A meeting of the City of Santa Fe Community Development Commission was called to order by Councilor Rebecca Wurzburger, Chair on this date at 3:00 p.m. in the Main Post Office, Main Conference Room, Third Floor, Room 326, 120 South Federal Place, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Roll Call indicated the presence of a quorum for conducting official business as follows:

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Commissioner Tambascio moved to approve the Agenda as published. Commissioner Padilla seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

APPROVAL OF THE FEBRUARY 6, 2013 MINUTES

Approval of the Minutes of the February 6, 2013 Meeting was postponed.

PRESENTATION BY YOUTH WORKS!

[Copies of the funding request application were distributed. A copy is hereby incorporated to these Minutes as Exhibit "A".]

YouthWorks is requesting \$25,000 in CDBG funding for the Hopewell Youth Development Program. The Hopewell Youth Development Program is comprised of a targeted outreach plan and deployment of a proven set of youth development services to low-income and disconnected youth in Census Tract 10.02. This area is the lowest income Census Tract in the city with a high proportion of Hispanic youth, and a GED or high school graduation rate of below 50% among the 18-24 year old age group. CDBG funds will provide for direct outreach activities to this neighborhood and fund additional enrollment for GED education, job placement services, as well as provision of case management services, life skills education, counseling and regular targeted outreach to the neighborhood.

Ms. Diaz, Mr. Santillanes and Mr. Velarde presented the information regarding the request for funding, from the Application, which was distributed in the members' packets.

Mr. Velarde explained that he was unable to attend high school due to the fact that his mother is ill and he is her caretaker. He said YouthWorks has given him an opportunity to continue his education and really works for him. He said he would be getting in trouble if he did not have this.

YouthWorks has served thousands of youth while expanding youth development opportunities that include high impact interventions, youth advocacy, alternative education, leadership training and employment connections for youth and young adults, critically improving the health of the community and the positive youth outcomes.

Ms. Diaz noted that New Mexico has the second highest drop-out rate in the nation. Santa Fe has a high school graduation rate of less than 50% with some participants dropping out as early as middle school.

Commissioner Peterson asked what the \$25,000 CDBG funding would be used for.

Ms. Diaz said the \$25,000 would go towards salaries of the Education Director and math teacher and the idea is to bring in a full-time teacher.

Mr. Santillanes mentioned that a portion of his salary is paid out of a grant from the YouthBuild program.

Chair Wurzburger asked how many students they are anticipating that they will work with.

Mr. Santillanes said they are anticipating that they would be able to also serve 75 additional students.

Staff will conduct quarterly outreach activities within the Hopewell neighborhood including door-to-door canvassing and neighborhood-based outreach events designed to inform residents about the array of services available.

Commissioner Tambascio asked what other funding sources they have applied to.

Ms. Diaz said they receive funding from the McCune Foundation and private donors but the funding has been proportionally reduced.

Commissioner Tambascio mentioned that the Civic Housing Authority has funding to redo some of their buildings and possibly YouthWorks could work with them and participate in some way.

Ms. Diaz said OK, thank you.

Commissioner Padilla asked where they are seeing the majority of the students dropping out from.

Ms. Diaz said a lot are coming from Capitol High School and Santa Fe High School and again some have dropped out as early as middle school.

Mr. Santillanes said a lot of their participants come out of the Hopewell-Mann area because there is a lot of gang activity, drugs and poverty that go through this area. All this combined gets in the way of the traditional education system and education is not a real viable option for these students.

DISCUSSION AND DECISION OF 2013-2014 CDBG FUNDED PROJECTS AND ALLOCATIONS

Commissioner Tambascio recused herself from discussion and voting on the **Homewise CDBG application request** having declared a conflict of interest.

Ms. Dicome reviewed her summary and analysis on each CDBG funding request. She noted that the estimated Allocation for 2013-2014 is expected to be 465,660 - Admin = 372,528 (of which 15% allowed for public service) After discussion, the following recommendations were made:

Commissioner Graeser moved to accept staff's recommendations for the 2013-2014 CDBG projects, as presented. Commissioner Tambascio seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The following organizations were not funded:

Habitat (Rehabilitation project): The Commission approved funding the Down Payment Assistance Request for \$80,000 but did not approve any funding for the Home Rehabilitation (Rehab) request. The reasons for not funding the Rehab were two-fold: Habitat received funding in 2012 for energy improvements, which was the first time the organization has requested Rehab monies. Also, Habitat received an allocation from MFA for Home Improvement through the HOME program, so there are monies for rehab in 2013-2014.

St. Elizabeth's Shelter: Solar energy system at the Men's' Shelter on Alaird Street. With the continuing reduction of the CDBG allocation, the highest priories must be funded and those involve housing in accordance with the Consolidated Plan. We anticipate a reduction in the total City's allocation by at least 8.2% from last year which is less than \$500,000. This request was for 30% of the total allocation and it does not address a high priority City need.

City of Santa Fe – installation of a PV system at Fire Station #8 in the Tierra Contenta Subdivision: While the Commission emphasized the importance of such energy savings projects, but with the proposed cuts in the allocation and the highest priorities of the City's Consolidated Plan is addressing housing needs, the Commission decided that the applicant should look to other funding sources for this worthwhile project.

