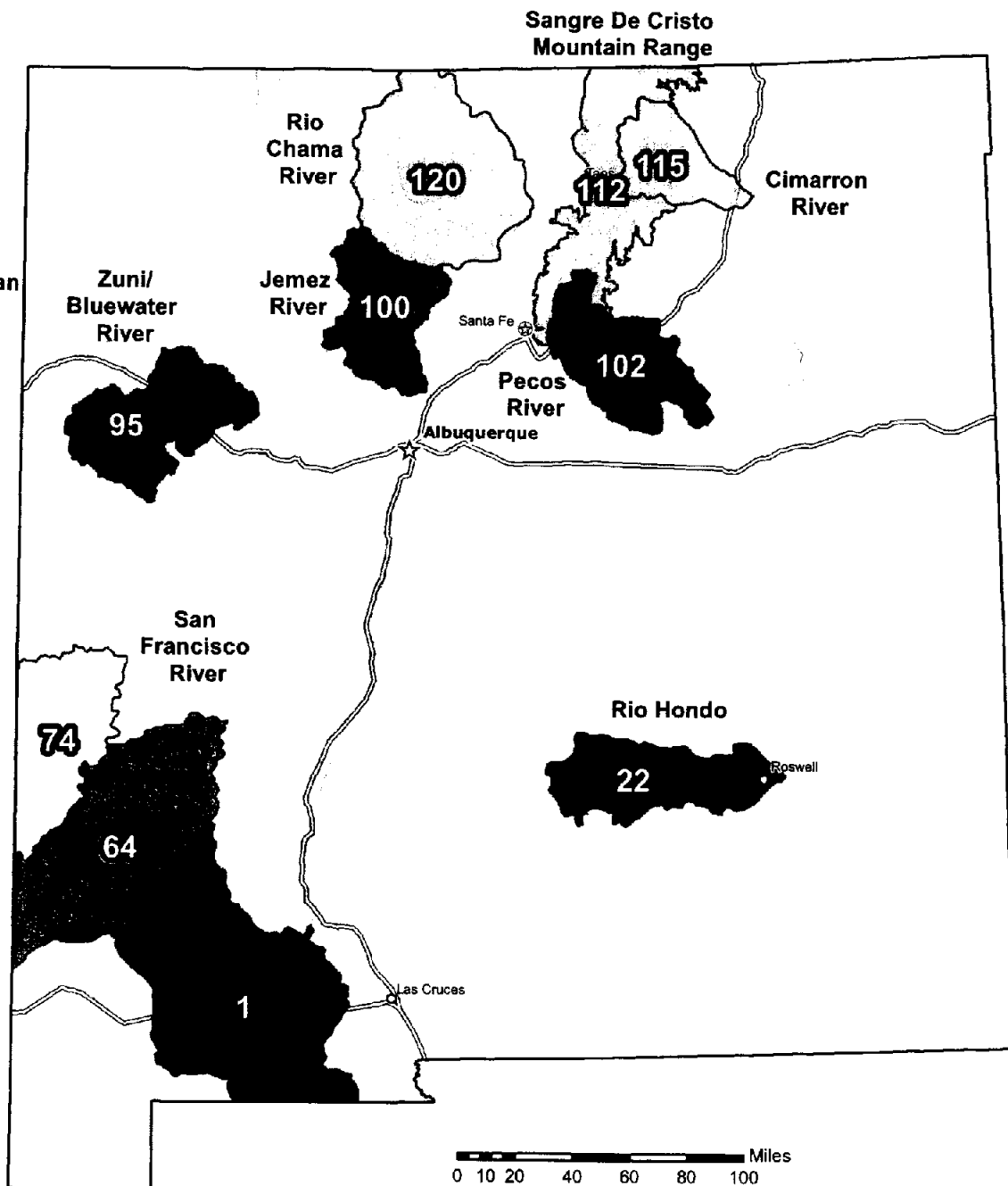

City of Santa Fe Sources of Water Supply

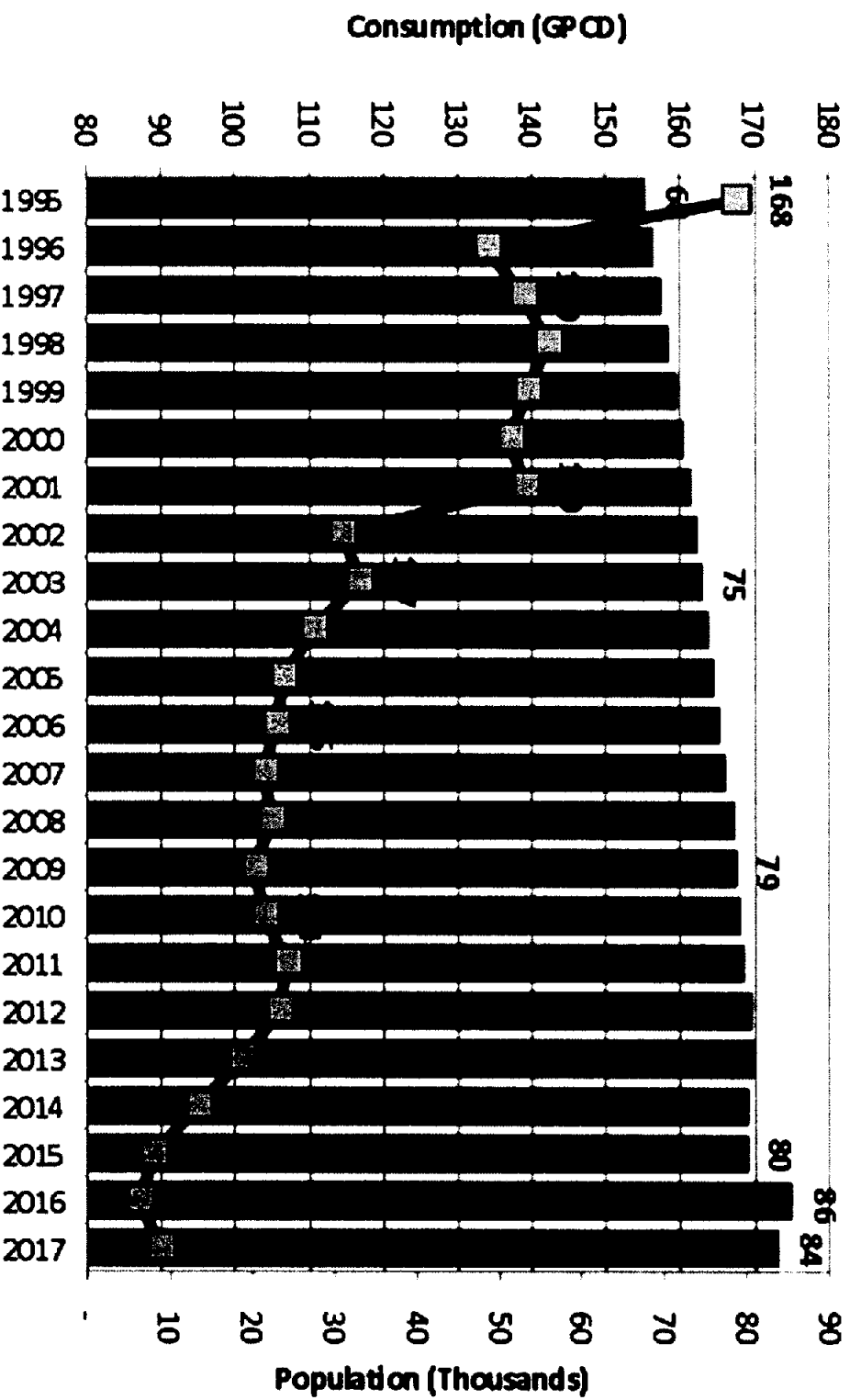


