MINUTES OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE OCCUPANCY TAX ADVISORY BOARD April 26, 2012

I. PROCEDURES a) CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

A regular meeting of the Occupancy Tax Advisory Board was called to order on April 26, 2012, at approximately 8:33 a.m. by Miguel Castillo, Chair in the City Council Chambers, City Hall, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Roll indicated the presence of a quorum for conducting official business as follows:

b) APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Items V-a, c and f (Requests for funding for Folk Art Market and Dual Language Education of NM) were postponed.

Ms. Bonney moved to approve the agenda as amended. Mr. White seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

c) APPROVAL OF MINUTES – March 29, 2012 April 5, 2012

Ms. Bonney moved to approve the Minutes of the March 29, 2012 and April 5, 2012 meetings as submitted. Mr. White seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

II. LODGER'S TAX UPDATE (DAVID TAPIA)

(A copy of the "Lodgers Tax Report "was distributed in the members' packets. A copy is incorporated herewith to these Minutes as Exhibit "A".)

- Mr. Tapia reviewed the information in Exhibit "A". Please see Exhibit "A" for the specifics of this presentation.
- Mr. Tapia said he would be reporting on the cash receipts for March, which is February's occupancy. Receipts are down 2.64%, when compared to the prior year.
- Mr. Tapia noted that he reviewed the Rocky Mountain Lodge report and it does not show a decline. The report shows that the REVPar is up.
- Ms. Madden mentioned that the Rocky Mountain Lodging Report is a reporting element on a voluntary basis; however, there is another report that the CVB receives: *The Smith Travel Report*, which is showing a less decline in occupancy (1%).
- Mr. Tapia said at the current time, there are six hotels that are delinquent in reporting. One goes back to November. Four out of the six hotels are small hotels and they have started to make payments. The two large hotels have not made arrangements to pay the delinquencies. Mr. Tapia has requested information from the Taxation and Revenue Department to do a file audit and see what the hotels are reporting in gross receipt taxes. He will be seeking legal action and placing liens on the properties that are delinquent and they have been notified of this.
- Mr. Tapia said because of this, next month's report may show a huge jump in the numbers.
 - Mr. Tapia concluded his report noting that the City will meet budget expectations.

III. CVB ACTIVITY REPORTS:

a) Jim Bradbury (Interim SFCVB EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR)

Mr. Bradbury was absent; therefore Ms. Madden gave a brief CVB Activity report as follows:

- The CVB recently went through a budget review and will be at the same level for FY2012-2013.

b) CHRISTINE MADDEN - SFCVB SALES

[Copies of Santa Fe Convention and Visitors Bureau Sales Activities for period: July 1, 2011-April 25, 2012 - {Exhibit B} were distributed.

Ms. Madden reviewed the information in Exhibit "B". Please see Exhibit "B" for the specifics of this presentation.

Ms. Madden reported as follows:

- Bookings are going steadily well and are pacing ahead, when compared to the prior year. There are 24,414 confirmed bookings through yesterday (for FY'11-'12), compared to 13,019 in FY'10-'11. There are 5,960 pending signature/tentative bookings. The CVB has lost 14,292 bookings in FY'11-'12, compared to 35,165 in FY'10-'11.
- The CVB was busy in the month of April with the fam trip that was in town. The fam was very well received. As a result of the fam, there are 300 room nights booked thus far and another 800+ are pending, for a total of 1100 room nights.
- They did a sales blitz to Chicago.
- The CVB has a new phone system and has been moved to a new server.

 They have upgraded and staff has been trained on the new database system.

Mr. White mentioned that there is some graffiti on Grant Street.

Ms. Catanach said they are aware of this and have contacted the City Graffiti Department.

c) STEVE LEWIS- SFCVB PUBLIC RELATIONS

Mr. Lewis reported as follows:

- A fair amount of press writers were in town this past month. Mr. Lewis and Cynthia Delgado met with the editor of *Essentially America* last week for a city tour.

