Purpose of Revising Said Ordinance.

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY:

The Board authorized Agency staff to publish title and general summary of Ordinance 2012—at its regular scheduled meeting held on April 19, 2012. This was accomplished with a certified legal advertisement in the Santa Fe New Mexican on April 26, 2012, and in accordance with state and local requirements.

The packet material presented to the Board on April 19, 2012, is attached for reference.

Revisions made to the proposed ordinance after being published are as follows:

- 1. Clarified the gross vehicle weights for small vehicles using the transfer station under Exhibit A Schedule of Fees by correcting the lower weight for the \$12.00/load category from 5,500 to 5,501 pounds to avoid any confusion with the \$9.00/load category, which already has an upper vehicle gross vehicle weight at 5,500 pounds.
- 2. Change Vice Chair to Chair on the signatory page.

ACTIONS REQUESTED:

Agency staff requests approval of Ordinance 2012-___, an ordinance to repeal and replace Ordinance 2010-1 entitled creating fees, rates, and charges for use at all facilities operated by the Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency for the purpose of revising said ordinance.

13	Section 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this ordinance is to set forth the fees, rates, charges and
14	conditions of service that shall be applicable at all facilities operated by the Santa Fe Solid Waste
15	Management Agency.
16	Section 2. LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY. The Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency
17	was created by means of a duly approved Joint Powers Agreement between the City of Santa Fe
18	and Santa Fe County acting under the authority of the Joint Powers Agreement Act (being
19	Section 11-1-1 through 11-1-7, NMSA 1978). The governing body of the agency is a Board of
20	Directors designated in accordance with the Joint Powers Agreement.
21	Section 3. DEFINITIONS
22	Composted Mulch: A product produced under a controlled aerobic thermophilic biological
23	decomposition process and that meets the New Mexico Department of Transportation minimum
24	specifications for composted mulch. Raw materials for composted mulch may include green
25	waste and manure.

- 1 Commercial Truck Tire: Scrap tires with rim size more than 20 inches.
- 2 Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator (CESQG): A generator that produces no
- 3 more than 220 pounds of hazardous waste, or no more than 2.2 pounds of acutely hazardous
- 4 waste, in a calendar month.
- 5 Construction and Demolition (C&D) Waste: Waste generated from the construction or
- 6 demolition of a structure. C&D waste can consist of, but is not limited to, steel, brick, concrete,
- 7 asphalt, roofing materials, pipe, gypsum board, wallboard, lumber, glass, paper, cartons, rubber,
- 8 and plastics. C&D waste does not include regulated asbestos, garbage, hazardous materials,
- 9 liquids, paints, solvents, adhesives, or sealers.
- 10 Contaminated Load: Any load of recyclables which contains materials other than those
- specified in an amount exceeding 10% by volume in a visual inspection.
- 12 Conventional Recyclables: Those materials defined as acceptable for recycling and posted at
- 13 the facilities. Recyclables include, but are not limited to, old newspaper (ONP), old corrugated
- 14 cardboard (OCC), magazines, junk mail, office paper, aluminum cans (UBC), aluminum foil,
- steel cans, #1 PET plastic bottles, #2 HDPE plastic bottles and glass bottles and jars prepared in
- 16 accordance with SFSWMA's published requirements.
- 17 Dead Animals: Large animals typical of all breeds of livestock: cows, pigs, and horses; and
- small animals such as domestic cats and dogs. Dead animals include wildlife resulting from road
- 19 kills but not from infectious diseases.
- 20 Electronic Waste (E-Waste): Category of surplus, obsolete, broken or discarded electronic
- 21 devices including, but not limited to, computers, monitors, keyboards, mice, scanners, various
- 22 computer peripherals, security equipment, fax and copy machines, cell phones and telephone
- 23 equipment.
- 24 Executive Director: The Executive Director of the SFSWMA, as designated by the JPB.
- 25 Facilities: All facilities operated by the SFSWMA including the following;

- 1 Landfill Facility: Caja del Rio Landfill located at 149 Wildlife Way, Santa Fe, NM
- 2 87506.
- Recycling & Transfer Facility: Buckman Road Recycling and Transfer Station
- 4 (BuRRT) located at 2600 Buckman Road, Santa Fe, NM 87507.
- 5 Freon Bearing Device: Any device which contains and uses five (5) pounds or less of a Class I
- 6 (CFC) or Class II (HCFC) substance as a refrigerant and which is used for household or
- 7 commercial purposes, including any air conditioner, refrigerator, chiller or freezer.
- 8 Generator: Any person that produces solid waste by site or location to be shipped to any other
- 9 site or location, or whose act or process produces a solid waste to first cause to become
- 10 regulated.
- 11 Glass Aggregate: Glass bottles and jars which have been pulverized to produce two separate
- grades of aggregate <1/8 inch nominal size and <3/8 inch nominal size.
- 13 Green Waste: Vegetative organic matter resulting from landscaping, land maintenance and
- 14 agricultural operations. Green waste includes, but is not limited to, cuttings and trimmings from
- 15 trees, shrubs, or lawns and similar materials. Green waste does not include rock, dirt, metal,
- plastic, paper or any type of construction and demolition materials.
- 17 Gross Vehicle Weight (GVW): The total weight of the vehicle, any trailer, its occupants and
- 18 contents.
- 19 Household Hazardous Waste (HHW): Leftover household products such as paints, cleaners,
- 20 oils, batteries, and pesticides that contain potentially hazardous ingredients which require special
- 21 handling when disposed of.
- 22 Immediate Burial: All materials including dead animals requiring immediate and secure
- 23 disposal.
- Joint Powers Agreement (JPA): The agreement between the City of Santa Fe and Santa Fe
- 25 County which created the SFSWMA and conveys certain authorities and responsibilities to the

