11	SUPPORTING THE STATE'S DRUG COURT PROGRAM AND REQUESTING THAT
12	FUNDING FOR THE DRUG COURT PROGRAM BE A STATE PRIORITY.
13	
14	WHEREAS, residential burglaries in the city of Santa Fe have increased by 36% through
15	September of this year compared to the same period in 2009 while auto burglaries have increased
16	by about 24%; and
17	WHEREAS, former Santa Fe County Sheriff Greg Solano, Santa Fe Police Chief Aric
18	Wheeler, District Attorney Angela "Spence" Pacheco, and District Court Judge Michael E. Vigil
19	attest to the fact that drugs are the prime motivator for residential and car burglaries in Santa Fe; and
20	WHEREAS, drug courts are designed to provide community-based treatment and
21	supervision to selected offenders who are identified as having substance abuse issues; and
22	WHEREAS, drug courts work closely with the judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys,
23	probation/parole authorities and other corrections personnel, law enforcement, pre-trial service
24	agencies, law enforcement, vocational rehabilitation, education and housing, and treatment
25	providers; and

WHEREAS, statistics show that, of the 300 criminals who have passed through a drug court program, only 12% have re-offended, while 40% of criminals sent to prison have re-offended; and

WHEREAS, the cost of the drug court program is estimated to be around \$2,200 per person per year compared to around \$30,000 for incarceration; and

WHEREAS, the Santa Fe Neighborhood Network sponsored a recent event, Crime & Justice: A Town Forum on Crime in our Neighborhoods, that was attended by city and county officials, public school officials and over 120 neighbors from every part of Santa Fe; and

WHEREAS, it seemed obvious to everyone at the forum that the drug court program is a long-term solution to crime in our neighborhoods and the community at large, yet state funding has been cut for the program; and

WHEREAS, by unanimous vote of those in attendance at the forum it was agreed to petition the Governor asking for help to reduce crime in our neighborhoods by restoring funding to the drug court program through the use of stimulus funds and available discretionary monies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE that although the state of New Mexico has many critical financial needs, the Governing Body supports the state's drug court program as part of the community's ongoing efforts to reduce crime and respectfully requests that funding for the drug court program be a state priority.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Clerk is directed to give a copy of this resolution to the Governor.