City of Santa Fe Annual Production 1995 - 2017

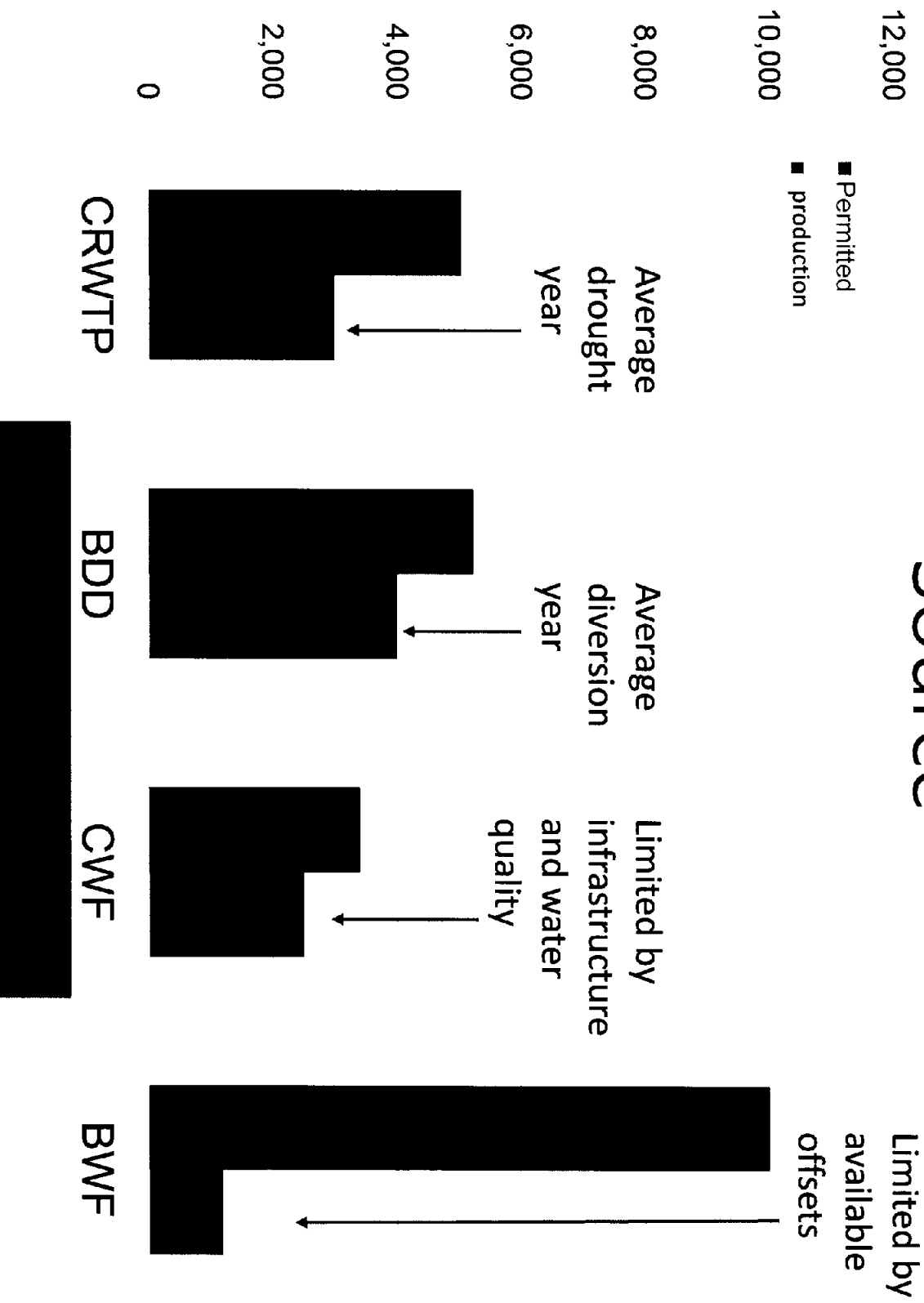

