1. CALL TO ORDER

Councilor Joseph Maestas, called the meeting of the Bicycle and Trails Advisory Committee to order at 5:31 p.m. at the City Council Chambers in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Roll call constitutes a quorum.

3. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Mr. Pacheco stated the MPO report (Item 6 d) will be moved to next month,

MOTION: Ms. Robinson moved to approve the agenda as amended with a second from Ms. Grogan which passed by voice vote.

4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM November 15, 2017

MOTION: Mr. Martin moved to approve the minutes as presented with a second from Mr. O'Leary which passed by voice vote.

5. CITIZEN COMMUNICATION FROM THE FLOOR

Mike Harris (Councilor) discussed a new trail head for Arroyo Chamiso Trail. Perhaps the trail head can be where the hand ball court is. He mentioned it before to the developers at Ragel Park. The other area would be the Monica Lucero park that is already being used as a trail head.

Mr. Harris discussed the Las Soleras area. Pulte has sold those first two phases and the hospital will be complete soon. A bridge is being built on Las Soleras drive. He encourages them to look at it as a whole. This is an opportunity to build a full trail network.

Brent Bronwell (1 Agua Viviendo) discussed the La Tierra Torture and how they would like to bring it back to La Tierra Trails. They have raised money half of the funds raised goes to several organizations. They moved it to Glorieta camps due to permitting and parking required. In the past, they were asked to conduct races with low budgets, they feel they don't have any support from the City.

Sandy Hurlacher and Lynn Bjorklund (District Ranger SF National Forest Service-Espanola District) they are working on a plan to look at all lands and develop a trail system that will work for everyone. The trail would be in part of Santa Fe and up to Los Alamos.

Ms. Bjorklund explained it would be a landscape and sustainable recreation. They are having a meeting on February 1, 2018. It is open to suggestions now, and they are looking at master trail plans. There are several other entities and co-conveners that are willing to review the plans. After they work with the governments they can get with organizations.

Mr. Hurlacher explained how the planning will work with a facilitator.

Councilor Maestas asked how BTAC can help with the effort. Mr. Hurlacher explained with outreach and knowledge.

Councilor Maestas recommended they meet with Mr. Pacheco and MPO.

Ms. Robinson asked if the meeting open for the public or just the agencies. Mr. Hurlacher stated it is just for the agencies.

Mr. Newhill volunteers to be a BTAC member to attend the meeting. Councilor Maestas thanked them for bringing this to the committee.

6. COMMUNICATIONS FROM OTHER AGENCIES

a. Bicycle Safety Report

Sgt. McCord was not in attendance. Mr. Pacheco stated he will continue to put this item

on the agenda.

Councilor Maestas would like bicycle safety on each agenda and is proposing a resolution be created for a BTAC member to sit on the Public Safety Committee.

b. City Trails Coordinator Report

Mr. Rogers reviewed the highlights of the report that is included in the packet (See Exhibit A). Mr. Rogers discussed the rail triangle area, part of it will be lost but still useable as a trial. The works days for the year were listed. The first phase of the dog park connector trail will begin soon.

Mr. Rogers shared the "bike day at the capitol" on January 27, 2018 at the Roundhouse. They will meet at 10:00 am with the cyclists coming from Albuquerque, they will ride the Route 66.

Councilor Maestas asked Mr. Rogers to explain the contract work that he does for the City for the public here who may not know the work he does.

Mr. O'Leary mentioned the funds raised for transportation for the fieldtrips. Mr. Rogers mentioned there is an appreciation celebration planned for all volunteers.

Mr. O'Leary mentioned having the item of Hospital Drive be on the next agenda.

Ms. Robinson recalls the trails summit they had over 10 years ago where the trails coordinator position came out of.

Mr. Martin asked about the Los Soleras assessment and if they have made progress. Mr. Rogers mentioned they mapped it for the bicycle map. It connects to the Nava Ade trail.

c. Santa Fe County Open Space Program

Councilor Maestas discussed the first mention of the organization that started the Open Space Program from geo bonds. Ms. Lohman explained the land the County has purchased for open space. The properties had goals when they were purchased. For example, an area near the Santuario de Chimayo was purchased for agricultural reasons. Some of the lands purchased have complex issues. There are archeological reasons, there are some that have flooding issues. They have been working on some other areas like the Ortiz Mountains.