- 1 SFSWMA related to the construction, operation, maintenance, replacement, expansion and
- 2 closure of a solid waste facility.
- 3 Joint Powers Board (JPB): The JPB which is the governing body of the SFSWMA and which
- 4 is designated in accordance with the Joint Powers Agreement.
- 5 Mercury-Containing Lamp: Any bulb or tube portion of the lighting device that contains a
- 6 small amount of elemental mercury.
- 7 Manure: Agriculture waste composed of animal waste and animal bedding materials that
- 8 originated from sites approved by the SFSWMA and contains no contamination such as
- 9 veterinary waste.
- 10 Mulch: Ground green waste of which 100% of material passes a two (2) inch screen and has
- been cured a minimum of ninety (90) days.
- 12 Non-Freon Bearing Appliance: Household appliances which are not designed to utilize Freon,
- including, but not limited to, stoves/ranges, hot water heaters, dishwashers and laundry machines
- which are a minimum of 60% metal by weight.
- 15 Owner: Owner, business owner or corporate owner responsible for waste and/or recycling being
- delivered to the facilities for disposal or recovery. The owner, business owner, or corporate
- 17 owner will be responsible for certifying that all waste and recyclables meet New Mexico
- 18 Environment Department, Federal, City and County rules, regulations and ordinances. The
- 19 owner, business owner, or corporate owner will be responsible for all waste and recycling
- 20 disposal and processing costs.
- 21 Oversized Mulch: Ground green waste of which 100% of material does not pass a 2" screen.
- 22 Passenger Tires: Scrap tires with rim size of 20 inches or smaller. Passenger tires include tires
- from motorcycles and ATV's.
- 24 Permits: The permits issued by the New Mexico Environment Department which authorize and
- 25 direct the respective facility's operations.

- 1 Petroleum Contaminated Soil: The owner/generator of petroleum contaminated soil shall assure
- 2 that all petroleum contaminated soils are tested under the requirements of 20.9.8.11 and 20.9.8.15
- 3 NMAC including total petroleum hydrocarbons (TPH) and other contaminants as required by
- 4 facility's disposal management plan.
- 5 Salvaging: The controlled removal of materials for utilization, recycling, or sale.
- 6 Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency (SFSWMA): A joint powers agency created by
- 7 the JPA and governed by the JPB.
- 8 Scavenging: The uncontrolled and unauthorized removal of materials from any point at the
- 9 solid waste facilities.
- 10 Schedule of Fees: The schedule of fees, rates and charges assessed to persons making use of the
- 11 facilities.
- 12 Scrap Metal: Appliances and other objects which consist of a minimum of 60% metal by
- 13 weight. Scrap metal includes, but is not limited to, household appliances, some building
- materials and auto parts.
- 15 Scrap Tire: A tire that is no longer suitable for its originally intended purpose because of wear,
- damage or defect.
- 17 Sludge: Any solid, semi-solid, or liquid waste generated by a municipal, commercial or
- 18 industrial waste water treatment plant, water supply treatment plant, or air pollution control
- 19 facility. Sludge does not include treated effluent from a waste water treatment plant. The
- 20 owner/generator shall assure that the sludge is tested under the requirements of 20.9.8.11 and
- 21 20.9.8.16 NMAC and as required by facility's disposal management plan.
- 22 Solid Waste: All putrescible and non-putrescible materials generated or originating from
- 23 residential, commercial, industrial, mining, or community activities or from agricultural
- 24 operations that are discarded or rejected, whether (i) as being spent, useless, worthless or in
- excess to the owners at the time of such discard or rejection, (ii) as having served their intended

- 1 use, or (iii) for any other reason. Solid waste does not include materials accepted for recycling or
- 2 reuse or materials specifically prohibited by Section 7 of this ordinance.
- 3 Uncovered / Unsecured Load: Any load from which litter and debris can blow out of or fall
- 4 from a vehicle.

Section 4. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. Establishment of Enterprise Fund. For the purpose of defraying all expenses of receiving, disposing or recycling of solid wastes and recyclables a regional solid waste agency enterprise fund has been created. The SFSWMA shall establish fees, rates and charges designed to recover the full cost of services for the various services provided. All revenues received from fees, rates and charges shall be credited to the fund. The fund shall pay all direct and indirect operating expenses as well as principal and interest payments and all other costs of bond indebtedness.
 - B. Authority to Accept Waste and Recyclables: The SFSWMA shall at all times have the sole and exclusive right to determine whether it shall receive, retain, reject, dispose of or recycle any solid waste or recyclable.

Section 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF FEE CATEGORIES

A. Schedule of Fees. The rates, fees and charges assessed to persons making use of the facilities shall be in accordance with the Schedule of Fees and with the service classes described herein. The Schedule of Fees is hereby adopted by reference and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A and made effective upon adoption of this ordinance. In accordance with the Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax Act, Section 7-9-4.3, NMSA 1978, a governmental gross receipts tax of up to 5% shall be imposed on each billing rendered in accordance with this ordinance.

B. Service Classes.

- 1. Landfill Service. Mixed or separated solid waste intended for disposal at the Caja del Rio Landfill Facility. Landfill service is generally restricted to those vehicles which exceed 12,500 pounds GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Landfill Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 2. Transfer Service. Mixed or separated solid waste delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and intended for transfer to the Caja del Rio Landfill Facility. Transfer service is generally restricted to vehicles which do not exceed 12,500 pounds GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Recycling & Transfer Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 3. Recycling Service. Mixed or separated conventional recyclables, green waste, scrap tires or scrap metal intended for recycling and delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility. Recycling service shall not be restricted by GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 4. Contract Service. Solid waste or recyclables delivered to the facilities in a quantity or condition which merit special consideration through a contractual fee agreement. Contract service shall also apply to any materials produced for resale by the SFSWMA. All contractual fee agreements shall meet the requirements of relevant local and state procurement laws and regulations, and, where applicable, the requirements of SFSWMA Policy No. 2010.1, Purchasing Procedures and Finance Policy.