- Mr. Lewis and Ms. Delgado also met with an Italian freelance journalist
 Marco Berchi touring across the country for travel pieces in a weekly insert for Republica newspaper.
- Mr. Lewis helped arrange and an agenda and met with Senior Editor from Spa Finder magazine.
- Four writers were in town for meeting planner and press fam from: *Prevue Magazine; Corporate & Incentive Travel; Smart Meetings* and *Meeting Planners Guide.*
- Mr. Lewis reported on the recent press releases: The writer from Financial Times produced a style piece on the city. She contacted the Bureau's PR liaison for information.
- Santa Fe was included in a Travel & Leisure piece on America's Greenest Cities.
- Long-time New Mexico writer Steve Larese took part in a press trip last year that produced an extensive NM story for American Way, the in-flight magazine of American Airlines.
- Freelance journalist Paula Felps was in town last fall and wrote a story about Hotel Chimayo, and the town of Chimayo, for the Houston Chronicle, Miami Herald and Ft. Worth Star Telegram.
- Newsday.com featured Bishop's Lodge in a story about spring wildflowers.
- Freelance writer Kathy Chin Leong visited town this winter as part of the Ski New Mexico press trip and produced a story about finding Asia in Santa Fe, for the *Dallas Morning News*.
- Departures ran a piece in their "America's Best Rooftop Bars" series on La Fonda's Belltower bar.
- TKO Advertising came up with a great idea for a coop proposal: A culinary idea, "Recipe for Adventure" and they will be going to the State Tourism Department for a coop grant for the promotion. The deadline to apply is tomorrow.
- Mr. Lewis noted that they did a marketing presentation to the Gallery Association and they received great feedback.
- The CVB wrote and distributed the GLBT release.

- They are preparing for Gumball 3000 Rally coming through town in May.
 Press kits have been distributed to local media and will be sent out to regional press. Social media is already being used to publicize the event.
- Italian and German crews are coming to town through the New Mexico Tourism Department.
- The writer from Rough Guide: Southwest USA will be in town next week.
- Mr. Lewis concluded his report noting that he is working with the International Mountain Biking Association in preparation of promoting their conference.

IV. FINAL REPORT

a) Santa Fe Film Festival – Diane Schneier Perrin

Ms. Perrin presented the information from their Final Report. A written report was distributed in the Members' packets. Please see Exhibit "C" for the specifics of this report.

Ms. Perrin reported that they had over 3000 participants. The Festival's marketing to visitors to Santa Fe has resulted in a total of 372 room nights and an economic impact of more than \$49,000, including room sales. She said the assumption is that visitors stay an average of 3.5 nights per person.

Ms. Perrin noted that they have redesigned their website. Additionally, they use e-blasts that go out nationally and internationally to the festival participants.

Ms. Perrin said the Festival continues to build a strong out-of-town attendance for its screenings, particularly from traditional target markets: Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Colorado, California, Chicago and New York.

Ms. Perrin mentioned that they are moving the Festival back to the month of December.

Ms. Perrin said with the support from OTAB, they were able to leverage in-kind advertising through *The Santa Fean*, which extended their reach outside of New Mexico. As well as, radio advertising through Hutton Broadcasting-176 radio spots spread across four Hutton stations.

Mr. Hendry said the month of December is a great time to do a foreign market.

V. REQUEST FOR FUNDING:

a) Santa Fe Marimba Festival 2012 – Sam Lunt, Artistic Director

Mr. Maguire and Mr. Hunt presented the information from their application. Please see Exhibit "D" for the specifics of this presentation.

Santa Fe Marimba Festival is requesting \$4,850 for the 2012 Festival, which will be held June 6-9, 2012. The Festival is a celebration of the marimba from its roots in Africa, Mexico and Guatemala to contemporary classical marimba music. The Festival will feature 10 international marimba artists from Japan, Croatia, Taiwan, Belgium, Germany and the US in concerts and workshops. Concerts will also be held at the Gazebo on the Plaza Thursday and Friday afternoons.

Mr. Maguire noted that this is the first event of its kind in the United States, although there have been successful marimba festival in other countries. Players will be coming from many areas of the United States as well as some foreign countries.

Mr. Maguire said a contract is already in place for some 200 room nights at Garret's Desert Inn, which has a been designated as the host hotel, given its proximity to the major Festival sites of the New Mexico School for the Arts, the St. Francis Auditorium, The Plaza and the Lensic. The projected economic impact of the Festival is in excess of \$40,000, including room nights, lodgers' taxes, restaurant receipts, GRT and ticket sales.

Mr. Hunt said two years ago, he came up with this idea to bring in some marimba artists to Santa Fe. He noted that marimba is quite popular in schools. He said they hope to make this an annual event.