Ms. Lohman explained they are working on a strategic management plan. They have started with the River trail projects. Construction has started on another project to diable canyon. The Arroyo Hondo should connect the trail from 599 to the Santa Fe Community College.

Ms. Lohman explained the signage they came up with. The color coordination was made to match the City trails. They have worked with a consultant on the logos.

Ms. Lohman stated the strategic management plan will be set for years ahead. It will help outline their investments and management of the properties. It will help identify stewardship opportunities.

Councilor Maestas states the overall plan and the explanation of the different types of properties.

Ms. Wellington asked if the PowerPoint can be sent to Mr. Pacheco to share with the Committee. She is glad to see them working on the connections and hopes the overpass and underpass opportunities to keep bicyclists safe.

Ms. Grogan thanked them for their work. Are there milestones they are going to come across that she can report back to BTAC if they need assistance? Perhaps a BTAC member can attend their meetings.

Ms. Lohman states they can inform Mr. Pacheco and update him. There will be issues they will need feedback from BTAC.

Councilor Maestas suggests they also contact the MPO Policy Board with updates.

Ms. Robinson asked if they hold events when projects are complete. Ms. Lohman stated in June they will hold a celebration for the El Camino Real.

Mr. Martin asked about the surface on the El Camino Real trail. Ms. Lohman explained from Constellation Dr. to the MRC it is paved, it will be wide along the county road and left as a natural surface. It narrows and is left natural to Diablo Canyon.

d. Update of Santa Fe Bikeways & Trails Master Plan

This item was postponed until the next meeting.

7. INFORMATION, DISCUSSION & ACTION

a. International Mountain Bike Association-GOING FOR GOLD

Mr. Bronwell explained the renewal application is due in 2019. There has to be 75 points to be Silver and 90 for Gold. Mr. Bronwell explained some of the points he believes they have now. Mr. Bronwell submitted information on the IMBA application in the packet (See Exhibit B).

Mr. Bronwell explained the need for the potable water and trails that need to be done.

Mr. Bronwell mentioned the issues with Glorieta camps and the City Land Use

Department if they are able to get their variances it would help with points.

Mr. Newhall asked about the blue bus be considered for transportation. Mr. Bronwell stated it would not.

Mr. O'Leary asked about the Santa Fe Ski Basin uplift. Mr. Bronwell states it would be a while.

Ms. Grogan asked if the MPO can help with the data he needs. Mr. Bronwell will contact Mr. Aune.

Ms. Wellington asked about receiving the synopsis of the point system. Mr. Bronwell will get that to them. Mr. Bronwell explained the races planned would help with outreach points.

b. La Tierra Trails-remaining funds expenditure

Mr. O'Leary states there are funds left to be used. Mr. O'Leary states the single track trail being planned at the dog park is in that quadrant. There is a challenge with the historical issues. There is an opportunity to have it built and utilize some of the funds but not exhausting it. There are always issues with restrooms, there aren't any amenities offered there.

Councilor Maestas states there was a right of way issue. Can there be an interim trail, made until a decision is made?

Mr. Pacheco explained the plans for this project are in the packet. There is a synopsis in the packet. (See Exhibit C) He doesn't believe the right of way is the issue.

Mr. O'Leary asked about the work the volunteers can do. Mr. Newhall discussed the different costs and surfaces and the uses they will need to evaluate.

Ms. Grogran recalls the discussion BTAC had about these remaining funds.

Mr. Rivera asked about ADA compliance. Mr. Pacheco states the La Tierra Trails plan was reviewed by the Mayors Committee on Disability. Mr. Pacheco states he placed the items in the packet as a reminder that this has been pending for a year.

Mr. Rogers discussed the process of this project. Mr. Rivera would like to have someone from the Mayors Committee on Disability attend the next meeting to explain the requirements.

Mr. Martin asked about the archeological matter. Mr. Rogers states the SHIPO approval is still pending, they will need to re-record some sites. Also, the Santa Fe Public Schools land is pending.