1 5. Material Sales. The sale of materials produced by the SFSWMA and 2 priced in accordance with this Ordinance or prevailing market price or sold to the 3 highest qualified bidder. 4 Section 6. BILLING AND COLLECTION 5 A. The Executive Director shall establish procedures for the rendering of bills and 6 receipt of payment including service contracts, security deposits and other guarantees of 7 payment. 8 B. Fees are due within thirty (30) days following each monthly billing or as the 9 Executive Director shall authorize. Any billed amount not paid by the date due shall 10 become delinquent on that date. C. 11 A penalty of one and one half percent (1.5%) per month may be charged on all 12 amounts which are delinquent. 13 The Executive Director may pursue all available means of collection of D. 14 delinquent amounts including termination of use of the facility. 15 E. Filing a complaint regarding fees, rates and charges does not relieve a customer 16 from making payments in a timely fashion. If it is determined that a customer was over 17 charged, the customer will be entitled to an appropriate refund. 18 F. Cash transactions including cash, checks, and debit/credit cards shall be rounded 19 to the nearest five (5) cents. Charge transactions for monthly billing shall be rounded to 20 the nearest one (1) cent. 21 Section 7. PROHIBITED MATERIALS 22 A. The SFSWMA will not accept the following materials at any facility: 23 1. Bulk or non-containerized liquids as defined by 20.9.2.10 NMAC 24 2. Compressed gas cylinders and tanks 25 3. Explosives and ammunition

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY:

The Agency currently uses tipping fees (rates) established by Ordinance 2010-1. The rates were based on revised waste projections of 150,000 tons per year at the Caja del Rio Landfill starting October 2010. The tons were revised from 200,000 to 150,000 due to several declining years of waste processed at the landfill. The rates were set to increase incrementally for three fiscal years (FY 2010-11, FY 2011-12, and FY 2012-13) to minimize the financial impacts to customers.

The Agency has operated the Buckman Road Recycling and Transfer Station (BuRRT) since January 2006. All vehicles stop at the scalehouse and then are directed to the designated areas to unload their materials. Self-haul and commercial vehicles that have a recorded tare weight (i.e., vehicle weight when empty) are not required to reweigh upon exiting the transfer station. Vehicles with trailers and vehicles with green waste are required to reweigh due to the high variability of gross weight (i.e., combined weight of vehicle, trailer, its occupants, contents and materials) and for the purpose of assessing a prorated fee on the net weight of the materials. Small vehicles (automobiles, vans, small and mid-sized pickup trucks) with gross weight less than 6,000 pounds are assessed one of two flat fees as follows: if the vehicle weighs less than 4,000 pounds the fee is \$5.00 per load plus gross receipts tax, and if it weighs between 4,000 − 6,000 pounds the fee is \$10.00 per load plus gross receipts tax. The purpose of the flat fees is to provide convenience for the users by not requiring to reweigh at the scalehouseupon exiting the transfer station and to prevent long waiting lines at the inbound and outbound scales (≈25,000 transactions; 35% of all transactions).

With the next rate increase set for July 1, 2012, the 2-tier flat fee system is scheduled to increase from \$5.00 to \$6.00 per load and from \$10.00 to \$12.00 per load to ensure equity between vehicles under the flat fee system and those that are required to reweigh at \$50.00 per ton. The current system has been effective; however, the Agency

recognizes there may be an apparent disparity between the \$6.00 and \$12.00 loads that may lead to customer dissatisfaction. The Agency also proposes to overcome this disproportion by implementing a 3-tier flat fee system as shown on the following table.

The following table shows the impact of the proposed 3-tier flat fee system rates based on data from April 1, 2011 to March 31, 2012 for vehicles weighing less than 6,500 pounds. The data does not include commercial accounts, vehicles with green waste, and vehicles with trailers, which are vehicles that have tare weights or required reweigh. Comparison of the revenues between the 2-tier and 3-tier flat fee systems shows vehicles in all categories resulting in comparable revenues.

The Agency currently accepts only cash and checks for transactions at the landfill and transfer station unless a customer has established a commercial account with the Agency. Commercial accounts are generally set up for private hauling companies, government entities, schools, hospitals, non-profit groups, private firms, contractors, demolition companies and self-haulers that utilize the facilities on a frequent basis. Commercial accounts require payment bonds or advanced payments. This method works well for most customers using the landfill. Conversely, approximately 80% of the customers that use the transfer station pay with cash or checks (\$814,810 from April 2011 to March 2012).

The Agency has received numerous requests from customers for the Agency to accept debit/credit cards at the landfill and transfer station. Based on the card processing industry standard, approximately 60% of cash transactions (\$489,000) at the transfer station would be completed with debit/credit cards. The Agency currently uses a Carolina Software called WasteWorks for ticket transactions. Carolina Software offers integrated credit card processing through PowerPay. With an integrated system there are no external terminals. It can save processing steps and time at the end of a transaction

and eliminate key-entry mistakes that might be made by using an external terminal. If a transaction needs to be voided in WasteWorks, it automatically reverses the credit card charge. PowerPay requires no contracts and offers 24/7 support service.