Permitted vs Current Production by Source



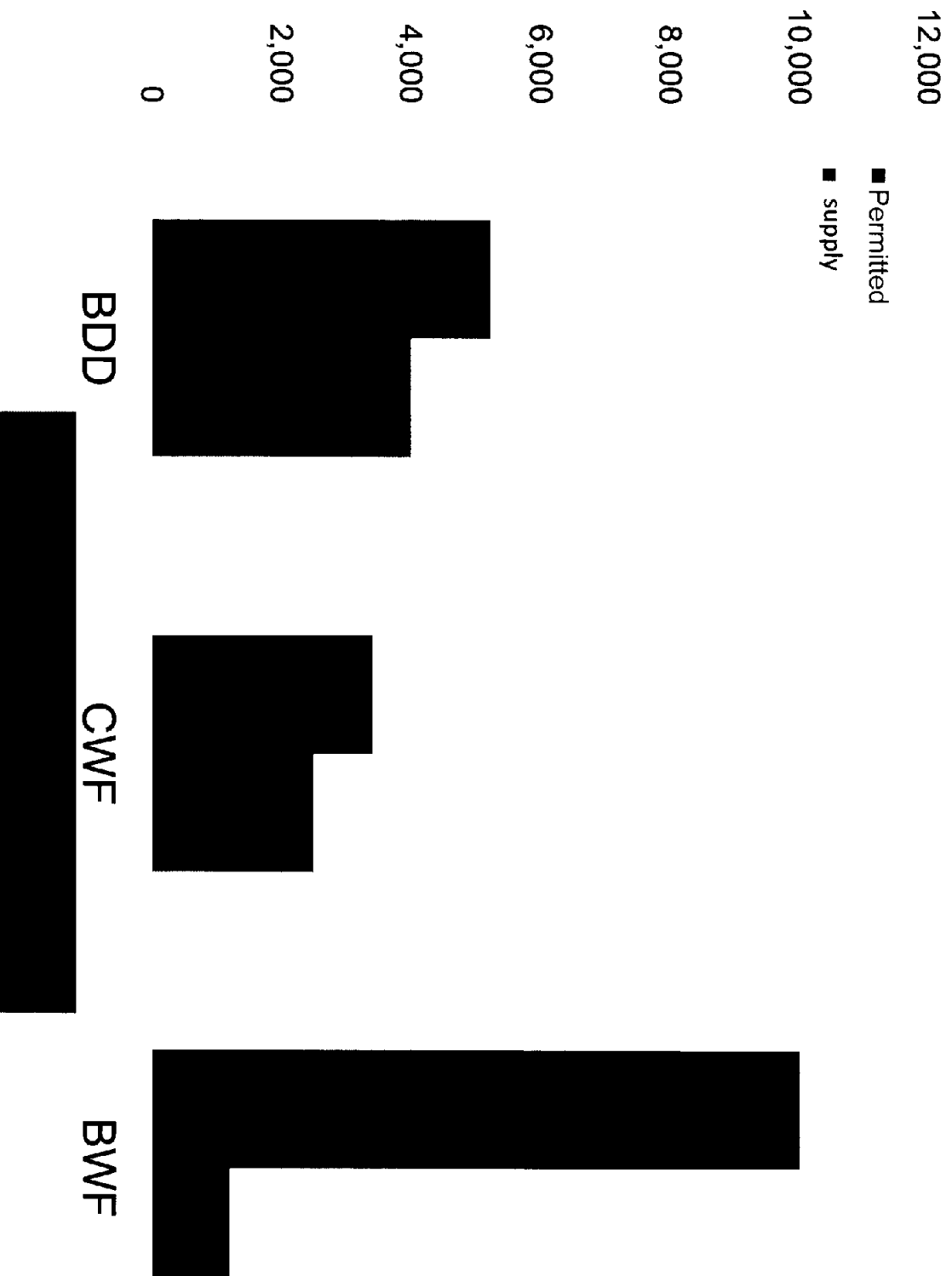
Bonito Lake Scenario