Heroes Housing Alliance: While this proposal would address an important housing need, the proposal itself has too many gaps in proving it is cost effective; and there are too many gaps in funding sources for the project. The request was for more than 50% of the proposed allocation for all of the City's CDBG projects, which is a large amount to put towards one project, especially one that lacks definite use of the funds.

Commissioner Peterson moved *not* to fund the above list of projects. Commissioner Padilla seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

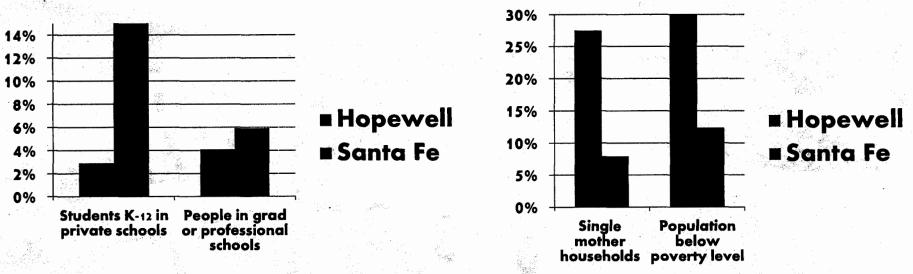
FY 2013-2014 Grant Year

Hopewell



Hopewell is a primarily low income neighborhood centrally located between the major intersections of Cerrillos Rd and St. Michaels Drive. Housing is predominantly composed of public housing and rentals, with only 13% of homes being owned.¹

Only 32.8% of Hopewell residents have graduated high school, which is far below the 50% average in Santa Fe.² Even fewer pursue any post secondary education, creating an employment and income disparity. For instance, people with professional degrees can earn up to 6x more than people who do not graduate from high school.³

The Hopewell Youth Development Program will connect ¡YouthWorks! (YW) proven set of youth development services to the high-need population age 14-20, found in Census Tract 10.02. Through regular targeted outreach activities we aim to increase enrollment in our suite of programs, particularly our innovative literacy and numeracy-based GED education and tutoring programs. YW staff will conduct quarterly outreach activities within the Hopewell neighborhood including door-to-door canvassing and neighborhood-based outreach events designed to inform residents about the array of services available. Services available to youth will be centered around YW GED education and tutoring program that is based on a standardized entrance assessment tool. This will be coupled with other YW services including college enrollment and financial aid application assistance, job training and placement for our numerous work crews and apprenticeship programs, lifeskills development and harm prevention education, counseling services, and overall case management activities. To track the effectiveness and impact of this program, sign in sheets will be collected at outreach events and a referral source will be tracked for all new program participants. Additionally, program participants and outcomes will be grouped by address to track the number of youth coming from Census Tract 10.02. A final report about project impact and outcomes will be provided to the City of Santa Fe following the conclusion or the program in July 2014.

What specific community need(s) or issue(s) is your project designed to address? Please include how it will address the National Objective, Outcome and Objective, and Eligible Activity as described in this application and the Overview.

Santa Fe's youth face multiple challenges in their transition to successful adulthood. The dropout rate in Santa Fe currently hovers around 50%, nearly five times the national average. Many marginalized young people lack the basic employment experience, life skills, leadership development opportunities, and access to continuing education that would enable them to secure meaningful work. This is particularly true for Census Tract 10.02, which is among the youngest and lowest income in Santa Fe. Within this neighborhood 67% of the population is Hispanic and 25.7% are under the age of 20. Over 80% of households earn less that \$50,000 a year and 26.9% live in poverty. Census data tells us that among 18-24 year olds, half have not completed high school or a GED. The same Census income data shows that in 2010, the median income in this census tract for non-high school degree or GED earners is \$12,750, while the median income for high school degree or GED. By providing access to GED education and tutoring, employment services this program will help alleviate poverty and provide positive life tracks for high-risk youth. This program meets CDBG eligibility by providing a youth development public services benefit to an area that is more than 50% low and moderate-income.

¡YouthWorks! was formed in 2001 to address the lack of meaningful alternative education and employment opportunities for disconnected youth in Santa Fe, while also providing harm prevention education and counseling services to the large numbers of youth in need. The organization began by launching education and employment training through the creation of the Santa Fe Youth Corps program, with funding by the NM Youth Conservation Corps. This was coupled with Life Skills Training and Counseling for youth in the Santa Fe Public Schools through partnership with the School District and the City of Santa Fe. ¡YouthWorks! has grown since its inception to have many partners and create many collaborations in the community and statewide. Since 2001, ¡YouthWorks! has served thousands of youth while expanding youth development opportunities that include high impact interventions, youth advocacy, alternative education, leadership training and employment connections for youth and young adults, critically improving the health of the community and the positive youth outcomes. In a given year the organization regularly oversees more than 20 contracts and grants on the local, state, and federal level, as well as managing over 225 youth student/trainee/employees.

¡YouthWorks! has a 12-year history of effectively managing multiple contracts from the City of Santa Fe, the State of New Mexico, as well as the Federal Government, including a reporting and monitoringintensive YouthBuild program funded through the Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration. The organization has existing comprehensive record keeping, reporting and monitoring structures in place for these programs and does not anticipate having to increase any of the aspects of program administration for this new program offering. As a non-housing activity, this project will not trigger procurement, fair housing, Lead Safe Housing Rule, Labor Standards or Environmental review.

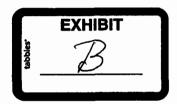