The Agency reviewed card processing rates offered by both PowerPay and its current bank, Wells Fargo Bank. Although both companies offered comparable rates, Powerpay has two distinctive advantages over Wells Fargo Bank: no external terminals required to integrate with WasteWorks, and fewer variable rates for transactions. For PowerPay in general, the authorization (swipe) charge is \$0.20 per transaction. The transaction fee (total dollar amount of transaction) is based on the following cards: debit cards (1.49%), qualified consumer credit cards (1.70%), mid qualified rewards cards (2.19%), and non-qualified corporate cards (3.09%). Based on the authorization charge and transaction fee by PowerPay, the Agency estimates the annual cost for a card processing service will be \$20,000 per year.

The following is a history of ordinances for fees:

- Ordinance 1996-1, original fee ordinance for Caja del Rio Landfill.
- Ordinance 1997-1, replaced Ordinance 1996-1, deleted minimum fee on "dead animals."
- December 1998, adoption of residential fee schedule to allow small vehicles at the landfill.
- Ordinance 2002-2, established fees for a green waste program due to the pine bark beetle infestation.
- Ordinance 2005-1, replaced Ordinance 1997-1, realigned previous fees along with new fees due to the expansion of BuRRT.
- Ordinance 2009-1 replaced Ordinance 2005-1, established fees for the facilities based on financial modeling.
- Ordinance 2010-1 replaced Ordinance 2009-1, established fees for FY 2010-11 through FY 2012-13 for the facilities based on financial modeling.

The salient points of the Ordinance 2012-__ are:

- 1. Adjusts the Schedule of Fees in "Exhibit A" for services as follows:
 - a. Deletes Exhibits A1 and A2 showing former rates for 2011 and 2012 fiscal years and renames Exhibit A3 as Exhibit A.
 - b. Sets landfill tipping fee at \$40.00/ton for vehicles greater than 18,000 lbs GVW.
 - c. Sets landfill tipping fee at \$50.00/ton for vehicles 12,500 lbs to 18,000 lbs GVW.
 - d. Sets transfer station tipping fee at \$50.00/ton for vehicles greater than 6,500 lbs GVW and vehicles with trailers.
 - e. Provides a 3-tier flat fee system for small and mid-sized vehicles weighing less than 6,500 lbs at the transfer station at \$6.00, \$9.00, and \$12.00 per load based on gross vehicle weight.

- f. Sets minimum load charge for transfer service at \$6.00 per load.
- 2. Changes E-scrap to E-waste in Section 3 Definitions.
- 3. Updates Section 5 Establishment of Fee Categories.
- 4. Includes debit/credit cards for transactions in Section 6 Billing and Collection.
- 5. Adds the category special waste not otherwise specified in Section 7 Prohibited Materials.
- 6. Provides effective date of July 1, 2012 in Section 10 Effective Date.

13	Section 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this ordinance is to set forth the fees, rates, charges and
14	conditions of service that shall be applicable at all facilities operated by the Santa Fe Solid Waste
15	Management Agency.
16	Section 2. LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY. The Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency
17	was created by means of a duly approved Joint Powers Agreement between the City of Santa Fe
18	and Santa Fe County acting under the authority of the Joint Powers Agreement Act (being
19	Section 11-1-1 through 11-1-7, NMSA 1978). The governing body of the agency is a Board of
20	Directors designated in accordance with the Joint Powers Agreement.
21	Section 3. DEFINITIONS
22	Composted Mulch: A product produced under a controlled aerobic thermophilic biological
23	decomposition process and that meets the New Mexico Department of Transportation minimum
24	specifications for composted mulch. Raw materials for composted mulch may include green
25	waste and manure.

- 1 Commercial Truck Tire: Scrap tires with rim size more than 20 inches.
- 2 Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator (CESQG): A generator that produces no
- 3 more than 220 pounds of hazardous waste, or no more than 2.2 pounds of acutely hazardous
- 4 waste, in a calendar month.
- 5 Construction and Demolition (C&D) Waste: Waste generated from the construction or
- 6 demolition of a structure. C&D waste can consist of, but is not limited to, steel, brick, concrete,
- asphalt, roofing materials, pipe, gypsum board, wallboard, lumber, glass, paper, cartons, rubber,
- 8 and plastics. C&D waste does not include regulated asbestos, garbage, hazardous materials,
- 9 liquids, paints, solvents, adhesives, or sealers.
- 10 Contaminated Load: Any load of recyclables which contains materials other than those
- specified in an amount exceeding 10% by volume in a visual inspection.
- 12 Conventional Recyclables: Those materials defined as acceptable for recycling and posted at
- 13 the facilities. Recyclables include, but are not limited to, old newspaper (ONP), old corrugated
- 14 cardboard (OCC), magazines, junk mail, office paper, aluminum cans (UBC), aluminum foil,
- steel cans, #1 PET plastic bottles, #2 HDPE plastic bottles and glass bottles and jars prepared in
- accordance with SFSWMA's published requirements.
- 17 Dead Animals: Large animals typical of all breeds of livestock: cows, pigs, and horses; and
- small animals such as domestic cats and dogs. Dead animals include wildlife resulting from road
- 19 kills but not from infectious diseases.
- 20 Electronic Waste (E-Waste): Category of surplus, obsolete, broken or discarded electronic
- 21 devices including, but not limited to, computers, monitors, keyboards, mice, scanners, various
- 22 computer peripherals, security equipment, fax and copy machines, cell phones and telephone
- 23 equipment.
- 24 Executive Director: The Executive Director of the SFSWMA, as designated by the JPB.
- 25 Facilities: All facilities operated by the SFSWMA including the following;