Ms. Wellington stated the SFPS has a safe routes to school. Perhaps if they start something there it could link it to the schools. Ms. Robinson asked where the school's land is on the map.

Mr. Pacheco stated there are contracts in place with SFPS.

Mr. O'Leary asked if when Mr. Pacheco mentioned the trail be interim if he means, the trail be interim until the engineering starts. Mr. Pacheco states it doesn't really have to be until the trail starts there is a resolution in place and federal applications made.

Mr. O'Leary asked are volunteers going to be allowed to build the entire trail or are the stakeholders going to be involved? Mr. O'Leary does not want to mislead the public and wants to make sure the money is spent responsibly. This item will need further discussion.

Mr. Rogers states the City has looked at other plans for developing that land if it was passed that could change what happens.

Mr. Martin asked about the events that come to Santa Fe, there seem to be barriers. No parking, or restrooms. This is an opportunity for the events to have these and invest the funds.

Ms. Wellington agrees with Mr. Martin. She asked who will track the information from SHIPO. Mr. Rogers states he handles that, they have submitted the report.

Ms. Robinson will review old minutes for herself since this has been discussed before.

Ms. Wellington asked about the school owned land and if a survey needs to be done. Mr. Pacheco states that is too far ahead.

Ms. Grogan states the trail can be built by Mr. Rogers and the volunteers. The plan can be discussed and perhaps there are other projects that need the funds.

Ms. Robinson asked Mr. Pacheco bring this item back next month.

c. Museum Hills Trails Master Plan

Mr. Francis from Surroundings Studio was rewarded a state RFP for the landscape work to be done at Museum Hill. All museums formed a partnership. He is here to propose a safer Camino Lejo. They have an idea on how to connect trails. In the master plan they could create a safer trail along Santa Fe Trail. They are not funded yet.

Ms. Robinson states this was to be done a few years ago.

Mr. Francis states the left side of the road is best for the trail because of the drainage. They are pursuing funding for the signage. Many of the museums have private donors, however they are not definite.

Ms. Robinson asked if this project would require an ENN. Mr. Francis states it would. Mr. Pacheco states the City would not be in charge of the project. Mr. Pacheco included older maps and discussions on this project. (See Exhibit D)

Mr. Newhall is involved in the Folk Art Market, the older trail there will be difficult to go around. He asked if it will stay on the left side. Mr. Francis passed out a rendering of the plan which not a final plan as of yet.

Ms. Wellington asked about the idea of another trail idea they had in 2009. She expressed her concern for safety and removing trails from nearby streets.

d. Guadalupe Street Reconstruction-project update

Mr. Quintana is the project manager on this case. They had a citizen's meetings and got several comments, they are in the process of going through the comments and looking at different ideas.

A roadside safety audit was done that triggered this project. They would like to start construction in March. Mr. Newhall asked about bike lanes. Mr. Quintana stated they are hoping to have them.

Ms. Wellington sent an email to Mr. Pacheco with links to provide to staff with the complete streets ordinance for their consideration. She expressed her concern with the safety and the idea of having staff attend a smart cycle class.

Ms. Grogan states the bike lanes and sidewalks are a great idea.

Ms. Robinson suggests they look at other cities, perhaps like Raleigh as an alternative.

Mr. O'Leary asked if he could explain some of the ideas they were given.

Mr. Quintana explained the roadside safety audit proved some good alternatives. There are comments about crossings and parking.

Ms. Robinson asked about the people in attendance, where they business owners? Mr. Quintana stated it was a mix. Mr. Quintana is happy to return monthly to update the Committee.

RECOMMENDATION FOR USE OF REMAINING BALANCE IN NORTHWEST QUADRANT TRAILS 2008 BOND FUND - BU 426007 (LEROY PACHECO)

BACKGROUND/SUMMARY:

There remains a cash balance of approximately \$280,000 in Business Unit 426007 (Northwest Quadrant Trails) from the 2008 Parks and Trail Bond Fund. There is an active and ongoing discussion by the City's Bicycle and Trails Advisory Committee (BTAC) since January 2017 for recommending use of that fund within the La Tierra Trails system in accord with unfinished projects in that system's approved master plan.

