#### March 19, 2013

 Roll Call – Chair Trujillo called the meeting to order at 4:00 pm. Roll call reflected a quorum. The meeting was held in the City Council Chambers, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

#### 2. Approval of Agenda

No staff or committee changes.

Dr. Mier moved to approve the agenda as presented, second by Mr. Harris, motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

3. Approval of January 13, 2013 Minutes

Dr. Mier moved to approve the minutes of January 13, 2013 as presented, second by Mr. Harris, motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

- 4. Old Business None
- 5. New Business
  - A. Proposed ordinance relating to the City of Santa Fe Fire Department; amending sections 2-10.3 and 2-10.4 SFCC 1987 to grant the Fire Chief the full authority to sign agreements with landowners for the purpose of implementing fire hazard mitigation activities. (Councilor Trujillo, Greg Gallegos) (Exhibit A-1)

Mr. Gallegos reported that they have been working with the communities and doing homeowner assessments in the last 2 months. Having conducted this homeowner assessment the department has come up with a list of recommendations on how to offset some of the risks that wildfire poses to some of these communities. Mr. Gallegos stated that they are working with the Legal Department to create an agreement with each individual property owner allowing the fire fighter/wildlife hand crew permission to do work on the property. Each agreement requires signature and approval from the city manager, finance director, city clerk and also the city attorney. It is anticipated that in the next 2 years we will have up to 10,000 homeowners and even if 25% of those want

protection we will have a great deal of administrative follow up. We are proposing that this ordinance give the Chief full authority to sign agreements. This has been reviewed and approved by the City Attorney. City Attorney confirmed that he is comfortable with this proposed ordinance.

A sample of an agreement with Cerro de Piedra. (Enclosed – Exhibit A-2) Councilor Rivera would like to see a sample that will be used by the Fire Department to assure that we remain consistent.

Councilor Rivera moved to approve Proposed ordinance relating to the City of Santa Fe Fire Department; amending sections 2-10.3 and 2-10.4 SFCC 1987 to grant the Fire Chief the full authority to sign agreements with landowners for the purpose of implementing fire hazard mitigation activities, second by Dr. Mier, motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

B. Proposed resolution relating to the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of Santa Fe; directing traffic engineering staff to perform and inspection of crosswalks and traffic signals at intersections throughout the city to ensure that there is adequate time and a sufficient number of crosswalks for pedestrians to cross; collaborate with the New Mexico Department of Transportation ("NMDOT") to ensure that signage on roads within the municipal boundaries of Santa Fe are in compliance with the manual on uniform traffic control devices ("MUTCD") and clearly visible to motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists and to ensure that traffic signals at intersections on roads within the municipal boundaries of the city provide a sufficient amount of time for a vehicle to clear the intersection (Councilor Trujillo, Mayor Coss and Councilors Calvert, Wurzburger, Rivera, Dimas, Ives, Bushee and Dominguez) (John Romero)

Mr. Romero stated that the crosswalks have pretty good guidance and the city participated in a University of North Carolina study that showed results of the city of Santa Fe having sufficient lighting and markings at crosswalks. Chairman Trujillo said that one of the reasons he brought this item to the Public Safety Committee was in response to a concern at Cerrillos Road/Siringo Road and St. Francis. There is still a great deal of J-walking and non-compliance of the crosswalk junction.

Commissioners echoed the same concern regarding the non-compliance of crossing and J-walking. It was also asked if the lights will be synchronized to allow sufficient time for the individuals to cross the major thoroughfare areas. Mr. Romero said that there is a road exchange agreement with the city and the state to assure that there is sufficient time for the individuals to make the cross. Mr. Romero also said that there are two different types of walk signals in place right now; one provides the countdown to make the cross [20 seconds down to 0] and the other actually signals you when to start the walk across the road. Mr. Romero said that they have submitted a grant request to upgrade all of the older

cross walk signals to the countdown signals. It was also noted that the crosswalks could use a fresh coat of paint.

Dr. Lewis stated that on page 2, line 22 does not specifically mention pedestrian crossing language. Mr. Romero confirmed that this was a typographical error and would be corrected to incorporate pedestrian crossing. (Exhibit B)

Dr. Mier asked that the number of crosswalks be looked at and asked if there was a study or evaluation of the locations where there is abuse and where they are needed? Mr. Romero said that right now they are being looked at on a case by case basis to evaluate where any additional crossing signals will be needed. Together with DOT, they are working on a joint grant for public safety money to install additional lighting signals for the high traffic areas. Dr. Mier asked if the City Traffic Engineer is also looking at bike passes and trail crossings. Mr. Romero said they are starting with trail crossings.