- 2 Landfill Facility: Caja del Rio Landfill located at 149 Wildlife Way, Santa Fe, NM
- 3 87506.
- 4 Recycling & Transfer Facility: Buckman Road Recycling and Transfer Station
- 5 (BuRRT) located at 2600 Buckman Road, Santa Fe, NM 87507.
- 6 Freon Bearing Device: Any device which contains and uses five (5) pounds or less of a Class I
- 7 (CFC) or Class II (HCFC) substance as a refrigerant and which is used for household or
- 8 commercial purposes, including any air conditioner, refrigerator, chiller or freezer.
- 9 Generator: Any person that produces solid waste by site or location to be shipped to any other
- 10 site or location, or whose act or process produces a solid waste to first cause to become
- 11 regulated.
- 12 Glass Aggregate: Glass bottles and jars which have been pulverized to produce two separate
- 13 grades of aggregate <1/8 inch nominal size and <3/8 inch nominal size.
- 14 Green Waste: Vegetative organic matter resulting from landscaping, land maintenance and
- 15 agricultural operations. Green waste includes, but is not limited to, cuttings and trimmings from
- 16 trees, shrubs, or lawns and similar materials. Green waste does not include rock, dirt, metal,
- 17 plastic, paper or any type of construction and demolition materials.
- 18 Gross Vehicle Weight (GVW): The total weight of the vehicle, any trailer, its occupants and
- 19 contents.
- 20 Household Hazardous Waste (HHW): Leftover household products such as paints, cleaners,
- 21 oils, batteries, and pesticides that contain potentially hazardous ingredients which require special
- 22 handling when disposed of.
- 23 Immediate Burial: All materials including dead animals requiring immediate and secure
- 24 disposal.

- Joint Powers Agreement (JPA): The agreement between the City of Santa Fe and Santa Fe
- 2 County which created the SFSWMA and conveys certain authorities and responsibilities to the
- 3 SFSWMA related to the construction, operation, maintenance, replacement, expansion and
- 4 closure of a solid waste facility.
- 5 Joint Powers Board (JPB): The JPB which is the governing body of the SFSWMA and which
- 6 is designated in accordance with the Joint Powers Agreement.
- 7 Mercury-Containing Lamp: Any bulb or tube portion of the lighting device that contains a
- 8 small amount of elemental mercury.
- 9 Manure: Agriculture waste composed of animal waste and animal bedding materials that
- 10 originated from sites approved by the SFSWMA and contains no contamination such as
- 11 veterinary waste.
- 12 Mulch: Ground green waste of which 100% of material passes a two (2) inch screen and has
- been cured a minimum of ninety (90) days.
- 14 Non-Freon Bearing Appliance: Household appliances which are not designed to utilize Freon,
- including, but not limited to, stoves/ranges, hot water heaters, dishwashers and laundry machines
- which are a minimum of 60% metal by weight.
- 17 Owner: Owner, business owner or corporate owner responsible for waste and/or recycling being
- delivered to the facilities for disposal or recovery. The owner, business owner, or corporate
- 19 owner will be responsible for certifying that all waste and recyclables meet New Mexico
- 20 Environment Department, Federal, City and County rules, regulations and ordinances. The
- 21 owner, business owner, or corporate owner will be responsible for all waste and recycling
- 22 disposal and processing costs.
- Oversized Mulch: Ground green waste of which 100% of material does not pass a 2" screen.
- 24 Passenger Tires: Scrap tires with rim size of 20 inches or smaller. Passenger tires include tires
- 25 from motorcycles and ATV's.

- 1 Permits: The permits issued by the New Mexico Environment Department which authorize and
- 2 direct the respective facility's operations.
- 3 Petroleum Contaminated Soil: The owner/generator of petroleum contaminated soil shall assure
- 4 that all petroleum contaminated soils are tested under the requirements of 20.9.8.11 and 20.9.8.15
- 5 NMAC including total petroleum hydrocarbons (TPH) and other contaminants as required by
- 6 facility's disposal management plan.
- 7 Salvaging: The controlled removal of materials for utilization, recycling, or sale.
- 8 Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency (SFSWMA): A joint powers agency created by
- 9 the JPA and governed by the JPB.
- 10 Scavenging: The uncontrolled and unauthorized removal of materials from any point at the
- solid waste facilities.
- 12 Schedule of Fees: The schedule of fees, rates and charges assessed to persons making use of the

- 14 Scrap Metal: Appliances and other objects which consist of a minimum of 60% metal by
- 15 weight. Scrap metal includes, but is not limited to, household appliances, some building

- 24 Solid Waste: All putrescible and non-putrescible materials generated or originating from
- 25 residential, commercial, industrial, mining, or community activities or from agricultural

- 1 excess to the owners at the time of such discard or rejection, (ii) as having served their intended
- 2 use, or (iii) for any other reason. Solid waste does not include materials accepted for recycling or

- 4 Uncovered / Unsecured Load: Any load from which litter and debris can blow out of or fall
- 5 from a vehicle.

6 Section 4. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. Establishment of Enterprise Fund. For the purpose of defraying all expenses of receiving, disposing or recycling of solid wastes and recyclables a regional solid waste agency enterprise fund has been created. The SFSWMA shall establish fees, rates and charges designed to recover the full cost of services for the various services provided. All revenues received from fees, rates and charges shall be credited to the fund. The fund shall pay all direct and indirect operating expenses as well as principal and interest payments and all other costs of bond indebtedness.
 - B. Authority to Accept Waste and Recyclables: The SFSWMA shall at all times have the sole and exclusive right to determine whether it shall receive, retain, reject, dispose of or recycle any solid waste or recyclable.

Section 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF FEE CATEGORIES

A. Schedule of Fees. The rates, fees and charges assessed to persons making use of the facilities shall be in accordance with the Schedule of Fees and with the service classes described herein. The Schedule of Fees is hereby adopted by reference and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A and made effective upon adoption of this ordinance. In accordance with the Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax Act, Section 7-9-4.3, NMSA 1978, a governmental gross receipts tax of up to 5% shall be imposed on each billing rendered in accordance with this ordinance.

