5. New Business

A. Santa Fe Fire Department's 2013 Annual Report (Assistant Fire Chief Jan Snyder) (Exhibit A)

Asst. Chief Snyder explained that this is the second year this report is being presented. It presents a snap shot to City Government and to the Public to share what the Fire Department is all about. Every year there are additions to keep the public informed. The size of this document is not large as the importance is to have the public read through it. Asst. Chief Snyder focused in on some of the accomplishments; the fire department did over 700 home assessments were done last year and they are scheduled to be done again in the Santa Fe area. The NMFA 10 year loan has been paid off which freed up more money for the Fire Department.

Mr. Mizrahi asked if the Fire Department resources are being stretches with the annexation that the city has been going through.

Fire Chief Litzenberg stated that at this time the resources are adequate. Over the next 5 years a request will be placed for a new fire station.

(Exhibit B) Memo to Public Safety Committee dated April 15, 2014 from Isaac Pino re: People to the Plaza Resolution

It was mentioned as noted in the above memorandum that the first such Plaza closures were instituted in the early 1990s. It was done between Memorial and Labor Day. A lot has changed since then in the Plaza environment; there are now more vendors who also started coming in the early 1990s. A permanent bandstand was constructed. The City Manager and Police Chief are working together to implement Buskers enforcement.

Discussion:

Mr. Johnson noted that his recollection as Chief was that parking in the downtown area is very limited; the parking at the Railyard has increased. He asked about the ADA provisions and shuttle services for special events.

Mr. Gurule from the Parking Division stated that the parking needs at the Railyard have increased steadily and confirmed that there are shuttle services through Santa Fe Ride from the Railyard to the downtown area.

Mr. Harris noted that the description presented tonight did not reflect any parking changes in the downtown area.

Mr. Gurule said that the only change is the relocation of four ADA parking spots from the perimeter streets, corner of Lincoln St., San Francisco Street and Santa Fe Trail. (Referred to last diagram in packet). The proposal is to move 2 along San Francisco Street, 1 on Santa Fe Trail, add one on Lincoln and one on Washington next to the Palace of the Governors.

Mr. Trujillo asked about the public transportation stops, would they still be on Sheridan. Mr. Gurule confirmed that they will remain on Sheridan.

Mr. Pino said that the plan through the Parks Department is to have Planters which are very effective and attractive to meet historic design.

Dr. Lewis asked for additional information related to public safety on the plaza.

The Police Chief responded that historically in and around the plaza there have not been a high volume of vehicular crashes.

The Chair asked; as far as public safety is concerned, will this require more officers on the plaza?

The Police Chief said that historically they staff according to the special event with overtime officers. This initiative does not have additional staffing requirements on the department. The plaza will be staffed from 10:00 am to 10:00 pm, 7 days a week. Any additional calls for service should not affect the staffing at the Police Department.

The Chair asked if 2 officers are going to be enough to staff, more so in the summer months when the pedestrian traffic is heavier.

The Police Chief stated that they have overlapping shifts where at any given time there would be 4 officers. In the evening they are also supported by the PSAs, and one PSA is on the plaza and handles parking concerns.

The Chair provided historical information – in 1984 they were having problems with the cruisers and San Francisco closed at that time. There was a specific incident that took place at La Fonda and it too close to 20 minutes for emergency vehicles to reach the hotel. The Chair shared his concern of cruisers and access for emergency vehicles is reviewed closely.

Public Comment:

The Chair asked if there was any comment in favor of this resolution from the public. No comments.

Anyone opposed to the resolution from the public.

Rick Martinez

Mr. Martinez reflected back on a fatality that took place on Palace and Washington and they did a closure. Mr. Martinez has participated in the Downtown Visitor Committee, the Downtown Plaza Roundtable Committee and each time we brought this up we were concerned about the lack of pedestrian traffic on the plaza, and there was no recession at that time. Mr. Martinez was concerned about the cost of parking at the Railyard and the time that the SF Ride operates for those that need to get to the downtown area unless the offer is for free parking. He is opposed to this idea.