The Chair said that he would like for trail crossings to be a priority and that follow up information be brought back to the Public Safety Committee in the near future.

Mr. Romero also added that they are working with the signal vendors to continue evaluation on the high use areas.

Dr. Lewis referred to page 2, line 11 and 17, collaborate with DOT to determine that crosswalks <u>are</u> needed. (Remove the word not add <u>are).</u>

Mr. Mizrahi moved to approve the proposed resolution with the corrections on page 2, line 11 and 17 removing the word <u>not</u> and adding the word <u>are</u> needed and page 2, line 22 – sufficient time for vehicle and pedestrian, second by Mr. Harris, motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

C. Proposed resolution relating to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City of Santa Fe; encouraging Santa Fe Business that sell firearms to include a trigger lock with every firearm sold and encouraging gun owners to keep trigger locks on all firearms in their possession and stored safely away from children. (Councilor Rivera)

Councilor Rivera noted that this Resolution was passed in 1998 and that they want to remind shops in town to sell trigger locks with every firearm sold. Mr. Mizrahi asked if this resolution is still in place and Councilor Rivera confirmed, yes, it is in place.

Dr. Lewis said that with the passing of this Resolution she would like to see public service announcements as many probably do not remember the wording of this resolution. It was also asked if there was any legislation mandating that trigger locks need to be sold?

Chief Rael said that there is state law requiring that new guns need to have the trigger locks. It was noted that new guns are required to have the trigger lock old guns do not. Councilor Rivera asked the Chief if this is being done. The Chief confirmed to his knowledge they are coming with built in trigger locks. The Chair asked if the Police Department has trigger locks and the Chief said they do and would need to order additional locks.

The Chair asked the City Attorney if the suggested wording could be stronger. Mr. Walker said that regardless of the words *ultimately chosen*, I think the strongest thing the city can do is to encourage people who sell guns to sell the trigger locks and to enforce it. (Exhibit C)

Dr. Lewis said that she would still like to see in the first paragraph that we should say that this is the state law. Ms. Melissa Byers said that she will work with Chief Rael to assure the correct wording is inserted.

Dr. Mier moved to approve the proposed resolution as stated above as amended; to include the insertion of the state law on trigger locks for new firearms and encouraging fire arm sales people to sell for used fire arms, second by Mr. Mizrahi, motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

### 7. Matters from Police Chief Ray Rael (Exhibit D) Santa Fe Police Department Property Crimes Comparisons 2010 - 2011 - 2012 - 2013 [No questions from the Committee]

The Chief introduced a new hire; Celina Westervelt, PIO/IPRA person for the Police Department. She came from Channel 13 and will send out all communications from the Police Chief office to the public. They would like to implement putting more information on line and informing the public. The Chair asked that the Public Safety committee members be sent any public announcements. Welcome aboard.

Presently there are 10 vacant positions and that there are about 17 candidates ready to be reviewed. Goal is to have all positions filled by June.

The Chair asked if there are any officers who will retire in the near future. The Chief said that most recently there were about 14 officers on the list who are eligible to retire but not all are taking the retirement option.

Lost gun by-back brought in approximately 650 firearms were taken off the street. Weapons are scheduled for destruction once a court order is received. Deputy Chief John Schaerfl informed the committee that he has a meeting scheduled for the next week with the New Mexico Military Museum will come and see if there are any firearms that are

classified historical or rare. His approximation is that there will be 1 to 2 dozen at a maximum. If they are retained as city property they would go to the Museum on a loan basis.

#### Wildfire Hazard Fuel Reduction Program Agreement Cerro de Piedra Open Space Property

#### I. Authority

a. This Wildfire Hazard Reduction Program cooperative agreement (Agreement) is effective and binding on the date of last signature below, between Cerro de Piedra Association (Cooperator) and the City of Santa Fe, Fire Department, Wildfire Hazard Fuel Reduction Program (CITY).

b. The Cerro de Piedra Association Board of Directors on behalf of the Cerro de Piedra Association members hereby agree to participate with CITY to conduct certain wildfire hazard reduction management practices on private lands (Property) based on the records of the City of Santa Fe, the City of Santa Fe has determined that the Cerro de Piedra Association is the owner of the subject property owned by the named Cooperator in Santa Fe, State of New Mexico and described as follows:

<u>Program site description</u>: Property located between 117 Barranca Rd and 118 Barranca Dr in the City of Santa Fe, Santa Fe County, New Mexico as shown on the attached program map (topographic and aerial) (Figure 1). North Latitude 35.71315° and West Longitude 105.91740° represent the approximate program center.