Mr. Maguire said this event has only been marketed on the internet.

Chair Castillo asked if there will be brochures done.

Mr. Maguire said yes.

Mr. Hendry asked why the city banned "buskers".

Mr. Maguire said they have made progress with regards to buskers. He noted that they will have marimba buskers present on street corners around downtown throughout the festival. They obtained a special permit from the city.

Mr. Hunt added that they are also trying to build community participation.

Ms. Bonney moved to approve the funding request at \$1500. Mr. White seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

b) New Mexico Association of Counties – Susan Mayes

Ms. Mayes presented the information from their application. Please see Exhibit "E" for the specifics of this presentation. Promotional material relative to the conference was distributed.

New Mexico Association of Counties is requesting \$4,500 for the New Mexico Association of Counties (NMAC) – Western Interstate Region (WIR) Annual Conference in conjunction with the National Association of Counties (NACo) and Santa Fe County.

The National Association of Counties sought out destinations for the Western Interstate Region (WIR) Annual conference for both 2012 and 2013. Under the direction of former Commissioner Harry Montoya, the County pursued Santa Fe as the destination for the 2012 Annual Conference and was successful in its endeavor. The County will act as the host and the New Mexico Association of Counties will serve as the fiscal agent, and it will be a coordinated effort with the NACo. The WIR Annual Conference will be held May 16-18, 2012.

Ms. Mayes noted that the WIR is affiliated with the NACo and is dedicated to the promotion of Western interests within NACo. These includes include public land issues (use and conservation), community stability economic development, and the promotion of the traditional Western way of life. Its membership consists of 15 states, including New Mexico with membership funded through the individual state associations.

Ms. Mayes said they are projecting that there will be approximately 350 attendees at the conference. The number of booked hotel rooms should range between 50 for pre-conference planners and up to 790 room nights for attendees. The Conference, based on WIR membership states, will attract visitors from fourteen other states.

Ms. Mayes said Santa Fe County will host the NACo and WIR Directors event and conference-wide event on May 16th and 17th. Santa Fe County is asking for the support of OTAB for these events in particular.

Santa Fe County will be utilizing Bishop's Lodge and the New Mexico History Museum/Museum of the Palace of the Governors' courtyard as the venues. In hosting both venues, the County desires to showcase the rich history of New Mexico during this conference.

The Association of Counties believes that the event will draw tourism to the Santa Fe area. The host hotels are located within the City limits.

Mr. White asked Ms. Mayes if they have contacted LTAB for funding.

Ms. Mayes said yes, this information is included in the packet.

Ms. Mayes mentioned that the event is promoted on the Association of Counties' website and the NACo's website. They also promote the event in the County's news blast.

Ms. Bonney asked if they are asking for funding to go towards the transportation costs.

Ms. Mayes said it could be used for transportation costs and some of the signage costs to promote this. She explained that the event has been advertised through the web.

- Ms. Bonney asked what the cost of the signage is.
- Ms. Mayes said the cost is approximately \$2000.
- Mr. Hendry explained that OTAB funding, by statute, can only be used to advertise and promote tourism and it has to be promoted or advertised more than 50 miles away-outside a 50 mile radius.
- Ms. Bonney said this application does not meet the promotion requirement. She asked how much LTAB funded them.
 - Ms. Mayes said \$10,000.
 - Ms. Bonney asked what the \$10,000 was used for.
 - Ms. Mayes said it will cover the event that will be held at Bishop's Lodge.

The application was rejected/denied because it did not meet the application requirements.

c) Folk Art Market – Charlene Cerny, Executive Director

This agenda item was postponed.

- d) Global Running Culture Joseph Karnes, Race Director
- Mr. Karnes thanked the Board for their support last year.
- Mr. Karnes presented the information from their application. Please see Exhibit "F" for the specifics of this presentation.

Global Running Culture is requesting \$10,000 for the Santa Fe Buffalo Thunder Half Marathon (the "Race"). The Race is the primary fundraiser for their organization Global Running Culture GRC). GRC's mission is to promote youth fitness, nutrition and health through participation in sport. They do so primarily through organizing local events, doing direct outreach with youth organizations and supporting non-profits with aligned missions. This year's Race is scheduled for September 16, 2012.

Their intent is to establish a nationally-recognized destination running event in Santa Fe drawing thousands of participants annually.

