11	TERMINATING PARTICIPATION IN THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL CONTRACT
12	FOR THE NORTH CENTRAL REGIONAL TRANSIT DISTRICT AND
13	WITHDRAWING FROM THE DISTRICT.
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15	WHEREAS, the North Central Regional Transit District (hereinafter referred to as
16	"NCRTD") was created by agreement of the City of Espanola, Los Alamos County, Pojoaque
17	Pueblo, Rio Arriba County, San Ildefonso Pueblo, San Juan Pueblo, Santa Clara Pueblo, the City
18	of Santa Fe, Santa Fe County and Tesuque Pueblo in 2006 pursuant to NMSA 1978, §§ 73-25-1
19	et seq. (2003); and
20	WHEREAS, Section 11.04 of the Intergovernmental Contract that created the NCRTD
21	provides that a member of the District may withdraw from the Regional Transit District by
22	adopting a resolution of withdrawal; and
23	WHEREAS, the Board of the NCRTD has announced its intention to levy a gross
24	receipts tax pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 7-20E-23 (2004,2007), which has variously been
25	described as a 1/8% or 3/16% tax increment; and

WHEREAS, the NCRTD has not demonstrated a need for the substantial revenue that a gross receipts tax levy would generate, nor has the NCRTD analyzed the possible impact of the proposed gross receipts taxation on gross receipts tax funding for operating the Rail Runner or for other projects; and

WHEREAS, if operations of the Rail Runner are ultimately funded from the gross receipts tax, the possibility exists that taxpayers in Santa Fe County will experience double taxation ---a gross receipts tax levy in favor of the NCRTD and a separate gross receipts tax levy to benefit the Rail Runner project, as well as the certainty that transportation in Northern New Mexico will be governed by multiple jurisdictions with no assurance that those jurisdictions will work together to achieve a coherent and efficient transportation system; and

WHEREAS, an example of the anomalous results that will be created by a multi-jurisdictional approach to transit planning is the fact that if the NCRTD's current proposal for a 1/8% gross receipts tax is approved by the voters, Santa Fe County residents will provide \$4.6 million a year in tax revenue for the District but receive only \$3.3 million in transit services, and the rest will be a subsidy for the other counties in the District; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the potential for double taxation in Santa Fe County, it is apparent that the NCRTD has failed to provide compelling reasons for additional revenue and has failed to provide a concrete plan for improving its transportation services if the new levy is approved; and

WHEREAS, new taxes should only be undertaken if strictly necessary to serve a compelling governmental need, and since the potential for double taxation exists and the other ramifications of the proposed tax have not been carefully studied, the City should not participate in the NCRTD until a compelling need for the proposed new taxation is demonstrated and the relationship between the goals of the NCRTD and the Rail Runner project are adequately addressed; and

WHEREAS, the proposals provided by the NCRTD to justify the gross receipts tax
assumes direct dollar-far-dollar funding of transit projects with very little federal contributions,
but if this is the case, it would be more cost-effective for the City to provide directly for Santa Fe
County's transit service with funding from the County of Santa Fe; and
WHEREAS, recent discussions have yielded promising alternatives to the proposal of
the NCDRT to accomplish Santa Fe's transit needs, including creating a Santa Fe Regional
Transit District with the County of Santa Fe through the Regional Planning Authority or other

the NCDRT to accomplish Santa Fe's transit needs, including creating a Santa Fe Regional

Transit District with the County of Santa Fe through the Regional Planning Authority or other
appropriate entity, undertaking intergovernmental agreements or transit service agreements to
accomplish needed connections with the Rail Runner project with the County of Santa Fe, the
New Mexico Department of Transportation, the Mid-Region Council of Governments (MRCOG),
the Mid-Regional Regional Transit District or the North Central Regional Transit District; and

WHEREAS, City staff and staff of the Santa Fe County should investigate each of these

alternatives, and other promising ideas that arise, so that the local governments and the public can make informed and intelligent decisions concerning transit in Santa Fe County, not hasty decisions forced by ill-advised and artificial deadlines.

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE that:

- 1. The Governing Body of the City of Santa Fe, pursuant to Section 11.04 of the Intergovernmental Contract, contingent upon the same action by the Board of County Commissioners, hereby terminates its participation in the Intergovernmental Contract and hereby withdraws from the NCRTD, effective immediately.
  - a. Staff shall provide notice of termination of the City's participation in the Intergovernmental Contract and of its withdrawal from the NCRTD, contingent upon the same action by the Board of County Commissioners, with a copy of this Resolution, to the NCRTD immediately.

1	b. Staff shall negotiate with staff of the NCRTD on appropriate terms for
2	the withdrawal, pursuant to Section 11.04 of the Intergovernmental Contract.
3	c. Staff shall continue to investigate options to satisfy the City of Santa Fe's
4	transit needs, including, but not limited to, creating a Santa Fe Regional Transit District
5	with the County of Santa Fe through the Regional Planning Authority or other
6	appropriate entity, undertaking intergovernmental agreements or transit service
7	agreements to accomplish needed connections with the Rail Runner project with the
8	Santa Fe County, the New Mexico Department of Transportation, the Mid-Region
9	Council of Governments, the Mid-Regional Regional Transit District or the North Central
10	Regional Transit District, or any other appropriate options.
11	2. In the event that the Board of County Commissioners does not withdraw from the
12	NCRTD on July 7, 2008, then this Governing Body hereby approves conceptually a
13	memorandum of understanding that is consistent with the June 30, 2008 memo (presented at the
14	June 30, 2008 special City Council meeting) with 86% of the funds transferred to the Santa Fe
15	Regional Planning Authority to plan, provide and operate Rail Runner related transit service
16	expansion in Santa Fe County and 14% of the funds retained by the NCRTD region to provide
17	regional transit connections from other member communities into Santa Fe County.
18	3. If the City continues with the NCRTD, the NCRTD shall provide the district's audits
19	to the City for its review and shall provide the City with an annual report on the district's operations.