#### II. Purpose

In signing this agreement, the Cooperator named above joins as a participant with CITY in a wildfire hazard reduction program and grants to CITY the authority to complete wildfire hazard reduction activities. The CITY will provide CITY workers, labor, equipment and wildfire hazard reduction expertise. The Cooperator agrees to allow the CITY access to their property and to be responsible for wildfire hazard reduction activities as described in the Program Plan, Exhibit A and B, attached hereto. The furnishing of supplies or equipment by either of the parties involved for carrying out the wildfire hazard reduction program, are specifically included in the attached Program Plan, Exhibit A, hereby incorporated and made a part of this agreement.

#### III. Respective Responsibilities of the Parties:

In addition to the specific tasks and contributions to the effort as identified in Exhibit A hereof, the parties further agree as follows:

#### A. CITY:

1. Does not assume ownership or control over the premises by this agreement. CITY assumes no liability for any damage, except that damage resulting from the negligence of its employees or the negligence of its contractors and

- subcontractors during the construction of this program on the Property.
- 2. Will not be held liable in any way to restore the Property to its prior condition upon termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- 3. Agrees to notify program contractors and the Cooperator about necessary permits, and to provide technical assistance in obtaining permits that may be required for the Cooperator to fulfill the terms of this Agreement.
- 4. Will provide City workers, labor, equipment and wildfire hazard reduction expertise.

#### B. The Cooperator:

- 1. Retains all rights to control trespass and retains all responsibility for taxes, assessments, and damage claims other than those allowed in Article A.1, above.
- 2. The provisions of this Agreement shall run with the land. A change of ownership shall not change the terms of this Agreement, which shall remain in effect on the described property for the duration of the period specified in Section IV, below. The Cooperator agrees to notify CITY in writing of any planned or pending changes of ownership at least 30 days in advance.
- 3. Agrees to allow CITY, its employees, agents, or assignees access to the Property and the program site, upon prior notification by CITY, for wildfire hazard reduction purposes and to inspect work completed until April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014.
- 4. Agrees to protect and maintain the wildfire hazard reduction program activities.
- 5. Agrees to not expect any reimbursement for time or money spent on this program.

#### IV. Term of this Agreement

- a. This Agreement shall be in effect for one (1) year beginning on the date of last signature below, unless terminated earlier in accordance with Section VII, Termination Provisions, as set forth below.
- b. The work identified in Exhibit A, will be completed no later than April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2014. If this work cannot be completed by the date specified, a request for extension must be received by the Cooperator and/or CITY's Program Coordinator (specified in Paragraph V.a. below) 30 days prior to the established completion date. If an extension is approved, CITY will issue an amendment to the Agreement.
- c. At the end of the Agreement's term, the wildfire hazard reduction improvements, if any, remain the property of the Cooperator.
- d. No obligation to any of the parties of this Agreement shall be in effect after the term of this agreement has expired.

#### V. Administrative Matters

 a. For purposes of coordination and acceptance of work, CITY designates the following named individual (or designee) as CITY's Program Coordinator:

- b. CITY's Point of Contact (POC) on the Agreement is the Program Coordinator.
- c. CITY is not obligated to reimburse the Cooperator for any amounts in performance of this Agreement.
- d. CITY is prohibited by law from making obligations that exceed available funds and therefore, can do only that work for which there are funds available. In the event funds are not available to do the wildfire hazard reduction activities within the period of time or in the manner prescribed in Exhibits A, CITY will advise the Cooperator of that fact.
- e. This Agreement may by modified at any time by mutual consent of all parties and reduced to writing.
- f. This Agreement constitutes a financial business arrangement between CITY and the Cooperator and does not create a partnership or joint venture between the parties.

#### VI. Program Description

The work to be accomplished is set forth in the Program Plan, Exhibit A.

#### VII. Termination Provisions

This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon 30 days' advance notice to the other party(ies).

**Defensible Space:** Project is located in residential area and thinning plan will serve as a demonstration site for residents who might consider fuel reduction on their property.