Mr. Bernstein noted that the Indian Market is an epic event like no other in its impact on the City and its role as an annual economic catalyst. It is the central reason for the 87,000 tourists from outside of Santa Fe to visit the city year after year. The Indian market infused over 122 million dollars into Santa Fe's economy last year. This means that much of the over \$18 million generated in sales for artists remains in the local economy.

Mr. Bernstein mentioned that SWAIA has also embraced and facilitated a Native youth movement in art, fashion, music and skateboarding with the goal of attracting an even greater diversity of visitors to the Santa Fe Indian Market.

Mr. White noted that the cover of the ad looks like it is a Buffalo Thunder ad. In response, Mr. Bernstein said the reason they were on last year's ad was because they are a big sponsor; however, this year's ad will look different. He said they also work with other hotels in town.

Mr. Hendry said SWAIA should utilize the services of the City. He explained that the City has personnel who could be available to assist them.

Ms. Bonney moved to approve the funding request at \$3,500. Mr. White seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

f) Dual Language Education of NM – David Rogers, Executive Director

This agenda item was postponed.

The next meeting will be held on May 24, 2012 at 8:30 a.m. in the City Hall Council Chambers. There will be no meeting in June.





OTAB POST EVENT NARRATIVE



In the lead-up to the Festival in late October, the Festival presented several community events, including a free event at the Santa Fe Railyard. On September 23rd the film *Juno* was screened in Railyard Park following a performance at the Railyard's Water Tower Plaza by singer/songwriter Kimya Dawson, whose music was featured in the Academy Award®-winning movie. Several weeks earlier the Festival presented a preview screening of *The Way* directed by Emilio Estevez and starring Martin Sheen, before its US release October 7th. The Santa Fe Film Festival hosted the event at The Screen including a Q & A with Emilio and Martin after each of the two capacity screenings.

The marketing of the Festival included ads in industry publications and a heavy emphasis on internet and social media marketing. Tickets were being sold through the Lensic's online box office and the Festival worked with www.withoutabox.com for submissions and is working with film industry sites such as www.wariety.com for promotion. The Festival received 247 submissions through withoutabox.com. The Festival has always relied on film lovers and film industry jurors to adjudicate the entries received through withoutabox.com. These highly-skilled individuals have, consistently, chosen high quality entries for the Festival. The Festival screened 23 features and 26 shorts this season. Film screenings were split between the University of Art & Design's The Screen and CCA's Cinematique. And, in addition to these venues, the Festival presented one kids film at the Lensic on closing night.

For Santa Fe Film Festival 2011 we continued our strong tradition of free, world-class panels and workshops; hosting some of them in galleries throughout town. These included veteran film and television professionals like Hughes Winborne, Academy Award®-Winning editor for "Crash" and editor for "The Help" and Santa Fe resident Kirk Ellis, Emmy Award®-Winning screenwriter of "John Adams."

This model of a concentrated, quality-driven, interactive festival continues to be the driving force moving into the organization's second decade. This direction is wholly consistent with the Festival's Mission Statement: "The Santa Fe Film Festival is dedicated to providing a showcase for excellent cinema from around the world; surveying the best in contemporary cinema and paying homage to the contributions of veteran film artists. By bringing together artists and patrons spanning different generations and cultures, we hope to bring focus to Santa Fe as a center for dialogue and creativity in the film industry."

Industry support for the Festival continues to be strong, particularly in light of the Festival's recognized position within New Mexico's film festival community — as presenter of workshops geared to the industry and providing a potential screening outlet for up-and-coming filmmakers. By clearly focusing on what the Festival is, rather than what it is not (smaller, rather than

continually growing), the Festival continues to garner industry support commensurate with its real value to the community, the film community and the industry as a whole.

The estival is very pleased that three of its 2011 selections are up for consideration for Academy Awards®, with *The Artist* garnering 10 nominations, while *Monsieur Lazhar* has been nominated as Best Foreign Film, competing with another Santa Fe Film Festival selection, *A Separation*, the frontrunner in the same category and is also nominated in the Best Original Screenplay category.

The Festival's marketing to visitors to Santa Fe has resulted in a total of a minimum of 372 room nights and an economic impact of more than \$49,000, including room sales. The Festival continues to build a strong out—of-town attendance for its screenings, particularly from some of Santa Fe's traditional target markets—Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Colorado, California, Chicago and New York.