B. Service Classes.

- 1. Landfill Service. Mixed or separated solid waste intended for disposal at the Caja del Rio Landfill Facility. Landfill service is generally restricted to those vehicles which exceed 12,500 pounds GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Landfill Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 2. Transfer Service. Mixed or separated solid waste delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and intended for transfer to the Caja del Rio Landfill Facility. Transfer service is generally restricted to vehicles which do not exceed 12,500 pounds GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Recycling & Transfer Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 3. Recycling Service. Mixed or separated conventional recyclables, green waste, scrap tires or scrap metal intended for recycling and delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility. Recycling service shall not be restricted by GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 4. Contract Service. Solid waste or recyclables delivered to the facilities in a quantity or condition which merit special consideration through a contractual fee agreement. Contract service shall also apply to any materials produced for resale by the SFSWMA. All contractual fee agreements shall meet the requirements of relevant local and state procurement laws and regulations, and, where applicable, the requirements of SFSWMA Policy No. 2010.1, Purchasing Procedures and Finance Policy.

1 Material Sales. The sale of materials produced by the SFSWMA and 5. 2 priced in accordance with this Ordinance or prevailing market price or sold to the 3 highest qualified bidder. Section 6. 10	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE JOINT POWERS BOARD OF THE SANTA FE SOLID

12	
13	Section 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this ordinance is to set forth the fees, rates, charges and
14	conditions of service that shall be applicable at all facilities operated by the Santa Fe Solid Waste
15	Management Agency.
16	Section 2. LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY. The Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency
17	was created by means of a duly approved Joint Powers Agreement between the City of Santa Fe
18	and Santa Fe County acting under the authority of the Joint Powers Agreement Act (being
19	Section 11-1-1 through 11-1-7, NMSA 1978). The governing body of the agency is a Board of
20	Directors designated in accordance with the Joint Powers Agreement.
21	Section 3. DEFINITIONS
22	Composted Mulch: A product produced under a controlled aerobic thermophilic biological
23	decomposition process and that meets the New Mexico Department of Transportation minimum
24	specifications for composted mulch. Raw materials for composted mulch may include green
25	waste and manure.

- 1 Commercial Truck Tire: Scrap tires with rim size more than 20 inches.
- 2 Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator (CESQG): A generator that produces no
- 3 more than 220 pounds of hazardous waste, or no more than 2.2 pounds of acutely hazardous
- 4 waste, in a calendar month.
- 5 Construction and Demolition (C&D) Waste: Waste generated from the construction or
- demolition of a structure. C&D waste can consist of, but is not limited to, steel, brick, concrete,
- asphalt, roofing materials, pipe, gypsum board, wallboard, lumber, glass, paper, cartons, rubber,
- 8 and plastics. C&D waste does not include regulated asbestos, garbage, hazardous materials,
- 9 liquids, paints, solvents, adhesives, or sealers.
- 10 Contaminated Load: Any load of recyclables which contains materials other than those

- 12 Conventional Recyclables: Those materials defined as acceptable for recycling and posted at

- 24 Executive Director: The Executive Director of the SFSWMA, as designated by the JPB.

- 2 Landfill Facility: Caja del Rio Landfill located at 149 Wildlife Way, Santa Fe, NM
- 3 87506.
- 4 Recycling & Transfer Facility: Buckman Road Recycling and Transfer Station
- 5 (BuRRT) located at 2600 Buckman Road, Santa Fe, NM 87507.
- 6 Freon Bearing Device: Any device which contains and uses five (5) pounds or less of a Class I
- 7 (CFC) or Class II (HCFC) substance as a refrigerant and which is used for household or
- 8 commercial purposes, including any air conditioner, refrigerator, chiller or freezer.
- 9 Generator: Any person that produces solid waste by site or location to be shipped to any other
- 10 site or location, or whose act or process produces a solid waste to first cause to become
- 11 regulated.
- 12 Glass Aggregate: Glass bottles and jars which have been pulverized to produce two separate
- grades of aggregate <1/8 inch nominal size and <3/8 inch nominal size.

- 5 Joint Powers Board (JPB): The JPB which is the governing body of the SFSWMA and which

- 7 Mercury-Containing Lamp: Any bulb or tube portion of the lighting device that contains a
- 8 small amount of elemental mercury.
- 9 Manure: Agriculture waste composed of animal waste and animal bedding materials that
- 10 originated from sites approved by the SFSWMA and contains no contamination such as
- 11 veterinary waste.
- 12 Mulch: Ground green waste of which 100% of material passes a two (2) inch screen and has
- been cured a minimum of ninety (90) days.
- 14 Non-Freon Bearing Appliance: Household appliances which are not designed to utilize Freon,
- 15 including, but not limited to, stoves/ranges, hot water heaters, dishwashers and laundry machines
- which are a minimum of 60% metal by weight.
- 17 Owner: Owner, business owner or corporate owner responsible for waste and/or recycling being
- delivered to the facilities for disposal or recovery. The owner, business owner, or corporate
- 19 owner will be responsible for certifying that all waste and recyclables meet New Mexico

Section 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF FEE CATEGORIES

A. Schedule of Fees. The rates, fees and charges assessed to persons making use of the facilities shall be in accordance with the Schedule of Fees and with the service classes described herein. The Schedule of Fees effective October 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011 is hereby adopted by reference and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A-1 and made effective upon adoption of this ordinance. The Schedule of Fees effective July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012 is hereby adopted by reference and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A 2 and made effective upon adoption of this ordinance. - 2. Transfer Service. Mixed or separated solid waste delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and intended for transfer to the Caja del Rio Landfill Facility. Transfer service is generally restricted to vehicles which do not exceed 12,500 pounds GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Recycling & Transfer Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 3. Recycling Service. Mixed or separated conventional recyclables, green waste, scrap tires or scrap metal intended for recycling and delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility. Recycling service shall not be restricted by GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 4. Contract Service. Solid waste or recyclables delivered to the facilities in a quantity or condition which merit special consideration through a contractual fee agreement. Contract service shall also apply to any materials produced for resale by the SFSWMA. All contractual fee agreements shall meet the