The committee has considered a connector trail to the La Tierra Trails from Frank Ortiz Dog Park and in March 2017 BTAC recommended that a single track path be developed by volunteers for a partial connection. This effort is currently underway under the auspices of the city's Parks & Recreation Department. The city has made application to NMDOT for federal funds to design and construct a multi-modal connection in 2015, and submitted Resolution 2015-8 in support of that effort which was not funded at that time.

BTAC will deliberate and make a recommendation for use of these funds at its February 21, 2018 meeting. The committee has been advised that since these are aging bond funds, the timeframe for executing a city council approved use of these funds is short. BTAC's recommended use of these remaining funds will be presented to the city's Public Works Committee for review and approval in March 2018.

Proposal to extend "Montoyas Trail" south through City-owned land east of Camino de las Montoyas, to an existing pedestrian gate, as a natural-surface single-track trail, along a 0.6-mile alignment flagged by Santa Fe Conservation Trust with city trail volunteers in 2016.

2. INTRODUCTION TO THE TOPIC: A brief statement regarding origin of the agenda item and its relevance to the current activity of BTAC.

This item responds to direct request from BTAC members on February 13, in discussion under Item 7b, for the City Trail Volunteer to report on plans relevant to the proposed "Connector Trail from Frank Ortiz Dog Park to La Tierra Trails."

3. BTAC ACTION BEING SOUGHT: Most BTAC deliberation is intended to achieve one of three outcomes. If appropriate be prepared to suggest a formal motion to the meeting floor for debate, discussion and vote.

*To inform: The purpose is to inform board members of the actions/thoughts of the presenting group and to provide an opportunity for discussion and questions. (E.g., an update from a standing or ad-hoc subcommittee) No action from BTAC is sought.

*To discuss: BTAC agrees that a preliminary proposal is worthy of further discussion. A possible motion to direct an individual to review the issue and return at a specified time with a formal proposal for action is sought.

*Ta act: BTAC supports a plan that requires outlining actions and obligations for Board members and/or Staff. A motion clarifying objectives, expectations and obligations of Board and/or Staff is sought.

SFCT requests that BTAC support the following proposal and request that the city manager direct the Parks Division, Trails Engineering, and any other city staff or committees to support this effort as well. Based on Exhibit C distributed to BTAC on Feb. 13, SFCT, as City Trail Volunteer Coordinator, proposes to work with the Parks Division and city trail volunteers to formalize the proposed trail alignment as a natural-surface, single-track trail to serve hikers and bicyclists on City Open Space between the two existing pedestrian access gates. The remainder of the alignment to the Frank Ortiz Dog Park will involve right-of-way, drainage, and historic resource issues that may be best addressed by city staff in the future, with the support of remaining bond funds dedicated to the implementation of the La Tierra Trails Master Plan.

4. ESTIMATION OF COST AND/ TIME: Who would be responsible for costs and/or BTAC or staff time? Has affected BTAC member or staff been apprised of the proposal and do they understand the obligations?

This proposal was presented to BTAC as an informational update on Feb. 13, was discussed by BTAC under Item 7b, and discussed in more detail with the BTAC member focusing on La Tierra Trails, Mr. Frank Herdman. This project can be completed by volunteers with minimal requirements on city staff and with no significant financial requirements on the City. SFCT would request only that City Parks staff assist with removal of trash that is gathered by volunteers, and possibly with adjustments to boulders placed as obstacles inside of the pedestrian gate on the south terminus. SFCT would also request that the City Parks Division support approximately \$100 in costs for installations of wayfinding and related signage, to be designed by SFCT with City Parks approval, and sign posts that can be installed at each gate by trail volunteers, or by City Parks staff, if preferred.

This trail can be completed in two or three work days primarily through (1) removal of grasses from tread area in some locations and (2) placement of rock and dirt fill into small gullies that the trail crosses in such a way as to remediate erosion and prevent further erosion of surrounding soils. The primary form of improving the tread will be simply through use by hikers and bicyclists. There will be no need for digging or "bench cutting" at any significant depth below the gound level for this trail as cross slopes are minimal throughout the alignment. Trash removal, including removal of broken glass, will be an initial focus and an ongoing maintenance activity to be taken on by volunteers.