Update: The Artist did, in fact, win the Best Picture Oscar and A Separation won the best Foreign Film award.





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NMAC for Santa Fe County Application for Lodgers Tax Funding Assistance

1). The National Association of Counties (NACo) sought out destinations for the Western Interstate Region (WIR) Annual Conference for both 2012 and 2013. Under the direction of former commissioner Harry Montoya, the County pursued Santa Fe as the destination for the 2012 annual conference and was successful in its endeavor. The County will act as the host and the New Mexico Association of Counties will serve as the fiscal agent, and it will be a coordinated effort with the NACo. The WIR Annual Conference will be held May 16-18, 2012.

The WIR is affiliated with the National Association of Counties and is dedicated to the promotion of Western interests within NACo. These interests include public land issues (use and conservation), community stability economic development, and the promotion of the traditional Western way of life. Its membership consists of fifteen Western states, (AK, HI, WA, OR, CA, ID, NV, AZ, MT, WY, CO, NM, UT, ND, and SD) with membership funded through the individual state associations.

Santa Fe County will host the NACo and WIR Directors event and conference-wide event on May 16 and 17. The conference attendees total approximately 350. The number of hotel rooms booked shall range between 50 for pre-conference planners and attendees up to 790 rooming nights during the full conference. The conference, based on WIR membership states, will attract visitors from fourteen other states.

It is estimated that the NACo and WIR Directors event will have approximately 250 attendees and the conference-wide event approximately 450 attendees and is open to all conference attendees, spouses, and youth. Santa Fe County is hosting the conference-wide event and is asking for the support of the Occupancy Tax Advisory Board (OTAB) for these events in particular.

Santa Fe County will be utilizing Bishop's Lodge and the New Mexico History Museum/Museum of the Palace of the Governors' courtyard as the venues. In hosting both venues, the County very much desires to showcase the rich history of New Mexico during this conference. For your review, enclosed are several flyers of information relative to the conference as well as introductory information about Santa Fe. One flyer in particular speaks directly to the second host event sponsored by the County and held at the New Mexico History Museum.

2.) This is the first opportunity Santa Fe County and NMAC have collaborated to host the WIR conference. We firmly believe that this event will draw many visitors to the County due to the fact that the WIR is highly reputable and wel-regarded nationally. Our forecasts up to 450 potential visitors with a potential of 790 room nights for the length of the annual conference.

This conference is a coordinated effort between the NACo, the NMAC, and Santa Fe County. We firmly believe the event will draw tourism to the Santa Fe area. The host hotels are located within the City limits with the intent for the County to host two conference events. One event will be at a County facility, Bishop's Lodge, and the other at the New Mexico History Museum with Bishop's Lodge as the caterer along with the New Mexico Department of Agriculture.

The County is limited to hosting the conference-wide event based on the coordinated efforts organized through the NACo. The NACo has certain controls to ensure consistency among all conferences. The County is limited to the sponsorship of the two conference events. This is a huge opportunity to showcase the wealth of art, culture and tradition that makes Santa Fe a destination city and county for visitors. Santa Fe should witness an increase in spending for art galleries, stores and shops, restaurants and museums. With 350 attendees, the local businesses can witness an increase in sales due to the conference. Additionally, with a sales increase, the local governments should witness a corresponding increase in gross receipt taxes. The forecasted hotel rooms booked at 790 room nights could potentially increase hotel sales by \$100,000 in the month of May.

Additionally, the County has had staff representation at conferences held in Seattle and Washington. The Seattle conference was sponsored by NACo and the Washington conference by WIR. There is an additional NACo Legislative conference in March held in Washington, DC with County staff promoting the 2012 WIR Annual Conference. Lastly, NACo has begun email blasts to promote the May conference. It is important to note that NACo is the only national organization that represents county governments. NACo provides essential services and has access to the nation's 3,068 counties.

PROPOSAL FOR WIR CONFERENCE SANTA FE 2012

Santa Fe County will host the NACo and WIR Directors event and Conference-Wide Event on Wednesday, May 16 and Thursday, May 17, 2012. We understand that the NACo and WIR Board of Directors event will have approximately 250 attendees and the Conference-Wide event is open to all conference attendees, spouses and youth, approximately 450. Tentative time of both events is 6:00pm-8:00pm. Generally, these receptions will provide heavy hors d'oeuvres or dinner and beverages.

