The meeting of the Public Safety Committee was called to order on June 19, 2012 at 4:00 pm by the Chair, Councilor Ronald Trujillo. A quorum did exist by verbal roll call.

5. New Business:

A. Domestic Violence Update Presentation-Dr. Carol Horwitz, Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault Program Coordinator

(Exhibit A) Report included in packet for today's meeting. [Comparison report is for the years' 2207 thru 2011] Dr. Horwitz has been in this position for 5 ½ years and has collected statistics for that amount of time. The population in Santa Fe County has grown by 10%. As the population has grown the percentage of calls and incidents has lessened. Santa Fe County shares their incident reports and they are included in the statistical numbers reported today. Also documented statistically is that Spanish speaking individuals do not call to report incidents and they are entitled to the same services. Report indicates that they peaked in 2009 – decrease of 66% reflecting climate of fear and distrust among our immigrant population. The number of cases in alcohol and drugs has decreased by 36%.

Dr. Horwitz addressed the Coordinated Response Council describing 800 members, 350 agencies, adopted by Christus St. Vincent Hospital for quarterly meetings – space and lunch provided. Current work groups include: Medical Action Team which provides training in DV screening at doctors' offices; Anti-Human Trafficking Work Group – 5 cases this year in Santa Fe; Domestic Violence Offenders Court Compliance Project which is collaborating with District and Magistrate Courts and supervising over 100 perpetrators of domestic violence; Safety First Project which has identified the most lethal perpetrators of domestic violence; NNM Service Providers Alliance (Youth Shelters/St. Elizabeth Shelter/Kitchen Angels/Adelante/La Familia/Solace, which seeks to improve access to social services for the high end users of the most costly medical care.

Ratio of female to male victims continues to be 80/20. Perpetrators tend to be primarily male, with many cases between two males (siblings/fathers and sons/uncles, etc.). Alcohol use frequently leads to arrest.

With the Chief of Police's permission, Dr. Horwitz was selected as President of the Board for the New Mexico Coalition Against Domestic Violence, where she trains new domestic violence advocates.

Mr. Nava asked for clarification on the comment under Spanish Only Speakers where it states: Peaked in 2009 – decrease of 66% reflecting climate of fear and *distrust* among our immigrant population.

Dr. Horwitz said that this comment has not been directly made by any Spanish Speaking person, it is anecdotal. This is a comment coming from Agencies that she works with. Mr. Nava would like to know the names of agencies that are getting those types of calls and have our Chief of Police reach out to them to create comfort and support.

Councilor Trujillo asked Dr. Horwitz if she has statistics regarding suicides. Dr. Horwitz does not directly track the suicide. The Chair would like to have this information documented as it affects domestic and sexual violence.

B. Proposed resolution proclaiming a public safety summer, recognizing the City of Santa Fe Police Department's Operation "Full Court Press" and reaching out to the Northern New Mexico Communities to collaborate, explore and recommend solutions to addictions that lead to criminal activity by establishing law enforcement assisted diversion ("Lead") task force. Melissa D. Byers: Legislative Liaison Alfred Walker, City Attorney The resolution:

- Proclaims the summer of 2012 a "Public Safety Summer", and recognizes and applauds the City Police Department's efforts to combat property crime by establishing Operation Full Court Press.
- Acknowledges that addictions are too often the underlying problem related to criminal activity, therefore, that a Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) Task Force would be established. The purpose of the Task Force is to collaborate, explore and recommend long-term solutions for persons who are addicted to drugs and alcohol as an alternative to simply attempting to arrest away the problem.

Dr. Owen-Lewis asked if item 3(d), page 3 has been considered and if the members of this task force have been identified? Ms. Byers in her position as Legislative Liaison does not have that information available. Dr. Owen-Lewis would like to be assured that individuals with expertise from our own community are considered to serve on this Task Force. Chief Rael said that in the near future a group from Seattle, Washington who has been involved with Diversion programs will be coming to Santa Fe to make a presentation.

Dr. Owen-Lewis moved to approve the proposed resolution and to amend the statement 3(d), page 3, to include individuals with the needed expertise who can advise, second by Councilor Rivera, motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

- C. Burglary Prevention Operation Plan-Police Chief Raymond Rael
 - Exhibit B. Lists the plan presented by Chief Rael to the Public Safety Committee.

There has been an increase from January 1st to the present in burglaries. Sgt. Jerome Sanchez will chair the Task Force. We have had 15 arrests and recovered about \$30,000-\$40,000 in property.

Continuing targeted burglary patrols. Bike patrol will be increased to patrol the parks, walking areas and arroyos.

The Police Chief provided the Manpower / Overtime expense. Monthly expense will be approximately \$12,960. The Chief said that if changes need to be made in this proposed plan he will be flexible and make adjustments as needed. Chief Rael said that they are focusing on the top 100.

Councilor Trujillo asked if there was a way to publish a list of those 100 top offenders. Chief Rael said that it is very expensive to post and that with the proposed plan they would like not to publish any names which could serve as a forewarning. More information to follow.

6. Matters from Municipal Court Report in Packet.

Dr. Owen-Lewis. Judge Yalman did provide us with her statistics and they have been passed on to the statistician. A report to follow.