The area in question has been subjected to significant levels of illegal motorized use, producing various selferoding "double-track" trails left by ATV's and motor vehicles, as well as decades of illegal dumping of glass, cans, construction materials, and various other materials. To the extent the City requires reviews or clearances for the construction of this natural-surface trail, SFCT is prepared to pay for such processes through specific private support for the GUSTO project. Mr. Herdman stated different members represent certain districts, perhaps in a few meetings some time can be spent working on the list.

A discussion was held about having an event or booth set up for Bike to Work Week to get input.

Ms. Grogan discussed when there are subcommittees formed there are often slots for members of the public to join.

Mr. Aune explained that MPO is an effort of the City, County and Tesuque. If a public hearing were to be held that would have to be considered.

Mr. Abbatacola would like to see the interactive map show the projects from 5 years ago to now.

A brief discussion was held about the time frame and the CIP process. It would be helpful to have the project list.

Mr. Herdman is leaning in favor of reviewing the list at the BTAC meetings.

Councilor Maestas asked if it was possible to have the contact person be Mr. Rogers and include it in the contract they currently hold. Councilor Maestas would like Mr. L. Pacheco to be the point staff contact and work with Parks in changing the contract for Mr. Rogers.

c.) Camino de los Montoyas Trail South of NM599

Mr. Rogers discussed the Santa Fe Conservation Trusts plan for the area in Camino de los Montoyas to 599. (See Exhibit E)

Mr. Rogers discussed the shovel ready projects. In this proposal, there are spots for signage and there may be the need to dig bench cuts. The biggest issue right now is trash removal. Perhaps Parks can help haul it out.

A discussion was held about the funds for the NW Quad. Mr. Herdman stated he walked the proposed alignment, it makes sense to do this trail. Eventually there can be a second phase to the project.

A discussion was held about allowing some of the surplus funds to go towards a second phase.

MOTION: Mr. R. Pacheco moves to endorse the work to be done on the trail and add a phase to connect to

the dog park with funds from the surplus, Ms. Robinson seconds the motion which passed by voice vote.

A brief discussion was held about the land and the future development.

This connection is included among a list of potential projects in the original La Tierra Trails Master Plan, and a city council resolution and application for federal funds for this project was submitted to NMDOT in spring 2015.

a.) Canada Rincon Trail Project Status

Ms. Horn presented some slides that were presented at the public meeting for the project. (See Exhibit D). There was a lot of positive feedback.

Ms. Horn stated the population has grown in the neighborhood. In the topography graph there is a majority of flood zone area.

Ms. Horn discussed the alternative for the connection to Avenida Rincon, an elevated ramp is one option. There is a 12-foot increase.

A discussion was held about the public input. Ms. Horn stated the Reserve is aware of the plans and they have not voiced any concerns.

Mr. L. Pacheco stated they have completed the right of way, there is 30% conceptual design and the full survey has all been done.

A gentleman in the audience asked about the area up to Tano, it is not paved. Seniors on bikes support the project so it will be done as soon as possible.

Ms. Robinson asked if there was a sense the Reserve would close of the path. Mr. L. Pacheco hoped someone from the Reserve would be presented to discuss tonight, however they had a meeting and he did not get that sense.

Mr. L. Pacheco would like to have the Reserve attend a BTAC meeting within the next few months to discuss their concerns if any.

A woman from the audience asked if the trail would be on City property can they refuse access to it.

A brief discussion was held about the ramp and how it can be brought to code.

<u>MOTION:</u> Mr. R. Pacheco moved to allow City staff ask the agent representing the Reserve to make a report to BTAC so that the project can move forward with a second from Ms. Wellington which passed by voice vote.

A gentleman in the audience asked about the section under the 599 bridge that is unpaved. Mr. Herdman stated there is nothing on the master plan but it can be added and any input is welcome. There is limit funding.

b.) Preliminary Estimate for Connector Trail from Frank Ortiz Dog Park to La Tierra Trails

project was estimated at \$300,000.