Mr. Harris moved for approval of the proposed resolution declaring the governing body's intention to bring people to the Santa Fe Plaza by providing a safer environment and increased economic development through the closure of streets to unauthorized vehicular traffic in the plaza area; and through the increase of the public safety presence on the Plaza, the Plaza Park and throughout the Plaza periphery area, second by Mr. Trujillo, motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

7. Matters from Police Chief

Referenced the 24/7 drug tip hotline. The information was released to the public on Monday and it is also on the city website. Representatives from each division were present to answer any questions. The representative from the Police Community Relations will also follow up on calls.

The Chair expressed his thanks to the Police Department for getting this on line. The Chair added a compliment to Celina, PIO for the City Police Department in getting this information out. The intent of this was to make Santa Fe an unwelcomed destination for drug dealers and to bring our community together to report any suspicious drug related incidents and to feel comfortable in doing it. This endeavor has been worked on for the last 2 years.

Mr. Johnson asked about other jurisdictions and referrals.

Mr. Ken Martinez, Director of the Santa Fe Regional Emergency Center has met with the Sheriff's Department and the Town of Edgewood as the center is a regional center so they provide dispatch communication services for all agencies in Santa Fe County. Because we can expect this number to be publicized and we will get phone calls from not only within the city but Santa Fe County, he is working with the agencies on how to handle the calls. Anything that is in progress will be dispatched accordingly and anything that is after the fact that requires further investigation or follow up will be forwarded to the appropriate department for investigation. Concurrence from all agencies is positive.

Chair Dimas who was in contact with Mr. Martinez since last year commented to the PSC that his help and information was invaluable. Thank you. It did not cost the city any money to get this going.

Dr. Lewis asked if a progress report would be presented at a 6 month or 1 year benchmark.

Sgt. Michelle Williams will be tracking at the Investigation Division level. There will be a primary intake and follow through with the Street Crime division and the Property Crimes division that work street level type narcotics. Statistics will be maintained.

The Chair stated that he has made it very public that it is time to re-establish a City Narcotics Unit. The seriousness of the drug problem that we have in Santa Fe justifies the need for this unit.

Mr. Trujillo noted that we are 2^{nd} in the nation on overdose.

The Police Chief said that frequently they have EMTs on the scene.

The Chair, Chief of Police and Mr. Martinez reiterated that calls made will remain anonymous.

8. Matters from Fire Chief Erik Litzenberg

- The first 14 cadets have graduated and have entered their 6 months of on the job training.
- The Chief reported that they have 3 paramedic students returning from the Albuquerque Fire Department firefighter training. It seems that the Santa Fe Community College is ready to restart their program, thank you to Chief Rivera.
- Next week the home assessment program will begin. This will start with the 10 new conservation corp. positions.
- 2 individuals will start with the youth works program. Last year this was a great success.
- April 26 Airline Disaster Exercise 9:30 am Santa Fe Municipal Airport If anyone would like to observe contact Justin, Airport Intern at (955-2506).

Mr. Harris asked if the neighborhoods are aware that the home assessments are being done beforehand. The Fire Chief said yes, announcements are made through the media and radio spots.

9. Matters from Committee Members

The Chair welcomed any agenda items from the Public Safety Committee and reports from the Fire Association and the Police Association. The Chair would also like to add the RECC to have an opportunity to report on the calls that they are receiving.

10. Communications from the Floor

Rick Martinez: 725 Mesilla Road, Santa Fe, NM – The sign say 35 mph. A traffic study was done with all of the surrounding streets and I am asking again if we could bring it down to 30 mph. Mr. Martinez would like for this to be re-visited.

The Chair asked the Police Chief to observe this area and to share this information with John Romero.

Mr. Martinez said that Mr. Romero has told them that he did not want to talk with the neighbors in this area. Agua Fria is a very busy street and we need help. Thank you.

Fire Chief's Message



This past year started an era of change in the Santa Fe Fire Department (SFFD). In literal terms, the City of Santa Fe changed as the annexation was formally accepted. The greater response changes will occur in the next five years, as we assume primary response for an estimated 15,000 new city residents. While changes at the state level inspired some of ours into a hasty retirement, we did hire and train fourteen new cadets. Further, we once again hired seasonal wildland firefighters, and our wildland urban interface crews began doing risk reduction projects on privately owned lands in and around Santa Fe – the first project of its kind in New Mexico. As our

workforce continues to form, change, and develop, what we as a department are asked to do continues to evolve. We look to become more involved in injury prevention and preventative care as the year progresses.