A pre-Conference tour will be offered for Tuesday, May 15 from 1:00pm – 4:30pm. It is a tour of the Buckman Direct Diversion, a large regional sustainable water supply system that provides a sustainable way for Santa Fe County and the City of Santa Fe to access surface water supplies by diverting San Juan-Chama Project water and native Rio Grande water to reduce their reliance on over-taxed ground water resources. This will be advertised on the Conference registration site at no cost.

Santa Fe County will be utilizing Bishop's Lodge and the New Mexico History Museum/ Museum of the Palace of the Governor's Courtyard as the venues. Santa Fe County would like to showcase the rich history of New Mexico during this conference. The NACo and WIR Board of Directors event at Bishop's Lodge will be hosted on a mesa on the Bishop's Lodge property overlooking Santa Fe. This is will be a "Cowboy Cookout" providing the attendees with a variety of foods making this an authentic cowboy, southwestern experience around wagons and campfire.

For the Bishop's Lodge event, we will provide van transportation for guests to the event. The Conference-Wide event, Santa Fe County will partner in conjunction with the New Mexico State University's Department of Agriculture to showcase New Mexico's agricultural products from beef to dairy by providing complimentary "Taste of New Mexico" heavy hors d'oeuvres/samples. 



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

Santa Fe to Buffalo Thunder Half Marathon Application for Lodgers Tax Funding Assistance

1. Synopsis

The Santa Fe to Buffalo Thunder Half Marathon (the "Race") is the primary fundraiser for our 501(c)(3) organization Global Running Culture (GRC). GRC's mission is to promote youth fitness, nutrition and health through participation in sport. We do so primarily through organizing local events, doing direct outreach with youth organizations and supporting non-profits with aligned missions.

Our intent is to establish a nationally-recognized destination running event in Santa Fe drawing thousands of participants annually. The attached final report of our inaugural 2011 race documents that out of our 700+ entrants, over 80 came from 17 states and 3 countries including 40 entrants from coastal states. These results, achieved with minimal out of state advertising validate out concept that Santa Fe is an idea location for a major destination Race.

Research shows that runners travelling to a race typically spend additional days at their destination, combining their race experience and a vacation and bringing their families. The demographics of such runners are usually older and wealthier than participants in local races, who usually come from surrounding communities.

Last year, Buffalo Thunder sold out two weeks before the Race. We anticipate that all participants coming from out of town beyond the 700 entrants we had last year will be staying in Santa Fe hotels. We are taking out a half page ad in Runners World magazine (650,000 circulation) and expect a field of at least 1,500 and hopefully more. We already have received 15 entries, 9 of which are from out of state including 2 from Whitehorse, in the Yukon Territories.

A major attraction for this year's race is the participation of Olympic legend Billy Mills. Mr. Mills is living legend, both in the running and Native American communities and we anticipate that his presence will substantially increase the profile of our Race.

Final Report

Global Running Culture, Inc., a non-profit organization, founded the Santa Fe to Buffalo Thunder Half Marathon in 2011 with the goal of establishing a nationally-recognized destination race in Santa Fe, New Mexico. The race advances our mission of promoting youth fitness, nutrition and health through participation in sports. This report documents our efforts and the results of the inaugural race held on September 18, 2011.

Race Details — The events included a 5K Run and 1 Mile Fitness Walk both at Buffalo Thunder. The half marathon course is USATF-certified and drops a net 1,000' between the start at Fort Marcy and finish at the Buffalo Thunder Resort & Casino.

Participants received 5 color Nike dry-fit t-shirts, well-stocked goody bags, clear acrylic finisher medals, handmade age group award medals 3-deep, Nike running shoes for age group winners, & prize money to top 3 male and female finishers: \$1,000, \$500, \$250.

SWAIA SANTA FE INDIAN MARKET

1. Purpose and goals of event

The mission of the Southwestern Association for Indian Arts (SWAIA) is to bring Native arts to the world by inspiring artistic excellence, fostering education, and creating meaningful partnerships. However, SWAIA also brings the world *to* Native arts, by creating a must-see tourist destination that draws a total of over 100,000 visitors to Santa Fe annually.