La Tierra Trails System – Connector Trail from Frank Ortiz Dog Park to Camino de los Montoya's Trail

- The project is listed in the August 2012 updated Trails Master Plan Project List with a cost range estimated at \$300,000.00
- In 2009 the city council amended the General Land Use Plan to include amendments to parcels in the 542 acres in the Northwest Quadrant south of NM 599.
- The Santa Fe Public Schools owns approximately 7% of the property in the Northwest Quadrant, and is a stakeholder in development of city infrastructure in the area.
- In 2015 the city made application to the **New Mexico DOT** for consideration of a federal grant for this connector trail with a proposed cost to design and construct of \$250,000.00. Application included a city council approved resolution to indicate political support for the trail. The application was not selected for grant of funds.
- The proposed connector trail would be approximately 0.65 miles in length, and typically 10-ft wide with a firm and unyielding surface.
- Project stakeholder's include:
 - 1. Surrounding Neighborhoods (Casa Solana, Santa Fe Estates, etc.)
 - 2. Diverse Trail users (hikers, bicyclists, equestrians, dog-walkers,)
 - 3. Americans with Disabilities
 - 4. Archeological interests (Native American Tribes)
 - 5. The Santa Fe Public Schools
- City agents: Public Works (Engineering, Traffic, Streets and Drainage), Historic Preservation, Mayor's Committee on Disability, Land Use, Parks & Recreation
- There are drainage and terrain considerations and challenges to be considered and overcome in the proposed trail corridor.
- There are traffic design considerations in crossing users at Camino de las Crucitas and Camino de los Montoyas.



Mr. Aune reported meeting with the GIS Department who provided him with a conceptual map to show the interactive aspects. It may show past, present and future projects.

Mr. Aune stated there will be a Senate Joint Memorial to honor work throughout the next decade this year at the Session. He has a copy if anyone is interested.

b.) City Trails Coordinator Report

Mr. Rogers left early, however Ms. Sandra Noss will present his report. (See Exhibit A)

Ms. Noss reported the work done on the way finding signs on the Dale Ball Truila is complete.

Ms. Noss reported there is another trial near Arroyo Polay on Upper Canyon Road. There is an area near the trail head for sale which goes up the Dorothy Stewart trail. They would like to get that as an official trail. In Las Estrellas there are some unofficial trails that need to be made official.

Ms. Robinson asked if there will be room for parking at that trial head. Ms. Noss stated they are working with the landowner on that issue.

Councilor Maestas stated he was approached by the Upper Canyon Association about the old sand filtration plant. It has been knocked down and he wants to make sure that its cleaned up well. Ms. Noss will have Mr. Rogers check if there is to be any trail rerouting.

Mr. Bonwell stated the Natures Conservancy is going to buy the materials needed to reroute the trail.

Councilor Maestas would like to see the plans.

Mr. L. Pacheco stated the February meeting conflicts with the Mayor's State of the City Address. A discussion was held and a date was confirmed to reschedule.

<u>MOTION</u>: Mr. Pacheco moved to move Item 7c before 7a due to the public in attendance with a second from Ms. Robinson which passed by voice vote.

Mr. Herdman explained the La Tierra Master Plan was adopted in 2011. It's a very well developed master plan which got a lot of public Input. The City Resolution and the Master Plan are included (See Exhibit B).

Staff put together a priority list and BTAC approved it. In 2014 it was determined there was a surplus and several projects were left incomplete.

Mr. Herdman explained the multi-use of the trail. The motocross area was incorporated as an alternative to deter the unlawful use of ATV's on other trials. The trail has earned a Silver rating and has been recognized nationally.

There are some emails that Mr. Herdman received with input on where people would like to see the money used.

Mr. Herdman discussed the area from the dog park to the lower portion near 599. The City built a bike lane up Las Montoyas that gets you to the dog park but nothing under 599. Some ideas received are for the following:

Shade structures
Spectator areas
Storage sheds- for the Jump areas
Water source to maintain to water the jumps

Although the Board can't prioritize the projects perhaps there can be a Public Hearing to hear more items. Mr. Herdman offered to create a spreadsheet to organize the ideas.

Ms. Grogan asked the timeline and what projects are still incomplete. Mr. Herdman states that it difficult to read the items and the plan.

Mr. Bonwell explained where the trails are. There is a new subdivision where they have trails in that area. Most of the easements are in the arroyos. They are going to work with the subdivisions while developing so the trails aren't left until the very end of the process.