23	specifications for composted mulch. Raw materials for composted mulch may include green
24	waste and manure.
25	Commercial Truck Tire: Scrap tires with rim size more than 20 inches

- 1 Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator (CESQG): A generator that produces no
- 2 more than 220 pounds of hazardous waste, or no more than 2.2 pounds of acutely hazardous
- 3 waste, in a calendar month.
- 4 Construction and Demolition (C&D) Waste: Waste generated from the construction or
- demolition of a structure. C&D waste can consist of, but is not limited to, steel, brick, concrete,
- 6 asphalt, roofing materials, pipe, gypsum board, wallboard, lumber, glass, paper, cartons, rubber,
- 7 and plastics. C&D waste does not include regulated asbestos, garbage, hazardous materials,
- 8 liquids, paints, solvents, adhesives, or sealers.
- 9 Contaminated Load: Any load of recyclables which contains materials other than those
- specified in an amount exceeding 10% by volume in a visual inspection.
- 11 Conventional Recyclables: Those materials defined as acceptable for recycling and posted at
- 12 the facilities. Recyclables include, but are not limited to, old newspaper (ONP), old corrugated
- 13 cardboard (OCC), magazines, junk mail, office paper, aluminum cans (UBC), aluminum foil,
- steel cans, #1 PET plastic bottles, #2 HDPE plastic bottles and glass bottles and jars prepared in
- accordance with SFSWMA's published requirements.
- 16 Dead Animals: Large animals typical of all breeds of livestock: cows, pigs, and horses; and
- small animals such as domestic cats and dogs. Dead animals include wildlife resulting from road
- 18 kills but not from infectious diseases.
- 19 Electronic Scrap (E-Scrap): Category of surplus, obsolete, broken or discarded electronic
- devices including, but not limited to, computers, monitors, keyboards, mice, scanners, various
- 21 computer peripherals, security equipment, fax and copy machines, cell phones and telephone
- 22 equipment.
- 23 Executive Director: The Executive Director of the SFSWMA, as designated by the JPB.
- 24 Facilities: All facilities operated by the SFSWMA including the following;

- 1 Landfill Facility: Caja del Rio Landfill located at 149 Wildlife Way, Santa Fe, NM
- 2 87506.
- Recycling & Transfer Facility: Buckman Road Recycling and Transfer Station
- 4 (BuRRT) located at 2600 Buckman Road, Santa Fe, NM 87507.
- 5 Freon Bearing Device: Any device which contains and uses five (5) pounds or less of a Class I
- 6 (CFC) or Class II (HCFC) substance as a refrigerant and which is used for household or
- 7 commercial purposes, including any air conditioner, refrigerator, chiller or freezer.
- 8 Generator: Any person that produces solid waste by site or location to be shipped to any other
- 9 site or location, or whose act or process produces a solid waste to first cause to become
- 10 regulated.
- 11 Glass Aggregate: Glass bottles and jars which have been pulverized to produce two separate
- grades of aggregate <1/8 inch nominal size and <3/8 inch nominal size.
- 13 Green Waste: Vegetative organic matter resulting from landscaping, land maintenance and
- agricultural operations. Green waste includes, but is not limited to, cuttings and trimmings from
- 15 trees, shrubs, or lawns and similar materials. Green waste does not include rock, dirt, metal,
- plastic, paper or any type of construction and demolition materials.
- 17 Gross Vehicle Weight (GVW): The total weight of the vehicle, any trailer, its occupants and
- 18 contents.
- 19 Household Hazardous Waste (HHW): Leftover household products such as paints, cleaners,
- 20 oils, batteries, and pesticides that contain potentially hazardous ingredients which require special
- 21 handling when disposed of.
- 22 Immediate Burial: All materials including dead animals requiring immediate and secure
- 23 disposal.
- Joint Powers Agreement (JPA): The agreement between the City of Santa Fe and Santa Fe
- 25 County which created the SFSWMA and conveys certain authorities and responsibilities to the

- 1 SFSWMA related to the construction, operation, maintenance, replacement, expansion and
- 2 closure of a solid waste facility.
- 3 Joint Powers Board (JPB): The JPB which is the governing body of the SFSWMA and which
- 4 is designated in accordance with the Joint Powers Agreement.
- 5 Mercury-Containing Lamp: Any bulb or tube portion of the lighting device that contains a

- 6 small amount of elemental mercury.
- 7 Manure: Agriculture waste composed of animal waste and animal bedding materials that
- 8 originated from sites approved by the SFSWMA and contains no contamination such as
- 9 veterinary waste.
- 10 Mulch: Ground green waste of which 100% of material passes a two (2) inch screen and has
- been cured a minimum of ninety (90) days.
- 12 Non-Freon Bearing Appliance: Household appliances which are not designed to utilize Freon,
- including, but not limited to, stoves/ranges, hot water heaters, dishwashers and laundry machines
- which are a minimum of 60% metal by weight.
- Owner: Owner, business owner or corporate owner responsible for waste and/or recycling being
- 16 delivered to the facilities for disposal or recovery. The owner, business owner, or corporate
- 17 owner will be responsible for certifying that all waste and recyclables meet New Mexico
- 18 Environment Department, Federal, City and County rules, regulations and ordinances. The
- 19 owner, business owner, or corporate owner will be responsible for all waste and recycling
- 20 disposal and processing costs.
- Oversized Mulch: Ground green waste of which 100% of material does not pass a 2" screen.
- 22 Passenger Tires: Scrap tires with rim size of 20 inches or smaller. Passenger tires include tires
- 23 from motorcycles and ATV's.
- 24 Permits: The permits issued by the New Mexico Environment Department which authorize and
- 25 direct the respective facility's operations.