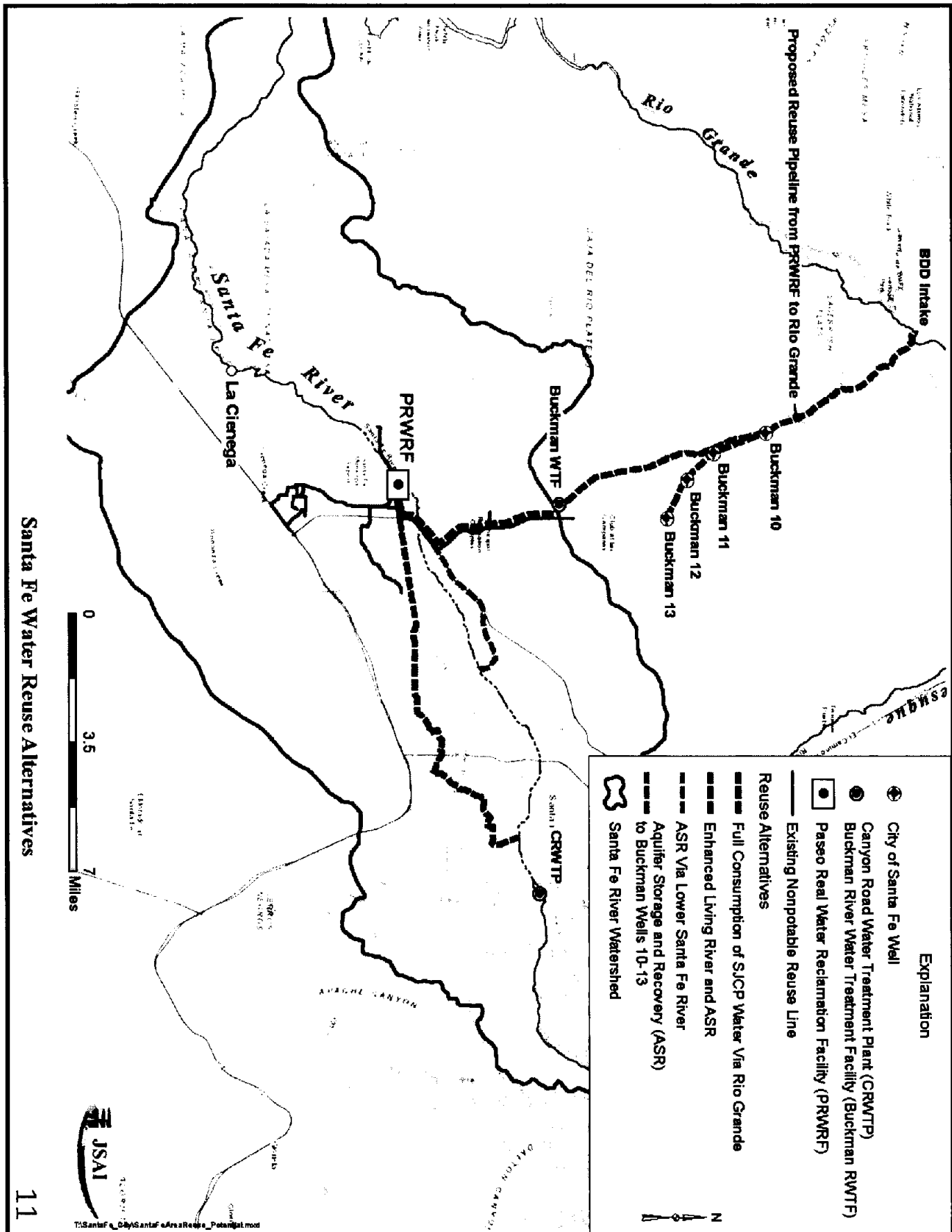
Eagle Creek Watershed several years after Little Bear Fire