Mr. Herdman reported the area where the trail will go has been taken over by illegal dumping. Ms. Robinson asked if the entire amount of surplus can be used for one large item. Mr. Herdman stated the process should not be rushed. To honor the resolution and the public input.

Mr. Pacheco stated this item has been discussed for a while now and it should be a priority. If staff can look at the list and prioritize the items, it would be great. Mr. Herdman is unsure on the amount needed for this project.

A discussion was held about a bond for some items. Mr. L. Pacheco stated there was an estimate done previously if they would like to go off of that.

Mr. Newhall (601 West San Mateo) stated his organization offered to help build the trail about 3 years ago. He believes it can be done very inexpensively, all that will be needed is the archeology search.

Mr. Herdman likes that idea, perhaps Mr. L. Pacheco can provide the estimate with a portion done with volunteers and all other costs. Mr. L. Pacheco will check into the scope for an urban trial to a city trail and also the ADA requirements and right of way issues. The master plan went through the Mayor's Committee on Disability. He will check with the Legal department.

Mr. Abbatacola asked about signage on the trail. Mr. L. Pacheco stated it was on the priority plan. Mr. John Branch with I Ride NM discussed the fact that the trails are getting nationally recognized the money should be used to reflect the reputation. There is an RTP grant available.

MOTION: Mr. Pacheco moved that the BTAC request staff provide an estimate for the trail from the dog park to the 599 and update the board if there is an affordable way to stay within budget with a second from Mr. Herdman which passed by **voice wote**.

Mr. Pacheco thanked the public in attendance and if there is a public hearing he hopes they all attend.

8. BTAC SUBCOMMITTEE UPDATES

a.) On Road Subcommittee

Mr. Abbatacola reported the Route 66 exploratory ride has had to be rescheduled due to the snow. He thanked Mr. Aune for the meeting with Mr. Lemon.

c.) Going for the Gold

A discussion was held about the application date. There is a date for later in the year. They will get it confirmed with Mr. Siqueiros.

Mr. Newhall announced Bike Santa Fe will be offering the Smart Cycling Classes. They will be in May and it may help with the application. There have been 3 members who have taken the class so far.

9. STAFF COMMUNICATIONS

a.) Trails Projects Status Update

Mr. L. Pacheco reported the ENN for the Canada Rincon project is going to be held on February 7, 2017. On February 10, 2017 the bid will open for the bridges over the river crossings behind the School for the Deaf area.

Mr. L. Pacheco stated the new budgets will be reviewed and then he will know which projects can be completed.

Mr. Abbatacola asked for an update on the work on the underpass. He believes they will begin again in April.

A discussion was held about when the Smart Cycling Class will be held. A formal invitation with a date will be sent out and invites will go out to the SFPD Bicycle Unit and the Mayor.

Ms. Robinson stated Bike and Brew and Bike to Work Week is in May as well. Perhaps by then a safe area to use the underpass can be done so they can showcase it.

BICYCLE/TRAFFIC PLAYGROUNDS: A Place to teach kids to love their bikes

WHAT: A dedicated space designed where riders of all abilities can safely learn how to ride within the context of our local roadway and multi-use trail environment. Design characteristics are reduced in size to match a child's perspective and provide realistic traffic simulation with features that may include traffic lights, round-abouts, road signs, street markings, bike paths, sharrows, and more.

WHY: In the United States there are no comprehensive and consistent bike education programs. Thankfully local police and fire departments such as those in Santa Fe host "Bicycle Rodeos" as a means to promote bicycle safety, provide helmets and other safety gear and a means for youth to engage with public safety officials in a positive environment. A Bicycle/Traffic Playground may provide a consistent location for public safety, public school, non-profits and local governments to host youth in an environment where they are encourage to return again and again.

Studies clearly indicated that parents worried about their children's welfare are reluctant to allow their children to bike to school or to other neighborhood

amenities; yet



WHEREAS, the City of Santa Fe has more than 50 miles of dirt trails and 30 miles of ADA-accessible, paved trails around almost every City park and along the Santa Fe River, rail line, Acequia Madre, and Arroyo de las Chamisas, providing Santa Feans with safe and accessible walking routes to improve their health in a natural environment; and