Thinning: The goals for this prescription for the three acre tract will include the thinning of tree density in order to protect structures and the community from experiencing a high intensity fire. Tree density for adult trees will range from 40 to 60 basal area but will vary density depending on project site (i.e. southern aspect vs. northern aspect and ridges). We will create areas that have clumps of trees to encourage wildlife but our overall goal is to have a front line defense against a wildfire. Surface fuels from the thinning (not to include needle cast) will be removed or chipped. Large snags will be preserved for wildlife use.

The biomass/slash generated from the fuel reduction will be chipped on site or hauled away by the City of Santa Fe Environmental Services Division. In areas where biomass can reduce erosion we will incorporate it into those areas without raising the risk to wildfire. Wood greater than 4 inches in diameter will be cut into firewood lengths and left on site for the local community or hauled away.

In areas with predominate pinon/juniper we will conduct follow up treatments to catch any stumps that have persistent live vegetation.

#### Cerro de Piedra Association Minutes of the Board of Directors Meeting March 7, 2013 6:00 pm

Anne Coller, President, called the meeting to order at 6 pm at the home of Anne Coller and Bill White, 112 Barranca Drive. The following members were present:

- Anne Coller
- Scott Hatcher
- Shelby Miller
- Heather Steigerwald

Mr. Miller was present telephonically and Ms. Ellen Lampert was in the air enroute to Santa Fe and could not attend.

Since sufficient members in good standing were present in person or telephonically, proper notice for the meeting was given and a quorum existed, it was determined that the meeting was convened in accordance with the By-Laws of Cerro de Piedra Association.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss:

- The City of Santa Fe's Wildfire Fuel Reduction Program (the "Program") as it pertains to the drainage easement located between Barranca Road and Barranca Drive (the "Drainage Easement").
- Action that should be taken to determine the ownership of the above Drainage
   Easement in order for the Board of Directors to act in the best interests of Cerro
   de Piedra Association.

With respect to the Program, a thorough discussion was held about the need for thinning and clearing underbrush and dead trees and limbs from the Drainage Area in order to help prevent the spread of wildfire in our vicinity. The City of Santa Fe's Program is specifically funded and designed to thin and clear private property within the city limits at no cost to property owners in order to prevent the spread of a wildfire if it ever occurs.

The members also reviewed and discussed a Wildfire Fuel Reduction Program Agreement (the "Agreement") proposed by the City of Santa Fe. In order for the Drainage Easement to be thinned and cleared pursuant to the Program, the City of Santa Fe requires the property owner to enter into the Agreement with the City of Santa Fe. The City of Santa Fe has determined that Cerro de Piedra is the owner of the Drainage Easement.

The fact that the City of Santa Fe has determined Cerro de Piedra is the owner of the Drainage Easement was a complete surprise as it is commonly believed that either the City or the County of Santa Fe was the owner of the Drainage Easement.

#### Traffic Safety at the northern intersection of Guadalupe and Paseo de Paralta

After my son was struck by on oncoming vehicle at the northern intersection of Guadalupe and Paseo de Peralta, I heard numerous stories of accidents at this intersection. I write to ask if the committee might consider whether an infrastructure adjustment - such as reconfiguring the turn lights or increasing the illumination from streetlights - might make this intersection safer.

On 4 January, 2013, at approximately 6PM, my son, Jeremy Brooks, sixteen and a half years old, and his girlfriend, were coming into town from 599 via 84/85 - North Guadalupe and were the first car in line to turn left off of Guadalupe onto Paseo. On the green turn light, Jeremy began his left turn and partway through the intersection a driver in a rental Jeep going north on Guadalupe slammed into the Camry. Jeremy and his girlfriend were shaken and suffered bruising from the impact but thankfully did not experience long-term injury. My Camry was totaled in the accident — the airbags exploded, the front of the car, engine, and hood, as well as the right passenger door, were all severely damaged by the impact. The jeep could not be driven after the accident either.

A man from Minnesota and his two twenty-something children were in the left turn lane behind Jeremy that night. They stayed at the scene for over an hour and half to provide witness statements to Officer Bryan Martinez that Jeremy turned left on a green left turn arrow. Officer Bryan Martinez cited the driver of the Jeep (Police Report # 13-00195).

Since the accident, I have heard numerous stories of accidents at this intersection. Is there a way to make this intersection safer?