- 1 Petroleum Contaminated Soil: The owner/generator of petroleum contaminated soil shall assure
- 2 that all petroleum contaminated soils are tested under the requirements of 20.9.8.11 and 20.9.8.15
- 3 NMAC including total petroleum hydrocarbons (TPH) and other contaminants as required by
- 4 facility's disposal management plan.
- 5 Salvaging: The controlled removal of materials for utilization, recycling, or sale.
- 6 Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Agency (SFSWMA): A joint powers agency created by
- 7 the JPA and governed by the JPB.
- 8 Scavenging: The uncontrolled and unauthorized removal of materials from any point at the
- 9 solid waste facilities.
- 10 Schedule of Fees: The schedule of fees, rates and charges assessed to persons making use of the
- 11 facilities.
- 12 Scrap Metal: Appliances and other objects which consist of a minimum of 60% metal by
- 13 weight. Scrap metal includes, but is not limited to, household appliances, some building
- 14 materials and auto parts.
- 15 Scrap Tire: A tire that is no longer suitable for its originally intended purpose because of wear,
- 16 damage or defect.
- 17 Sludge: Any solid, semi-solid, or liquid waste generated by a municipal, commercial or
- 18 industrial waste water treatment plant, water supply treatment plant, or air pollution control
- 19 facility. Sludge does not include treated effluent from a waste water treatment plant. The
- 20 owner/generator shall assure that the sludge is tested under the requirements of 20.9.8.11 and
- 21 20.9.8.16 NMAC and as required by facility's disposal management plan.
- 22 Solid Waste: All putrescible and non-putrescible materials generated or originating from
- 23 residential, commercial, industrial, mining, or community activities or from agricultural
- 24 operations that are discarded or rejected, whether (i) as being spent, useless, worthless or in
- excess to the owners at the time of such discard or rejection, (ii) as having served their intended

- 1 use, or (iii) for any other reason. Solid waste does not include materials accepted for recycling or
- 2 reuse or materials specifically prohibited by Section 7 of this ordinance.
- 3 Uncovered / Unsecured Load: Any load from which litter and debris can blow out of or fall
- 4 from a vehicle. The action is a companied to be properly the companied of the second of the second

Section 4. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. Establishment of Enterprise Fund. For the purpose of defraying all expenses of receiving, disposing or recycling of solid wastes and recyclables a regional solid waste agency enterprise fund has been created. The SFSWMA shall establish fees, rates and charges designed to recover the full cost of services for the various services provided. All revenues received from fees, rates and charges shall be credited to the fund. The fund shall pay all direct and indirect operating expenses as well as principal and interest payments and all other costs of bond indebtedness.
 - B. Authority to Accept Waste and Recyclables: The SFSWMA shall at all times have the sole and exclusive right to determine whether it shall receive, retain, reject, dispose of or recycle any solid waste or recyclable.

Section 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF FEE CATEGORIES

A. Schedule of Fees. The rates, fees and charges assessed to persons making use of the facilities shall be in accordance with the Schedule of Fees and with the service classes described herein. The Schedule of Fees effective October 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011 is hereby adopted by reference and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A-1 and made effective upon adoption of this ordinance. The Schedule of Fees effective July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012 is hereby adopted by reference and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A-2 and made effective upon adoption of this ordinance. The Schedule of Fees effective July 1, 2012 is hereby adopted by reference and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A-3 and made effective upon adoption of this ordinance. In accordance with the Gross Receipts and

Compensating Tax Act, Section 7-9-4.3, NMSA 1978, a governmental gross receipts tax of up to 5% shall be imposed on each billing rendered in accordance with this ordinance.

B. Service Classes.

- 1. Landfill Service. Mixed or separated solid waste intended for disposal at the Caja del Rio Landfill Facility. Landfill service is generally restricted to those vehicles which exceed 12,500 pounds GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Landfill Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 2. Transfer Service. Mixed or separated solid waste delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and intended for transfer to the Caja del Rio Landfill Facility. Transfer service is generally restricted to vehicles which do not exceed 12,500 pounds GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Recycling & Transfer Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 3. Recycling Service. Mixed or separated conventional recyclables, green waste, scrap tires or scrap metal intended for recycling and delivered to the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility. Recycling service shall not be restricted by GVW. The fee is established on the basis of weight as determined by the Buckman Road Recycling & Transfer Station Facility and charged to the nearest twenty (20) pounds.
- 4. Contract Service. Solid waste or recyclables delivered to the facilities in a quantity or condition which merit special consideration through a contractual fee agreement. Contract service shall also apply to any materials produced for resale by the SFSWMA. All contractual fee agreements shall meet the requirements of relevant local and state procurement laws and regulations, and,

1 where applicable, the requirements of SFSWMA Policy No. 2010.1, Purchasing 2 Procedures and Finance Policy. 3 Material Sales. The sale of materials produced by the SFSWMA and 5. 4 priced in accordance with this Ordinance or prevailing market price or sold to the highest qualified bidder. 5 Section 6. 9	to order the temporary closure of any SFSWMA facility when weather conditions cause the use
10	of the respective facility to be unsafe to customers or SFSWMA personnel.
11	Section 10. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon
12	adoption and thirty (30) days after its publication, but not before October 1, 2010 and as
13	provided by law.