7. Matters from Police Chief Raymond Rael

The SFPD had accepted a zero tolerance policy. Resulting from community concerns on police officer misconduct a zero tolerance policy was necessary. (Chief read from the policy which was not distribution for public comment).

Recommendation is if there is any abuse of this policy it will be grounds for immediate termination.

8. Matters from Fire Chief Barbara Salas

Los Soleras is a subdivision which has offered to donate 3.5 acres of land for a future fire department. We are working the through the City Legal Department to get this in place.

We are not allowing any flamed fire grills in the parks, butane is allowed. A joint press release will be done with the Governor's Office for fire safety and released this Friday. We are asking the community to attend the fireworks display at Ft. Marcy for safety. Chair Trujillo asked if we would have patrols to monitor the abuse /use of fireworks. Chief Salas stated that last year there was a \$500 fine and time in jail, we are working on this plan and it will be enforced. Chief Salas said that last year members from Public Works participated in the area of enforcement. Chair Trujillo asked if there would be citations for those who violate this directive. Chief Rael confirmed that there will be enforcement.

Councilor Rivera asked if we have sent any fire fighters to help in the fires. Chief Salas said yes they have been sent out; they are in deployment for 2 weeks and they should all be back by the 4th of July.

Project Heart: Session sponsored by SFFD, Heart Association and Dr. Ramo – it is being done in 11 different cities at the same time on the same date. We will be teaching CPR. It will be held this Saturday at the Tony Roybal Gymnasium at Santa Fe High School from 8 am – 11 am. The Chair said we should look at Ft. Marcy and make it a very widely supported community event next year. This event is very worthy and participation is encouraged.

9. Matters from Committee Members

Councilor Rivera: Thank you to the Police Officers for their help in the Las Acequias area. A big impact is being made, thank you so much.

Update on Emergency Management Position: Chief Salas said that an offer has been made and the candidate did accept. He will report to Sevastian Gurule.

Chair Trujillo directed a comment to Chief Rael regarding the use of retired vehicles in the presence of different neighborhoods. City Attorney Walker said that from a legal standpoint there is no law that prohibits the use of decommissioned vehicles in these neighborhoods. Chief Rael will work on this item as directed by the Public Safety Committee. Chief Rael would like additional information on the use of these vehicle by non- law enforcement personnel. Councilor Rivera clarified that this is not the intent; it is to have the visible presence of the vehicle in the troubled neighborhoods, not to have anyone driving them.

Sir,

Without divulging operational and tactical methods, below are pivotal points that address the latest Department wide operation to address property crimes:

Property Crimes Unit:

- Primary goal is to investigate burglary cases.
- Cases will be read, filtered and assigned according to solvability.
- Cases with a lead (suspect, witness, trace evidence) will be priority.
- A detective will deal with precious metal dealers.

Street Crimes Unit:

- Primary goal-arrests known burglary and/or narcotic suspects.
- Unit will obtain a detailed list of wanted persons.
- Unit will prepare a weekly "Wanted" poster of 5 wanted individuals.
- Unit will assist in patrolling hot spots.
- Unit will conduct surveillance at precious metal dealers.

Narcotics Unit:

- Primary goal- investigates narcotic violations within the City of Santa Fe.
- Targets are low level street users.
- Arrests will be made on ALL narcotic violations.
- All narcotic complaints/tips will be forward to Unit.

District Attorney Liaison:

- Immediately distribute newly issued arrest warrants Street Crimes Unit.
- Track chronic property crime offender information.

Crime Analyst (CA):

- Compile information for this operation.
- Obtain valuable data for deployment of manpower.
- Review information looking for patterns and trends in property crimes.
- Prepare Top 100 Property Crimes Suspects list.

<u>Patrol Services</u>:

- Check crime reports for burglary hotspots.
- Activate officers to area with a high visibility presence in mind.
- Property crime charges will be filed at Magistrate Court.
- If suspect has a history of property crimes, information will be listed in the Probable Cause Statement.
- Suspicious person/vehicle call will be BOLO so detectives, OT personnel, Traffic Officers, Bike Officers, etc... will respond accordingly.

- Patrol will brief outside the Department confines.
- Briefings will be held at different areas of the city, preferably in hotspot locations.

<u>Traffic Services</u>:

- Unit goal-become highly visible during throughout hotspots.
- Traffic units will be deployed into hotspots to conduct daily business.
- PSA will work hotspots looking for parking infractions.

Crime Scene Technician (CST):

- Deliver usable prints to the DPS lab.
- Obtain comparative prints from the victim.
- Once viable prints are returned by the lab initiate case assignment.

White Collar Unit:

Focus on any RICO cases on suspects involved in enterprises.

Crime Prevention Unit:

Generate and disseminate information to public: AWARE, press releases, neighborhood watch etc...

Public Information Officer (PIO):

The PIO will disseminate pertinent information to the media.

<u>Overtime</u>:

- Personnel shall be utilized in this operation to patrol hotspots.
- Deploy into the area with a high visibility presence in mind.
- Assignments-two officers in marked cars, one two man unmarked unit.
- Bicycle officers will patrol areas in pairs.
- Bike officers patrol walking trails, parks, parking lots and neighborhoods.
- Locations will vary as hotspot information becomes available.
- COST (Approximate)