As we do move into the future, it is important to reaffirm our commitment to each other and the public we serve. Our mission will continue to evolve, like our community and workforce. To set the stage for our continued evolution, I would like to confirm the following priorities:

Accomplishments

- Fourteen (14) additional firefighters were hired and will graduate from the cadet academy in February of 2014.
- A 7th ALS Ambulance was placed into service on the south side of town. M6 will operate out of Station #7 located off Richards Ave behind the Rodeo grounds.
- The remodeling of Fire Station 4 started in the winter of 2012 and was completed in May of 2013.
- The department hosted its second annual advanced Auto Extrication Training (SF Auto-X) which had over 90 students in attendance from over 30 agencies and 4 states.
- Over 740 wildland urban interface home assessments were conducted within the City with 20 plus acres treated in the interface area.
- The department created an official Facebook and Twitter page to help meet one of our strategic goals for this year... to improve community involvement with the department and modernize our public information practices.

- We were pleased to host the Captain and crew members from the USS Santa Fe (SSN 763) at our fire stations during their visit to the City over Memorial Day.
- Successful contract (CBA) negotiations with the Santa Fe Firefighter's Association started in the Fall of 2013 and finish in early 2014.
- The department paid off a 10 year loan with the NM Finance Authority for two of its fire trucks. This will help increase our annual State Fire Fund check.

 Fire Department personnel

Subject: People to the Plaza Resolution

In an effort to bring people to the Plaza and provide a safer environment and increased economic development, the proposed People to the Plaza Resolution would authorize the closure of certain streets to unauthorized vehicular traffic in the Plaza area, provide for creative and evolving usage of the Plaza and increase public safety in the Plaza and Plaza periphery. Further, the resolution would require that additional opportunites for greater access to downtown parking be explored. A review of the economic effect of creating a pedestrian friendly Plaza is also directed as is a review of the effectiveness of public safety enhancements. The matters will be presented to governing body within six months of the implementation of the resolution.


The first such Plaza closures were instituted in the early 1990's. Since that time, Plaza use has evolved. During the period since those closures, there has been the introduction of many vendors and food purveyors; an increase in the number of official and specially permitted activities and events in the Plaza and the addition of a permanent bandstand (Gazebo). Within the vicinity, parking garages have been added to the SFCCC and the Railyard. There has been the development of a proposal to improve connectivity between the downtown Plaza with the Railyard Plaza by encouraging and enhancing pedestrian access between both areas.

Currently, improvements in the Plaza area are underway. The City Manager and Police Department have increased public safety personnel presence in the Plaza, downtown and Rail Yard areas. Communications are open between Buskers and the City to better understand the requirements and enforcement issues.

In preparation for the introduction of the resolution, a street closure plan and resulting circulation plan have been developed. Additionally, details of proposed changes in ADA parking have been considered. Park maintenance personnel have been consulted on the most effective and aesthetic methods to change the access to the Plaza. The attachments provided with this memo illustrate current and proposed traffic and parking modifications. For the benefit of the committees, personnel from all of the departments involved in the proposal are present for discussion and questions.

Resolution No. 2014-People to the Plaza

SPONSOR(S):

Mayor Gonzales

SUMMARY:

The proposed resolution

- Declares the Governing Body's desire to bring people to the Santa Fe Plaza by providing a safer environment and increased economic development opportunities; providing for creative and evolving usage of the Santa Fe Plaza: and an increased public safety presence on the Plaza, the Plaza Park and throughout the Plaza periphery area.
- Authorizes the following street closures to unauthorized vehicular traffic, around the Plaza Park:
 - Continuation of the closure of Palace Avenue; and
 - Closure of the Lincoln Avenue, San Francisco Street and Old Santa Fe

Staff is directed to make accommodations for the provision of accessible parking spaces and loading zones for deliveries to the merchants on the Plaza.

