A RESOLUTION

TO SUPPORT THE ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION PROJECT "100 RESILIENT CITIES"  
AND REQUEST STAFF TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION FOR CONSIDERATION AS ONE  
OF THE 33 CITIES TO BE CHOSEN FOR THE PROJECT.

WHEREAS, in 2013, The Rockefeller Foundation pioneered "100 Resilient Cities" to help more cities build resilience to the physical, social, and economic challenges that are growing parts of the 21<sup>st</sup> century; and

WHEREAS, over the past two years 100 Resilient Cities has built a network of 67 cities, and is providing them with support to adapt to these challenges; and

WHEREAS, with the current threats of urbanization, globalization and climate change, there has never been a more important time to build urban resilience; and

WHEREAS, currently, hundreds of cities have applied, and 67 cities have been selected, to join the Network -- representing one-fifth of the world's urban population and by 2016, 100 cities will be actively building a resilience strategy; and

WHEREAS, cities may apply to become part of the 100 Resilient Cities Network and if

1 selected, would be eligible to receive four types of support:

- 2• 1. Support to hire a Chief Resilience Officer, an innovative new position in  
3 government that will lead the city's resilience efforts.
- 4 2. Expertise to develop a robust resilience strategy.
- 5 3. Access to a platform of partners providing technologies and services to help  
6 cities implement a resilience strategy, including partners such as Microsoft, Swiss Re, and the Nature  
7 Conservancy.
- 8 4. Membership in the 100 Resilient Cities Network, a global network of cities already  
9 collaborating with and learning from each other.

10 **WHEREAS**, by accepting the challenge and making application by November 24, 2015, we  
11 could have the potential to secure powerful tools to improve ourselves in both good times and bad,  
12 but also provide our city the opportunity to be part of this emerging practice.

13 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE**  
14 **CITY OF SANTA FE** that the Governing Body supports application for consideration in the  
15 Rockefeller Foundation Project of 100 Resilient Cities.

16 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Governing Body authorizes staff to complete the  
17 application process for 100 Resilient Cities prior to the November 24, 2015 deadline.



Resilience is defined as the capacity of a community to survive and thrive no matter what acute shock or chronic stresses it experiences. In practice, building resilience leads to investing in efforts that have multiple benefits – social, economic, and environmental – and that leverage multiple stakeholder interests. The 100 Resilient Cities Challenge seeks to find 100 cities that are ready to build resilience to the social, economic, and physical challenges that cities face in an increasingly urbanized world. If the City of Santa Fe were selected as one of the 100 cities it would provide the following:

- Funding in the form of a grant to hire a Chief Resilience Officer;
- Technical support to develop a holistic resilience strategy that reflects each city's distinct needs;
- Access to an innovative platform of services to support strategy development and implementation. Platform partners come from the private, public, and nonprofit sectors, and will offer tools in areas such as innovative finance, technology, infrastructure, land use, and community and social resilience;
- Membership in the 100 Resilient Cities network to share knowledge and practices with other member cities.

A Chief Resilience Officer would benefit the City of Santa Fe by helping manage the complexities of the City to make resilience efforts more impactful, and collaborating externally to identify and integrate lessons other cities have learned.