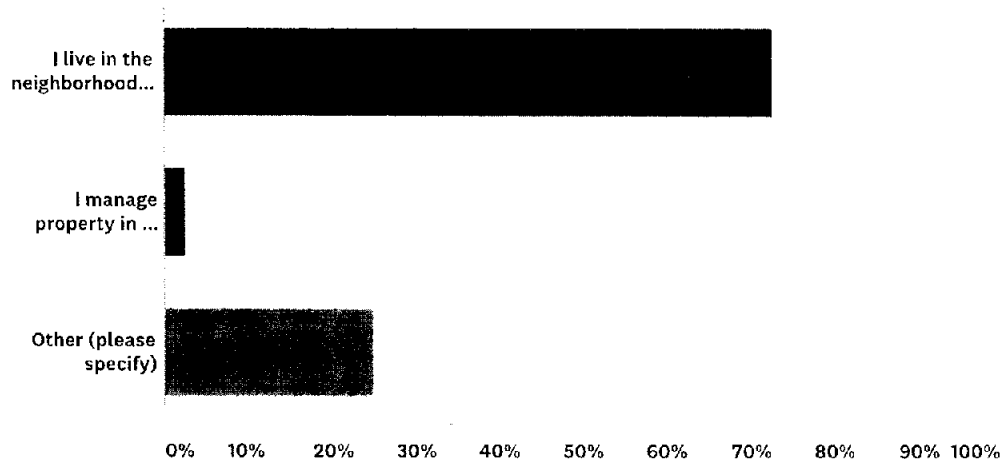

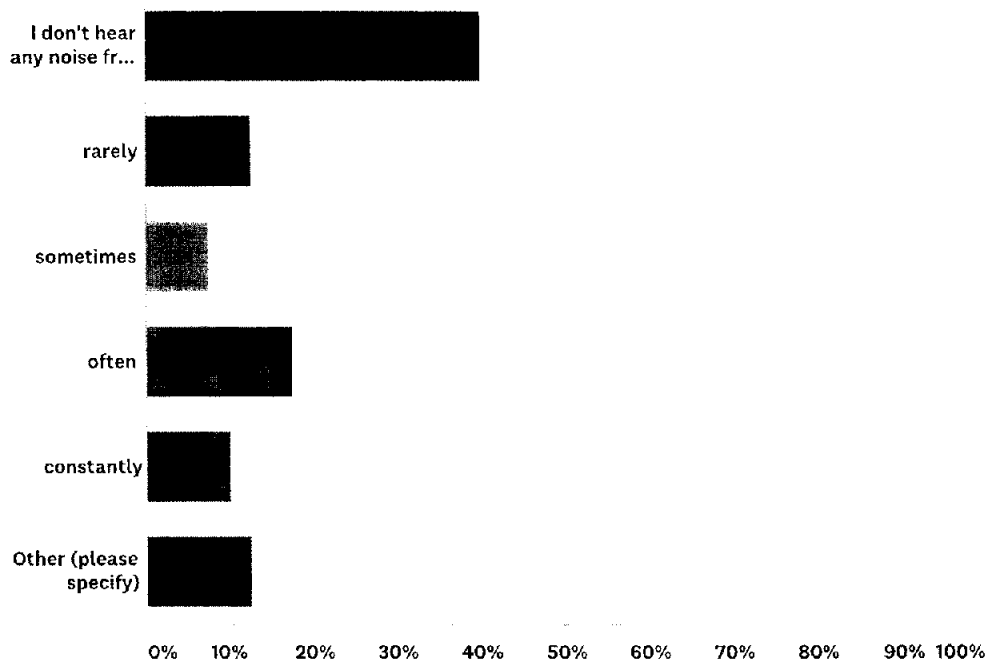

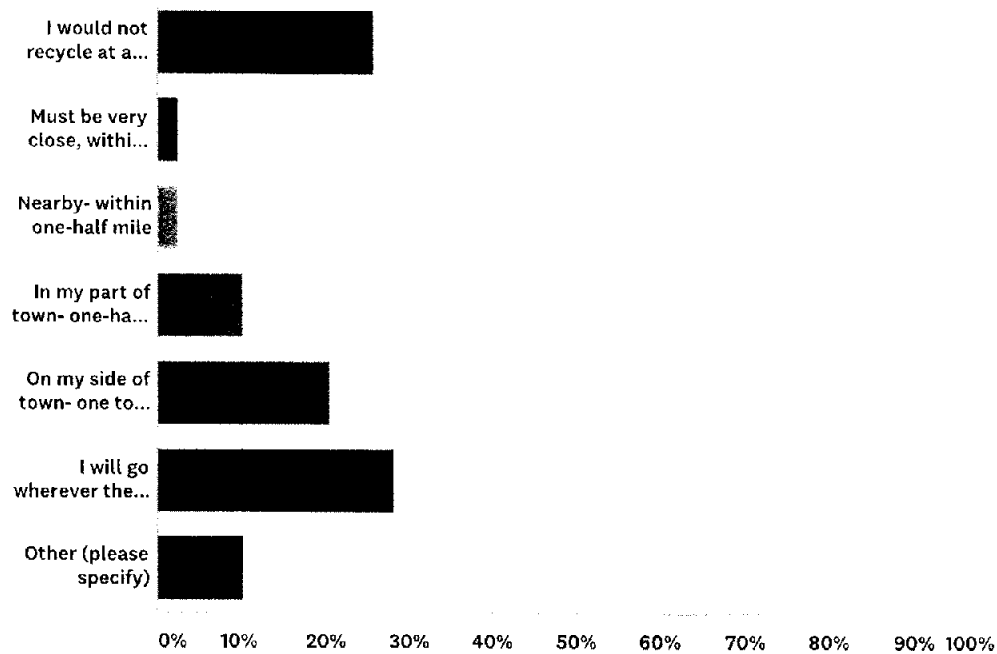

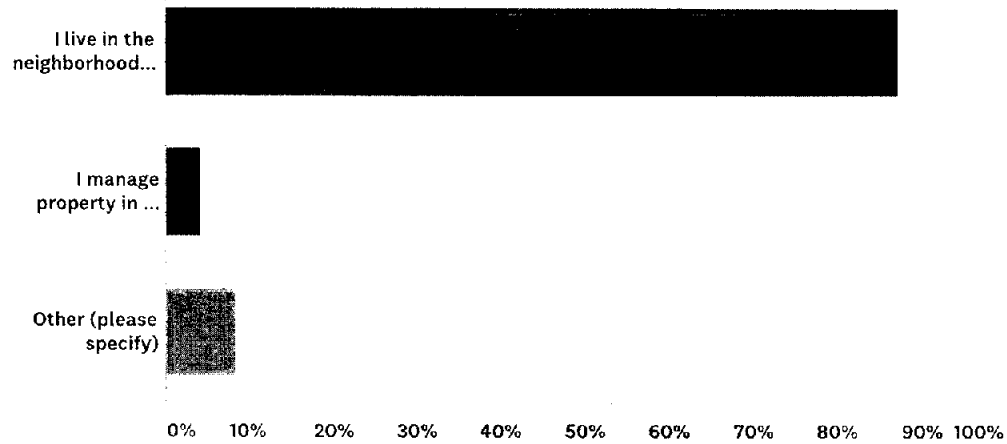