SWAIA's Santa Fe Indian Market is an epic event like no other in its impact on our city and its role as annual economic catalyst is irrefutable. Not only does it play a pivotal role in the reputation of Santa Fe as an epicenter of art the world over, it is also the central reason for the 87,000 tourists from outside of Santa Fe to visit the city year after year. This combination of the highest quality Native art and IM's impact on the economy gives SWAIA the unique opportunity to support and sustain Santa Fe in a way no other festival, event, or cultural organization can or does.

Unfortunately, in 2011 SWAIA did not meet its projected revenue marks. This can likely be attributed to the downturn of the national economy, as well as, the monsoon weather experienced during Market. As a consequence, the scope of Indian Market 2012 has been reduced, including in areas of advertising and promotion. We are concerned about the effect this will have on the over 100 million dollars SWAIA's Indian Market brings to Santa Fe annually. So, SWAIA is requesting funding from the Occupancy Tax Advisory Board to conceptualize and generate a promotional newspaper insert directed at attracting visitors from other parts of New Mexico to Santa Fe for the 2012 Indian Market week events. This insert will appear in publications such as the Albuquerque Journal and Albuquerque Alibi, Farmington, Las Cruces, Gallup among others, reaching a distributorship of least 300,000. Requested funds will allow Indian Market to increase advertising outside of the immediate region, as well as, build attendance.

Now in its 91st year, the Santa Fe Indian Market includes 1,200 Native artists, who are selected to exhibit by a jury of experts in their fields as artists, anthropologists, art historians, curators, collectors and gallerists. Each August, Santa Fe's historic plaza and 14 surrounding city blocks are home to this vibrant cultural festival. Most Indian Market week events are provided at no cost to members of the public including the Market itself, the Native Cinema Showcase, Native Literary Arts Reading Series, and the Native Clothing Contest. Events are located in downtown Santa Fe making them easily and affordably accessible by public transportation, on foot, or on bicycle. In addition, SWAIA works with the City of Santa Fe to ensure all events are accessible for participants with disabilities.

Although Indian Market has a 90-plus year history this project is an ever-evolving one flexible enough to grow with the demands of its attendees. In just the last several years SWAIA has added the week-long film festival, Literary Arts Native Reading Series and expanded the scope of Market to incorporate Canada's First Nations Peoples. SWAIA has also embraced and facilitated a Native youth movement in art, fashion, music and skateboarding with the goal of attracting an even greater diversity of visitors to the Santa Fe Indian Market.

2. Economic impact to city; # of hotel rooms and people, length of stay, where coming from; How event will directly bring visitors and increase tourism

Indian Market infused over 122 million dollars into Santa Fe's economy last year. In addition, approximately 65% of artists who participate in Indian Market live in New Mexico, with about 50% in the Santa Fe area. This means that much of the over 18 million dollars generated in sales for IM artists remains in the local economy. SWAIA also contracts with local businesses to provide components such as security, logistical and production support, hospitality and banquet facilities, photography, promotion, printing, solid waste removal and the full range of services necessary to produce IM. SWAIA spends more than \$1.3 million annually and employs 6 full-time, 3 part-time, and 20 seasonal workers to produce IM each year. For every dollar spent by SWAIA to plan and implement Indian Market close to one hundred dollars in revenue is created for city businesses and services.

A 2010 Campbell Rinker survey found the following:

- Indian Market attracts around 100,000 visitors to Santa Fe.
- 2. 87% of attendees come from outside of Santa Fe.
- 3. Over 65,000, the majority of attendees, stayed overnight in Santa Fe in paid accommodations.
- 4. They stayed an average of 3.2 nights.
- 5. They came from throughout the United States many from Arizona, Texas, California, Colorado, Virginia, Oregon, Oklahoma, New York, Massachusetts, or Illinios.
- 6. They also come from countries all over the world including the Netherlands, Germany, Switzerland, Italy and Japan.
- 7. 60% of them stayed in a hotel or motel, 8% stayed in vacation rentals, and 7% in bed and breakfasts.
- 8. Visitors from other places in New Mexico spent an average of \$895.16 while in Santa Fe visiting IM. Out-of-state visitors spent an average of \$1,806.47 during the same period. This money was spent on items such as dining, accommodations, Entertainment, transportation and non-Indian Market purchases.







Through the voice of one of the movement's foremost leaders, Iritana Tawhiwhirangi, this documentary chronicles the kohanga reo from its early days as a grass-roots project of the Department of Maori Affairs to its success, three decades later, having graduated over 60,000 fluent te reo Maori speakers.