- Authorizes an increased public safety presence in the Plaza, the Plaza Park and the Plaza periphery.
- Directs the City Manager to designate a staff team to:
 - Analyze the effects of the street closures; and
 - · Within six months of adoption of this resolution, bring forward additional recommendations to the Governing Body

The authority granted by the adoption of this resolution would be effective on May 24, 2014.

12	WHEREAS, Section 23-5 of the City of Santa Fe Municipal Code (23-5 SFCC 1987)
13	regulates the use of the Plaza, Plaza Park and Plaza periphery area and states that the usage of the
14	Plaza and the Plaza Park should be creative, evolving, and non-institutionalized; and
15	WHEREAS, as Section 23-5 SFCC 1987 expressly defines the Plaza, the Plaza Park and the
16	Plaza periphery area as follows:
17	"Plaza means that inclusive area bounded on the north by the north curbline of
18	Palace Avenue running in front of the Palace of the Governors, and on all other sides by
19	the facades of the buildings, excluding portals, or property lines lying to the east, south
20	and west of the Plaza."
21	"Plaza Park means that inclusive area bounded by the inside back of the curb
22	surrounding the Plaza as outlined in the map prepared by the city."
23	"Plaza periphery area means an area outside the Plaza Park, not including the
24	Plaza Park, bounded by Sandoval and Grant Streets on the west, Alameda Street on the
25	south, Paseo de Peralta on the east and Marcy Street on the north. This area includes both

Ţ	sides of the boundary streets."
2	WHEREAS, the Plaza is a destination for many visitors interested in Santa Fe history and
3	culture; and
4	WHEREAS, the Plaza belongs to all of Santa Fe and is home to many annual events that
5	draw residents and visitors to the Plaza and create social connections, economic development and
6	funding for community non-profits, including, but not limited to, the eight major events authorized by
7	Subsection 23-5.2 SFCC 1987; and
8	WHEREAS, the duty and responsibility of the City of Santa Fe is to preserve, protect and
9	maintain the Plaza, Plaza Park and the public places in the Plaza periphery area; and
10	WHEREAS, many cities have found that reducing vehicle traffic and creating pedestrian-
11	friendly city centers benefits economies by improving the experience for shopping, dining,
12	sightseeing and other activities; and
13	WHEREAS, many cities are reducing vehicle traffic as a way to preserve and protect historic
14	areas; and
15	WHEREAS, in an effort to enhance the enjoyment and beauty of the Plaza area, the
16	Governing Body desires to eliminate vehicular traffic in the Plaza and increase public safety presence
17	in the Plaza and the Plaza periphery area.
18	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COVERNING BODY OF THE
19	CITY OF SANTA FE that the Governing Body hereby declares its desire to bring people to the
20	Santa Fe Plaza and provide a safer environment and increased economic development opportunities;
21	provide for creative and evolving usage of the Santa Fe Plaza; and increase public safety presence on
22	the Plaza, the Plaza Park and throughout the Plaza periphery area.
23	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governing Body hereby authorizes:
24	1. The following street closures to unauthorized vehicular traffic, around the Plaza Park:
25	(a) Continuation of the closure of Palace Avenue; and

1	(b) Closure of the Lincoln Avenue, San Francisco Street and Old Santa Fe Trail.
2	Staff is directed to make accommodations for the provision of accessible parking spaces and loading
3	zones for deliveries to the merchants on the Plaza.
4	2. An increased public safety presence in the Plaza, the Plaza Park and the Plaza
5	periphery.
6	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governing Body directs the City Manager to
7	designate a staff team to:
8	1. Analyze the effects of the street closures, which shall include at a minimum:
9	(a) The economic impact of the street closures; and
10	(b) Modifications to fee structures to make downtown parking more
11	practical for the greatest number of residents and visitors and increase the use of
12	underutilized parking facilities.
13	2. Within six months of adoption of this resolution, bring forward additional
14	recommendations to the Governing Body that would:
15	(a) Enhance the experience of the Plaza for residents and visitors;
16	(b) Increase economic development and public safety in the Plaza area;
17	(c) Provide additional parking opportunities in the Plaza area, if necessary; and
18-	(d) Unimately bring people to the Plaza.
19	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the authority granted by the adoption of this resolution
20	shall be effective on May 24, 2014.