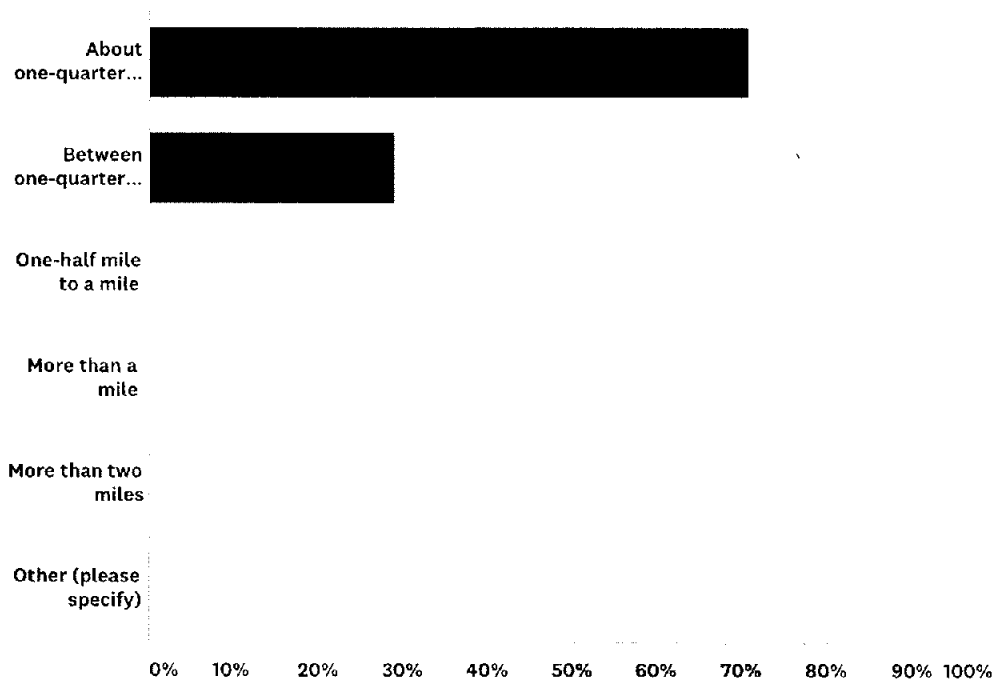

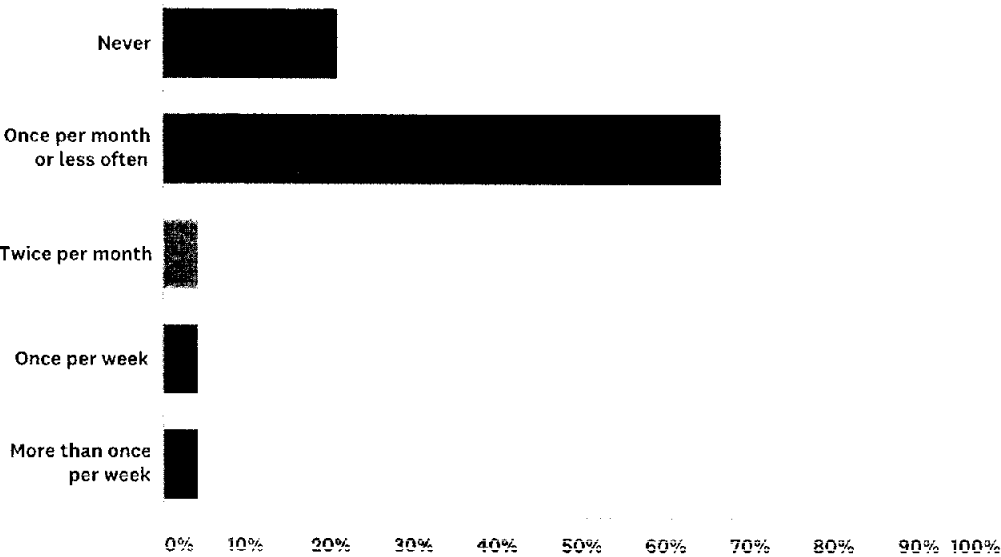

Q3 How often do you recycle GLASS at the Ft. Marcy Recycling Drop-Off Site?

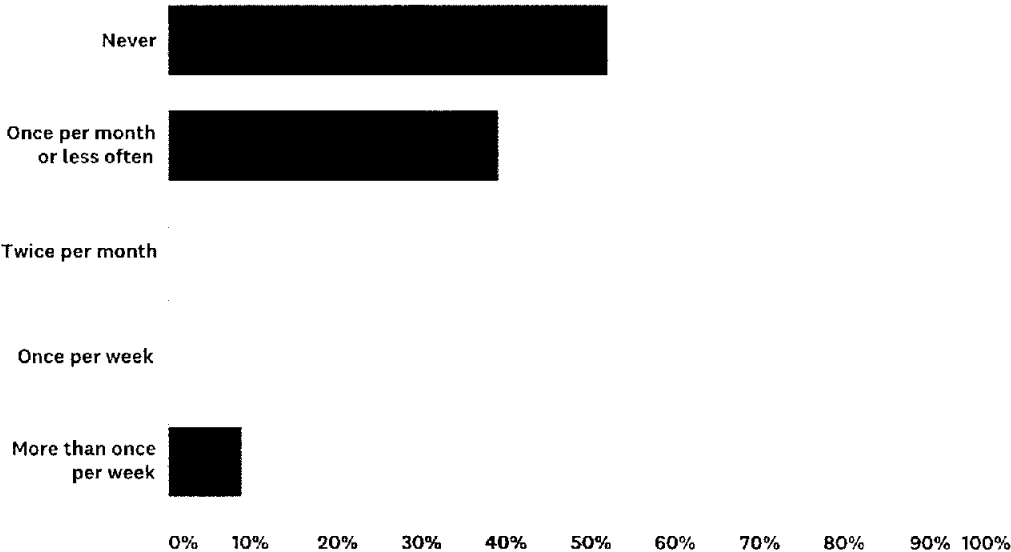

Q4 How often to you recycle other items (plastic, cans, paper, cardboard) at the Ft. Marcy Recycling Drop-Off Site?

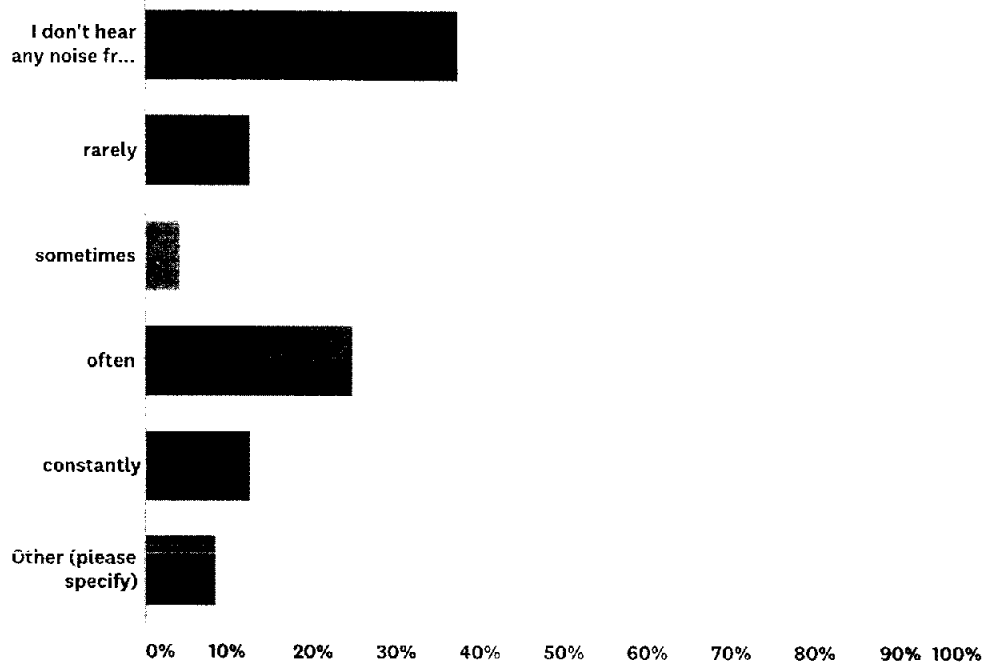

Q5 How often do you hear noise from recycling activities the Ft. Marcy Recycling Drop-Off Site?

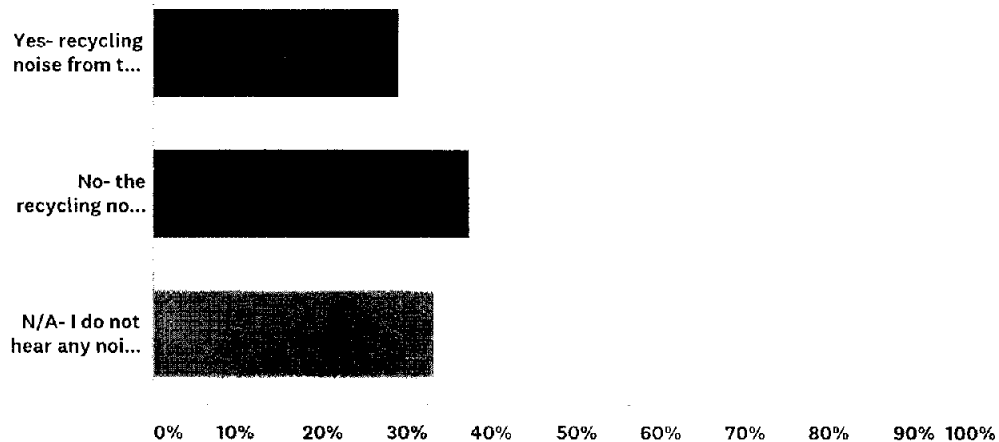

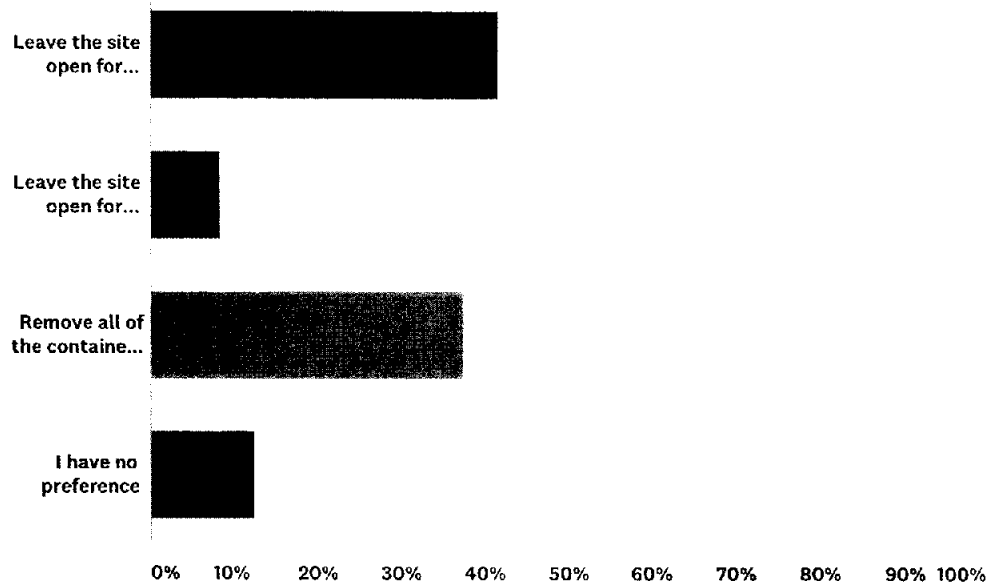

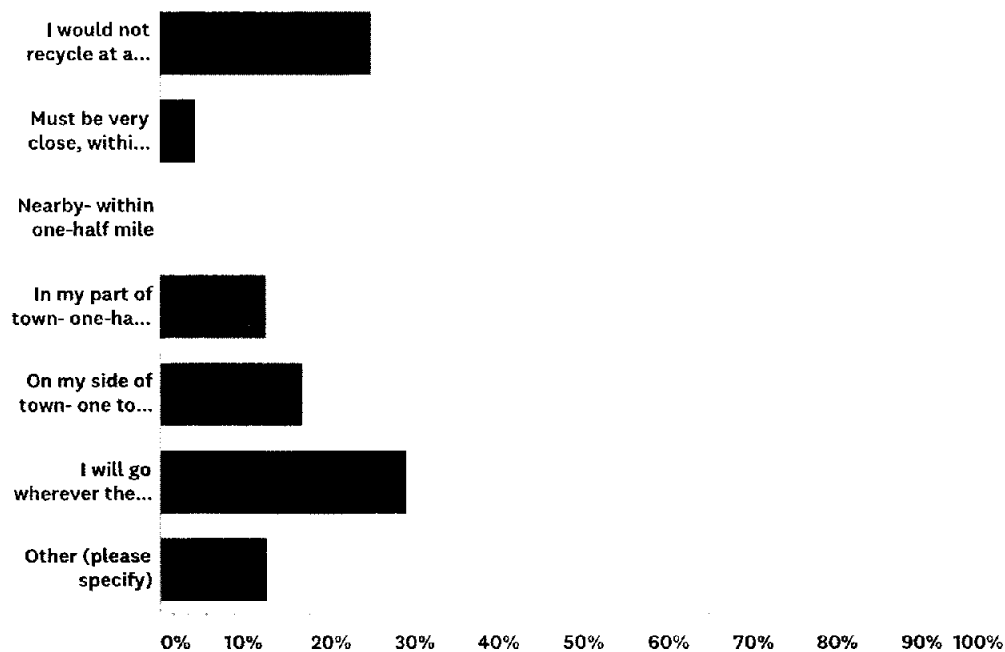
